



# INVASION

Indications Are That This May Be Plan of Nazis for Tomorrow

BERLIN, Dec. 24: (CP)-Indications were not lacking today that Germany might be planning a Christmas Day invasion of England. Preparations appear to be under way along the Channel coast.

Field Marshal von Brauchitsch, in a radio address today from a Channel base, told the German armed forces: "I know you are all burning with desire at last to meet the English and you are merely awaiting the Fuehrer's command to



"OVER THERE LIES RUMANIA AND GERMAN TROOPS"



A glance at the map will show that Odessa military district of the U.S.S.R. is only a stone's throw from newly-Nazified Rumania into which Germany has poured thousands of troops. Although Germany and the Soviet Union still live up to the letter of their trade pact, it is no accident that one of the top military men in Russia, none other than the seldom photographed deputy people's commissar of defence, Marshal S. RALSTON IN ENGLAND

LONDON-Hon, J. L. Ralston, Canadian minister of national defence, has had meetings with Prime Minister Winston Churchill, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, Secretary of home Security Sir Archibald Sinclair, First Lord of the Admiralty A. V. Alexander and Minister of Aircraft Production Lord Beaverbrook, all of whom, he said, were enthusiastic over Canada's war assistance. Col. Ralston announced that Canada in 1941 would turn out twice as many pilots as had been expected under the Commonwealth air training scheme. "The year 1941 will be one to test us all," Ralston said "but it will be one of great achievement." The same spirit of resolution to fight it out which he had found in Great Britain would, he was sure, be paralleled in Canada.

POPE'S MESSAGE

VATICAN CITY—In a Christmas message to the College of Cardinals today, Pope Pius said that such vast changes were emerging from the crucible of war that it was evident there would have to be "something new and better" after the war than there had been before. There would have to be reforms based on reason rather than on errors.

BATTLE OF BRITAIN

LONDON-A Lancashire town was heavily hit by German bombers during the night with numerous casualties and damage. London had a comparatively quiet night as did the rest of England. A bomb landed on Cloister Court of the Parliament Buildings. At Portsmouth six persons were killed and others injured when a lone Nazi raider dropped heavy calibre bombs and demolished numerous houses in one of the poorer working districts. The Royal Air Force was active during the night in the Ruhr, Saar and channel invasion bases.

ENGLAND AT BAY

AT A CHANNEL PORT- Field Marshal von Brauchitsch. German Army commander-in-chief, said today that England was completely at the mercy of Germany. The Channel would shield Great Britain only so long as it pleased Germany. All enemies in Europe had been conquered and the only task remaining was to strike to the ground the last and most bitter foe. The great and proud day of Great Britain had gone. Last Christmas von Brauchitsch recalled he had spoken under a Christmas Tree beyond the Maginot Line which it was thought would have shielded France.

ITALY TO FIGHT ON

ROME-The Italian government discounts the speech of Prime Minister Winston Churchill to the people of Italy. "Italy will continue the fight with Germany," a spokesman said "until victory is won over England which now seeks a compromise peace." King Victor Emmanuel delivered a broadcast message of encouragement and appreciation to the Army. Princess Marie Jose, wife of Crown Prince Humbert, officially joined the Fascist party.

SIEGE OF BARDIA

CAIRO- The British army of the Nile intensified the eight-day old siege of beleaguered Bardia today, bringing up more troops and pounding defence lines with artillery in preparation for an indicated final assault on the shell-battered Italian stronghold. A critical water shortage is reported to be facing Bardia and the Fascist air force suddenly has come to life in a desperate effort to save the threatened base.

But the situation of the camps. placed advisedly a considerable distance from the United States border and for the most part in rugged wilderness country, is a factor against an escape attempt

being successful. Long Way To Go

Even if prisoners manage to get miles away from the camps the chances are they will be picked up before crossing the international border and then there is always the case of Manuel Fischer. the prisoner who escaped from a northwestern Ontario camp, reached International Falls, Minn., and eventually was returned to camp

Not long ago a prisoner making a dash for it was stopped when the sentry fired one warning shot. The prisoner immediately threw up his hands and went meekly

warning shot. In the case of Ernst Neuller who was shot and killed when he attempted to rush a solitary guard some miles away from a northwestern Ontario camp, no warning shot was fired. Neuller was the enly one of 18 who escaped to date and were not rturnd to confine-

The most orthodox escape was staged by Gunther Lorentz who walked out through a timbered tunnel. Two other prisoners put a couple of planks beneath a truck. much as the story-book hoboes used to put planks across the rods under freight cars. Then they climbed aboard the planks and rode to brief freedom when the truck left the compound.

Two others attending a football game were lightly bruised by their comrades in a trench. When their mates returned to the combound the two prisoners scrambled out of their hiding places and made off, only to be recaptured by a search party.
