UNITED STATES OF EUROPE

There is considerable talk of the formation of a United States of Europe when the war is over. It sounds rather fine and many will consider it idealistic. Yet it may become a possibility within the next few years, if the war should last that long. If anything comes of the movement it will depend quite largely on what is the attitude of Britain and France at that time. If they are for it, as they seem to be at present, something along that line may be done. We hope they succeed.

Britain has declared again and again that she is not seeking territory or anything except justice for the smaller nations. French leaders now say they would like to see a union of European states. With such a set-up there is hope of something in the way of union being attained.




