Germans Not Making Much Headway Against French and Losing Heavily in Casualties and Tanks

PARIS, June 6: (CP)-Except at a few points where there were slight withdrawals for strategic reasons, the French defenders are holding out all along the 110--mile Somme front against Germany's new offensive which became even more intensified today than it was yester-

The enemy launched terrific ground attacks with massed artillery, tanks and infantry today with the main hammerheads apparently aimed from the direction of the lower Somme between Amiens and the sea toward the port of Le Havre and from Campiegne on the Oise River and Rethel on the Aisne towards Paris.

In the first half both teams played a god brand of football. First Alpha and then Beta attacked strongly, both teams, however, having difficulty in getting past the defences.




