The Germans claimed a "major defeat" for the Allies south of Sedan but there was no admission by this of the Allies. If the Germans had formed a pocket, they had placed themselves in a position where effective action could be taken against them, the French war ministry suggested.

The German claims of victories were particularly extravagant today. They said that 12,000 French prisoners, including two generals, had been taken in the Sedan sector, that there had been an Allied retreat from Antwerp to Sedan, that Dutch islands of the Zeeland group had been captured and that there had been Nazi victories on both land and sea with one cruiser sunk and other Allied naval losses both off the Dutch and Norwegian coasts. One statement was that fifty-nine Allied aircraft had been destroyed with fifteen Germans missing.

There were German planes off the southeast coast of England last night but they were driven off before they attacked. There was also an air raid near Paris, one plane dropping high explosives; before it was driven off. Whether or not there had been damage or casualties was not immediately known.

The British government again warned that continued setbacks might be expected before the major and decisive battle was joined. It was pointed out that the Allies had made no final concerted stand as yet and that the great battle was yet to come.

"Provincial responsibility for soe should be deemed basic and general" the report set cut. "Dominion responsibility, on the other hand, should be deemed an exception to the general rule and as such should be strictly defined. But the Dominion should be given adequate jurisdiction to perform efficiently whatever responsibilities are entrusted to it."

Reviewing the devastating effects of unemployment relief on provincial and municipal finances. the commission concluded that the load "has seriously strained the credit reserves of at least eight of the nine provinces, and it would appear doubtful whether they can carry indefinitely even their present shares of relief burdens."

#### Pressure Of Reilief

The combined pressure of relief and depleted revenues "destroyed, temporarily at least," the credit of the four western prov-

"Nothing in the history of our Canadian government has contributed more to the breakdown of our system of public finance or has been productive of greater waste than the attempt to hold local governments primarily responsible for unemployment as well as other relief," the commission declared.

"Now that the economic structure of the country is fundamentally national with respect to the attainment of economic welfare and opportunities for employment, it can no longer be compartmentalized for the purpose of meeting the costs of widespread destitution and unemploymentexcept at the price of financial

chaos and enormous waste. "The extent of the unemployment in any industry or area has virtually no relation to purely local conditions. The local municipality or province can do practically nothing to ameliorate the problem nor to hasten its disappearance. Nor is the province or the municipality a convenient authority for spreading the ricks of unemployment over a term of years, by insurance methods or otherwise.

The planning of public works and developmental expenditures, an intelligent and co-ordinated use of credit, foreign exchange, trade, transportation and taxation policies are powerful instruments with which to combat unemployment and to reduce fluctuations in income. The Dominion is the only

One of the weapons used by the enemy in these war days is the "whispering campaign." It is a campaign initiated by friends of the Germans in enemy countries and is designed to make people doubt their leaders, their defenders and the righteousness of their cause. It is carried out by suggestion. It points out the defects in the British campaign, the weakness of the French, the unreliability of the Allies, the nobility of the Germans and generally carries on a quiet barrage designed to help the enemy. In Canada this is illegal at the present time and any person carrying on such a campaign is liable to be interned. According to general report, there is a lot of this going on in Prince Rupert. Hitler's friends have been busy but this sort of thing cannot be allowed to continue. There has been a great awakening to the danger of this sort of campaign in all Allied countries and steps are being taken to counteract it and to deal with offenders.


