In stead of the usual eulogy of Mr. Borah we mentioned one or two of his weaknesses but we gave about two columns of the news section dealing with his constructive qualities In spite of what Mr. Myrwang says, we still think the late senator was a menace to the United States and that his re moval by the Almighty was a sign of increasing favor t the nation.

When Canadians visit the United States they hardly know they are out of Canada except for the fact that the population is more dense and the highways much better So when Americans visit Canada they hardly look on it a a foreign country. They are still among friends. In the summer we meet thousands of American visitors and they Alexander are splendid people. They are just as good as Canadians, which is admitting a great deal. We are glad to meet them. In fact there are a number of American residents in this city and where could you find a finer lot of people? In spite of all these things we are sorry to feel bound to say that as a nation their god is the dollar, they are soft from too much wealth and inactivity and their desire to save themselves has prompted them as a nation to remain neutral when they should be fighting on the side of the Lord of Hosts against the aggressors.

In spite of all these things we must confess a great liking for the American people. Their faults are so much like our own that we can recognize them in most of our friends. 




