Two of the raiders were brought down. Columbia and National Broadcasting Co. offices were hit, the former being completely wrecked and the latter badly damaged.

WAR PLANES FOR GREECE

WASHINGTON-Thirty warplanes are to be delivered at once by the United States and are expected to be in the fray against Italy within two weeks. They are planes to which Great Britain has waived priority.



IDARWALD IS CAPTURED

LONDON-The German merchant vessel Idarwald, which put out from Tampico, Mexico, November 29 to run the British blockade and attempt to get home to the Reich, is in possession of the British cruiser H.M.S. Diomede, it is officially announced by the Admiralty. Earlier it had been reported the Idarwald had been either seized by th British Navy or sunk off the south coast of Cuba. There were then conflicting reports. One report was that the vessel was set afire and scuttled by her own crew after encountering British Naval vessels. Another was that she was torpedoed and sunk. Another still was that she was set afire by her crew but the British naval men boarded her, put the fire out and took her captive. The British Admiralty at first made no statement but opinion in London naval circles was that it was more likely the vessel would have been captured than torpedoed. This view was confirmed later by official announcement. This view was confirmed later by official announcein West Indies waters about one thousand miles from where President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States was cruising at the time.

VICTIMS OF ENEMY ATTACK

NEW YORK- Mackay Radio reports indicate further torpedoeings in Atlantic waters over the week-end. The Norwegian tanker Heidelfjord is reported to have been attacked by a German raider off Daker on the west coast of Africa. In the same vicinity the British freighter Empire Jaguar is reported to have been torpedoed. Another vessel, formerly French and now being operated by the British, reported being pursued 550 miles west of Foynes, Ireland. A Greek vessel was reported rolling helplessly broken down with her holds full of water.

LONDON. Dec. 9: (CP)- After a forty-eight hour respite for London from bombing and a twenty-four hour period during which not single enemy plane appeared over any part of the British Isles, the Nazis resumed their intensive aerial warfare last night with London the objective of their assault of death and destruction from the skies, the provincial towns remaining quiet. The planes came over in mass formations and in steady streams from all directions and

dropped all kinds of bombs, including some new types. The attack was the heaviest in two weeks and lasted from early evening until dawn. A number of London hotels were struck as well as many buildings and houses in various parts of the city. It was thought that casualties might not be excessively heavy although many Londoners, evidently looking for a third quiet night, were caught unawares away from their customary shelters. Nine hospitals were hit. Many casualties among patients and staff were caused by a direct hit in one. Prop-
