Allied Situation Is Still Improving

MAIN NAZI DRIVE ALLIES NOW STALLED; FIERCE BATTLE WAGES

of Boulogne is Finally Admitted But Calais is Holding On—French and British Victories on Sunday

PARIS, May 27: (CP)—The French High Command announced the loss of Boulogne to the Germans after bitter fighting throughout the city but said that the main German drive was stalled at least temporarily. Fighting around Calais is extremely intense today and the outcome is confused with both Allies and Germans claiming possession of the port. In London a statement declared that the Allied forces were fighting with superb heroism and were standing up well against fierce Nazi attacks, particularly around Calais. The outcome is awaited with "courage and confidence," it was stated. Terrible and relentless, the Germans appear to be putting the full weight of their attack today into the great Battle of Flanders and are using all the mechanized forces at their command. Despite the terrific attack and certain withdrawals, including one to prepared positions behind Valenciennes, the "situation is not to Norway after spending some time in England and is now back with King Haakon in his own country.

ATTEMPT ON TROTSKY
MEXICO—A police dragnet has been set out in Mexico after attempted machine gun assassination of Leon Trotsky. Two Russians—a man and a woman have been arrested.

MOSCOW'S WARNING
MOSCOW—Moscow has issued warning to belligerent nations keep war out of the Balkans. If they do so would bring Russia armed intervention, it is threatened. At the same time it is reported to have assured Balkans that she has no intention of drawing them into war.

VATING FOR ITALY
ROM—Virginia Gayda, authoritative Fascist editor, claims that Italy has won a great victory for the Rome-Berlin axis through its policy of non-belligerency by holding Allied forces in the Mediterranean when they might be usefully employed against Germany. There is contradiction as to whether such as has attended the British-American discussions. One report is that they have been broken off, either from Britain or that this is not satisfactory agreement has been reached and that decisions are now being worked out.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

WASHINGTON—"Day and night I pray for a restoration of peace," said President Roosevelt last night. "It is not necessary for me to ask the people of the United States to pray in such a cause. I know you are doing it, in every waking moment our supplications go up to God for an end to this death and suffering, privation and starvation, for a healing of the wounds of humanity." The President declared that every American could do something to ensure the security of the nation against new methods of attack such as spies, saboteurs and traitors within against whom it was necessary to deal fearlessly. The American people, he said, would not tolerate the making of new millions as a result of slaughter and human suffering in wars abroad as a result of the domestic defense program.

LEGION IN SESSION
MONTREAL—The Dominion convention of the Canadian Legion opened here today with war effort, fifth column and subversive activities among important matters to be taken up.

TO ATTACK SHIP
BERLIN—The German radio charges Great Britain with planning to sink a United States liner new on the Atlantic with American refugees on board. (This is presumed to be a German threat against the President Roosevelt.)

Army Command Is Reorganized

LONDON, May 27.—Under a reorganization of the British High command, General Sir John Dill succeeds General Sir Edmund Ironside as chief of Imperial staff. Ironside takes command of all the home forces in succession to Sir Walter Kirk, retired Viscount Gort remains in command of British forces in France. General Ironside will have the task of organizing the country against threat of invasion.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27: (CP)—The White House announces that President Franklin D. Roosevelt is planning to name a national defence emergency co-ordination group composed of both private individuals and government officials.

TO BUILD UP FORCE

CANADA MOVING SWIFTLY TO HELP ALLIES IN EUROPEAN CRISIS

OTTAWA, May 27: (CP)—Immediate expansion of military and air forces in Canada as an emergency measure to meet the critical situation developing in Europe was announced in the House of Commons today by Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King.

The Conservative Opposition joined in cheers as Hon. Norman Rogers, minister of defence, and Hon. C. G. Power, minister of defence for air, gave details of proposed heavy increases in the forces including the veterans' reserve in addition to the veteran's home guard announced last week. Rifle battalions for a fourth division will be recruited and some 5000 Canadians on Royal Canadian Air Force application lists will be called up for immediate duty.

Mr. Rogers said that the actual number of men to be added to the military establishment is undetermined as yet.

Mr. Power warned that Air Force recruits might not be used immediately for air duties, suggesting they might be put to other purposes.

Officers commanding the military districts have been issued instructions to select officers to take charge of the veterans' home guard force. There will be a major in charge of each local 250 man unit. Pay will be the same as for the Canadian Active Service Force.

British Casualty List Shows 230

This Number Listed as Killed, Wounded, Missing or Captured

LONDON, May 27.—The latest British casualty list shows 230 names—6 officers and 224 men killed, wounded, missing or captured.

War News

LABOR BACKS GOVT
LONDON—British Labor by unanimous resolution has placed itself solidly behind the government decree conscripting manpower and wealth in Great Britain.

DESTROYERS SUNK
LONDON—Germany claims to have sunk a British aircraft carrier off the coast of Norway but all that Great Britain admits is the loss of a destroyer (H. M. S. Wessex) and a small mine sweeper.

MALTA IS TENSE
MALTA—Blackouts and other precautions against attack, possibly from Italy, are being taken at this British naval base. United States residents in Malta are being urged to return to the United States.

BRITAIN PUZZLED
LONDON—The Department of Information is unable to account for German claims of having attacked British air bases with bombing planes. Nothing is known about such attacks in Britain. It is presumed they refer to the week-end bombings when eight civilians were wounded as well as some cows and poultry when a chicken house was hit.

BELGIAN GOVT MOVES
LONDON—Premier Pierlot of Belgium and key ministers have arrived in London and conferred with Viscount Halifax, the Foreign Secretary. The Belgian government may move to England.

TURKISH EMERGENCY
INSTANBUL—A state of emergency has been declared throughout Turkey in view of the international situation.

SPEED UP WAR EFFORT
VANCOUVER—At a mass meeting of 9000 persons in Stanley Park yesterday, with General J. A. Clark the chief speaker, a resolution was drawn up urging speeding of Canada's war effort.

A resolution of fourteen points was drawn up urging recruiting of seven overseas divisions, internment of all aliens, registering of every man and woman in Canada and training of seventeen-year-old boys.

EMPIRE IS IN PRAYER

KING AND QUEEN AT WESTMINSTER ABBEY LEAD SUBJECTS IN INTERCESSION

LONDON, May 27.—The King and Queen led the British Empire in national prayer for the Allied cause by attending service at Westminster Abbey conducted by Most Rev. Cosmo Lang, Archbishop of Canterbury. Queen Wilhelmina of Holland, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and prominent members of the cabinet were also in attendance. The day of national prayer was observed throughout the Empire.

Terrace Asks Internment Of Enemy Aliens

TERRACE, May 27.—The Canadian Legion has taken up the question of dealing with "fifth columnists." A telegram has been drafted to be sent to the Ottawa government urging the internment of enemy aliens.

Weygand Says Things Getting Better Than Could Have Been Imagined Just One Week Ago

French Re-Occupying Positions in Somme—British Succeed in Counter-Attacking Furious Nazi Drive—Strategic Withdrawal in Belgium

AIRMEN ARE LOSING OUT

Allies Are Bringing Down German Planes By Scores Daily—Are Gaining Undisputed Air Supremacy

LONDON, May 27: (CP)—The Air Ministry announced today that twenty-eight German aircraft had been destroyed or damaged by Royal Air Force during the day. After a light Saturday when only twenty of the enemy's planes were disposed of, the total for Sunday was placed at forty.

Since May 10 the Germans have lost 2,000 planes it is estimated, their losses having been more than double those of the Allies and reducing their boasted superiority in the air to a definite inferiority.

The Belgians alone claim to have destroyed 250 German planes.






