REICH IS BOASTFUL

Communicate Claims Complete Success of Blitzkrieg In Scandinavia

NORWAY RESISTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10 (CP)—The Norwegian legation said today it had received apparently authentic word that the Norwegian government had decided to continue to resist the German invasion. This coincided with reports from Stockholm that Norwegian troops were deserting their government and their new capital at Hamar, having fought a fierce battle with invading German forces at Elverum, 75 miles north of Oslo. Reports here said that about two hundred Norwegians had been killed and wounded and German losses were not known. Germans are reported to be sending reinforcements but have not yet been seen since 4:30 p.m. (7:30 a.m. local Standard Time). Volunteers joined regular Norwegian troops in the defence. Distress signals from the German steamship Caribia, far up Oslo Fjord, today indicated that Germany, despite her boats, might not be in complete control of the deep fjord leading to the Norwegian capital. The ship was reported to have been fired on by coastal batteries at Nyviken near the fjord.

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Sea Battle Is Proceeding off Norway Today

BRITISH SANK GERMAN WARSHIP AND TWO TRANSPORTS—SKAGERRAK PENETRATED AND WEST COAST PORTS RECAPTURED

STOCKHOLM, April 10: (CP)—A mighty sea battle during which the British fleet attacked ten big German troopships, sinking two and scattering the others was seen tonight from Pater-noster Reefs, near the end of Marstrand in the Skagerrak. The battle began at 6 p.m. (9 a.m. Pacific Standard time) with escorting German warships trying to fight off British men-of-war. Shortly after 9 p.m. the fight appeared to be over and the transport fleet dispersed. Thunderous cannonading echoed during the engagement and swarms of planes took part. A later Stockholm radio said that a German warship was reported to have been sunk by British action near Arendal, Norway. A German destroyer was sunk off Horten in Oslo Fjord by the Norwegian cruiser Olaf Tryggvarson.

NEW YORK, April 10: (CP)—A London broadcast said "The British Admiralty has just announced that the British navy is at this moment engaged in the largest battle in the history of British sea warfare since the battle of Jutland." A communique issued at London said the operations off the coast of Norway are still in progress and it would be some time before relatives of casualties could be informed.

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—Reuters quotes authoritative British quarters in Stockholm as saying that Both Bergen and Trondheim have been recaptured.

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—Norwegian and Swedish sources tonight asserted British forces had recaptured Western Norwegian ports of Bergen and Trondheim, occupied yesterday by the Germans but British quarters refused to confirm the report.

NEW YORK, April 10: (CP)—A British Broadcast at 10:10 a.m. PST said the Swedish government had moved army reservists to the Northern and southern provinces and ordered all reserves mobilized.

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—The Royal Navy reported tonight to have penetrated the strategic Skagerrak and to have sunk two German troop transports and a German destroyer in a battle just outside Swedish territorial waters. The engagement was previously reported by Swedish radio, which said that shore watchers saw two large warships sinking.

NO ALARM IN ITALY

Not Fearful of Becoming Involved In War—Thinks Scandinavian Occupation German Victory

ROME, April 10:—Virginio Gayda, authoritative Fascist editor, says that the German occupation of Denmark and Norway is a major tactical victory over the Allies. Gayda sees no immediate danger of Italy becoming involved in war. This country will continue its policy of "wait and see" non-belligerence.

BERLIN, April 10:—Reports that Germany has now categorically demanded the surrender of Sweden are denied here.

BRAINTREE, Massachusetts, April 10: (CP)—Three men were killed and at least thirteen were injured by an explosion at the Old Colony Gas Co. plant in East Braintree.

War News

WILL CONTINUE FIGHT
LONDON—Foreign Secretary Lord Halifax said today that the Allies will fight for "defenceless Norway" regardless of any Norwegian negotiations with Germany which would be regarded as taken "under duress." The statement was made after unconfirmed reports had been heard that Norway was ready to negotiate with Germany. Halifax said what had happened to Denmark and Norway should be an example to the Allies for aid before it became too late.

SET UP PROTECTORATE
LONDON—Great Britain may set up a temporary protectorate over Greenland, Iceland and Faroe Islands in view of the situation whereby Denmark, to which they belong, has become "de facto enemy territory." Parliament of Iceland took full control of its foreign affairs today in view of the German occupation of Denmark to which Iceland is linked only by the crown. This amounts to virtual secession from Denmark.

CANADIANS TO NORWAY
LONDON—The Canadian First Division, now at Aldershot, may form an important part of the British expeditionary force to Norway.

WHY DENMARK QUIT
COPENHAGEN—The Premier of Denmark explains that Denmark decided not to resist the German invasion in order to save the country from "the consequences of a state of war and a severe blow of fate." Denmark had confidence in German assurance that its autonomy and integrity would be maintained.

NORWEGIAN WARSHIPS SUNK
STOCKHOLM—Norway lost her two largest warships, antiquated vessels, the 4,166-ton coast defence ships Norge and Eidsvols and 500 men in the resistance to the German capture of Narvik yesterday, refugees reaching Stockholm reported. They said the German troops entered the port on whalers.

GERMAN BOMBERS DOWN
LONDON—Royal Air Force fighter planes shot down two German Heinkel bombers off the northeast coast of England tonight while another German bomber was damaged in a fight over the English Channel.

EMDEN IS SUNK
NEW YORK—The British Broadcasting Corporation said today that the German cruiser Emden was sunk in Oslo Fjord by Norwegian ships.

NO DANGER IN NORWAY

Will Not Be Necessary For Americans To Evacuate Following Occupation

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10:—Available for use in evacuating American citizens from Denmark and Norway should that appear necessary, there are three United States merchant vessels at present in Norwegian waters while there are three American warships at Portugal. However, there appears to be no imminent danger, for the time being at least, as far as Americans in those countries are concerned. There has been no air bombing, according to information received here.

Five Of Eight Cruisers Enemy Had at Start of War Are Gone; Great Naval Battle Continues

Situation Is Still Tense In Southeast

PARIS, April 10:—The situation continues tense in the Balkans with nervousness in the small countries that Germany may embark upon aggression there as she has now done in Scandinavia. Seven German divisions totalling 100,000 soldiers are reported massed along the Danube River. Rome radio reports intercepted in London say that communications between Germany and Hungary have been severed.

BREMEN IS SAID SUNK

Luxury German Liner, Being Used As Troopship, Victim Of War At Sea

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—Reuters News Agency, in a report from Amsterdam which could not be immediately confirmed, said yesterday it was rumored in the Netherlands that the German liner Bremen, evidently being used as a troopship, had been sunk off the south coast of Norway with 1300 men on board. The Daily Sketch also received advice that the Bremen had been sunk. The pride of the German trans-Atlantic fleet, the Bremen was a vessel of 51,731 tons, 898 feet long.

Joseph Goebbels, German propaganda minister, in a statement at Berlin, describes as a "deliberate lie" the report of the sinking of the German luxury liner Bremen.

There was some confusion at first as to whether the 12,000 ton German tanker Posidonia had been sunk but now it is believed the Posidonia was sunk. The Posidonia's distress calls had been confused with those of the German steamship Kreta which was torpedoed but was still afloat.

The 9,000 ton German ship Amasis, Oslo-bound with coal, is reported torpedoed and sunk off the Swedish coast which her crew reached safely.

FOOD IN BRITAIN

Changed Situation In Scandinavia Affects Supply But No Ration Changes Needed

LONDON, April 10:—Rt. Hon. Leslie Burgin, minister of supply, says that, while the food supply will be affected by the occupation by Germany of Denmark and Norway, there will be no immediate change in rationing regulations. Great Britain's food stocks are in splendid shape and the Dominions as well as other countries abroad are keeping the United Kingdom well supplied.

Sea Fight Statement Coming From Churchill Tomorrow

—Winston Churchill to Tell Parliament About Fight Now On—Two German Warships Destroyed Off Norway

NEW YORK, April 10: (CP)—A London broadcast picked up by the National Broadcasting Co. quotes an "Admiralty announcement" that the British Navy has sunk five of eight cruisers Germany had at the start of the war. This report came out about the same time as the Stockholm radio announced tonight that a great sea battle was still raging outside of Swedish territorial waters near Marstrand on strategic Skagerrak. A large fleet of German transport ships was reportedly dispersed by the British Navy.

From a reliable source in London it was learned three units of the Royal Navy had forced entrance to Narvik Fjord in northern Norway and that marines were being landed. It was indicated that a British destroyer flotilla which withdrew from the fjord after an earlier engagement had returned. There was no confirmation for this report but British naval men said such action was highly feasible. In the first attack one German destroyer was sunk and three set afire, making the port extremely vulnerable to British attack. In the first encounter five British destroyers attacked a larger German force supported by land artillery. Here the Royal Navy lost two destroyers—one sunk and one driven aground. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House today that the Germans had lost not only one warship but seven auxiliary vessels carrying stores and munitions.

Statement Tomorrow
The British Parliament has been promised a statement for tomorrow by First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill on the sea battle off the Norwegian coast between the Allied and German navies. Meantime Germany claims to have inflicted severe damage on several Allied battleships. The British so far admit that two cruisers sustained minor damage when struck by splinters.

Germany officially announces the loss of two cruisers—the 10,000-ton Bleucher through running into a mine barrier after being damaged by Norwegian coastal barriers and the 6,000-ton Karlsruhe being sunk at Kristiansund by Norwegian shore guns after disembarking troops. Two British destroyers—H.M.S. Hunter and Larkspur—have been sunk at Narvik on the far north coast of Norway in an engagement with German naval and aircraft. Several German merchant vessels have also been sunk there since yesterday.

Naval action has been in progress somewhere near the Norwegian coast, evidently not far from Bergen, between the Allied and German fleets ever since yesterday, according to semi-official but authoritative quarters in London, Paris and Berlin.

German Navy Trapped
Premier Paul Reynaud told the French Senate today that German ships which penetrated Norwegian ports are now blocked there by Allied squadrons and asserted that for the duration of the war not one ton of ore would leave Narvik for the Reich. Reynaud said that one-half of the German navy had, for the first time in the war, exposed itself to the Allies and, as a result, had suffered heavily. The invasion of Scandinavia was a complete failure as far as any advantage in the war was concerned, Reynaud declared.

NO DETAILS ARE GIVEN

Actual Nature of Allied Assistance To Norway Being Kept Secret

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—Apart from saying that "powerful" naval units are at sea, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain said in the House of Commons that it was impossible to divulge what steps the Allies were taking to assist Norway in the war against Germany. The Prime Minister had said that Great Britain would extend "full aid" to Norway.

North Sea Is Being Swept

British Navy is Clearing Decks For Action With Enemy

LONDON, April 10.—To give the British Navy a free hand to deal with the enemy, the North Sea is being swept clear of shipping. Even fishing boats are being ordered into control bases.

Toronto Ties Up Stanley Cup Series

TORONTO, April 10: (CP)—The Stanley Cup series was tied up at two wins each last night when Toronto Maple Leafs defeated New York Rangers by a score of three to nil. It was the fourth game of the best out of seven series.

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EDITORIALS

STILL MORE DIFFICULT

Even if Germany holds Norway her situation in regard to supply of iron ore is not simplified. With Britain and France in command of the seas it will be impossible to convey the ore from Narvik to Germany by water and rail transportation is too slow. She must have ore to carry on the war and she cannot get the ore without a strong navy which she does not have.

MANY ADJUSTMENTS DUE

Many adjustments will be due to be made when the war is over and Germany beaten. Not only will the Polish situation have to be set right, the Czechoslovakia administration changed and now the Norwegian and Danish governments replaced. Russia may also find it difficult to hold the part of Poland she grabbed in such an underhand way. Two years from now, if the war lasts that long there will be possibly some more adjustments due.

AFTER POLICE THUGS

J. Edgar Hoover, head of the G-men of the United States, is out after the police thugs who beat up prisoners, using what are known as third degree methods to extract confessions. This Hoover declares, is not only brutal but inefficient. The records show this for only about one out of five persons taken into court is convicted. That means twenty per cent of efficiency. A good force should show at least fifty per cent efficiency.

FIGHTING AMONG SELVES

The natives of India who have been demanding self-government in that country now seem to be fighting among themselves. The extremists are fighting against the moderates. Sometimes too, the Hindus fight against the Mohammedans and only the British police can stop them, occasionally aided by the military. These are the things that make us quite sure that the British policy of refusing complete self-government to India is the correct policy.

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Naval Bases Are Not Hurt

Germany Had No Success in Its Raids on Shetland and Orkney Islands

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—German claims to the contrary notwithstanding, it is officially announced that no damage to the British fleet was done Monday when a single German plane was driven off by British planes and anti-aircraft batteries. Nor was any damage done by air raids on the Orkney Islands and Scapa Flow. Air raid alarms were sounded three times.

The series of air battles between the Allies and Germany over the North Sea and the Western Front continues with reports indicating that the Allies have been getting very much the better of it.

All Netherlands Leaves Cancelled

Holland Sees Emergency—Belgium Stays Calm in Present Situation

THE HAGUE, April 10: (CP)—The Netherlands has virtually cancelled all leaves in view of the emergency of the international situation following the extension of the war to Scandinavia. This step had last been taken on January 15 when invasion of Holland by Germany appeared likely.

Belgium remains calm and shows no official alarm, stating that it stands prepared to meet any situation.

Hon. C. D. Howe, Becomes Canadian Minister Of Munitions And Supply

OTTAWA, April 10: (CP)—Creation of a new government department of munitions and supply is announced with Hon. Clarence D. Howe as minister in charge. This will supersede the War Supply Board of which Wallace R. Campbell has been chairman. Mr. Campbell and his organization will be associated with the new department.

Mr. Howe, in addition to the new ministry, will continue as minister of transport for the time being at least.

Announcement of the establishment of the new ministry was made by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King following a cabinet council meeting last night.

Jugoslavia To Act With Italy

Speculation as to What Allies May Do To Prevent Traffic From Jugoslavia To Germany

BELGRADE, April 10: (CP)—Official quarters declare that Jugoslavia will act jointly with Italy if the Allies blockade the Adriatic or lay mines there.

There has been speculation as to what may be the next move of the Allies following the voyage of the German freighter Ankara at Trieste with 5,000 tons of bauxite from Jugoslavia carried through Jugoslav and Italian territorial waters on a test trip which the Germans hope will open up a new bloc-puncturing route for supplies. The Ankara made the first trip from Dubrovnik, Jugoslavia, to test the channel as a means of evading the Allied blockade.

Berlin Insists Intentions Good

Invasion of Denmark and Holland For "Protection" of Those Countries

BERLIN, April 10: (CP)—Germany insists that the invasion of neutral Norway and Denmark extends "armed protection to counteract British aggression" against their neutrality. This was the principal motive, it is contended here for the lightning stroke in Scandinavia.

All Leaves Called Off

LONDON, April 10:—All leaves of the British Expeditionary Force and the Royal Air Force have been cancelled until further notice.

NEW YORK, April 10.—Copper was up .03c on the New York metal market yesterday with September at 10.35c per pound.

New York Stock Market Weaker

Early Gains Yesterday Wiped Out in Later Trading

NEW YORK, April 10.—The New York stock market started strong yesterday with gains of up to five points which, however, were wiped out later with losses for the day of as much as three points. Scandinavian bonds collapsed and sterling hit the lowest mark in seven years.

The day's turnover amounted to 2,140,000 shares. The industrial average at closing was 150.31, off .98; rails, 31.42, off .54, and utilities, 25.28, off .64.
