HOUSE OF COMMONS TAKES UP THE COAL STRIKE

BRITISH COLUMBIA DELIVERED TO RAILROAD CORPORATIONS, CHARGES SIR CHARLES H. TUPPER

Noted Conservative Leader, in Just Indignation, Severely Excoriates Legislative Acts of Province That Give Away Lands and Rights of the People to the Trio-Headed Octopus That Controls the Govt.

(From the Vancouver Sun.)
No keener criticism of the provincial government has yet been uttered than that by Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, who has in the subjoined interview made a statement to the Sun which should be of interest to every thoughtful citizen who takes any interest in public affairs.
The analysis of the railway agreement is especially valuable, though the criticism of the general financial policy of the government is no less sharp.
Speaking with respect to the railway legislation of 1910, Sir C. H. Tupper said:
"There is nothing in the history of corporations, colonies or nations where relatively such expenditures and liabilities have been incurred. We all rejoice in the prosperous condition of British Columbia, and believing in its potentialities, desire a progressive policy.
"While concurring with those who are ready to mortgage our future to a reasonable extent, it appears to me greatly to be deplored that with a sparsely settled country, situated as we are, with an imperial tract to administer, there exists generally such a spirit of reckless speculation. To such an extent is this spirit rampant that any proposed ex-

penditure for hastening railway development will be overwhelmingly approved by the electors. This regardless of the results involved.
"We must not overlook the fact that the majority of the voters are practically exempt from the prevailing system of provincial taxation, and under these circumstances a bold and reckless and unprincipled government has the opportunity to squander public money, waste our resources and involve us in titanic burdens. The argument I observed used for the buccaneering policy in the last general election in British Columbia, when the government was in the hands of one railway corporation. It was that we had the money and the resources to warrant the liability then involved, and if one believed in a prosperous future for the province there was no risk. We had a government which was able to do things. The same argument is put in service for additional outlay and additional guarantees.
"When the government is now in the hands of three railway corporations, those of a religious spirit who are not carried off their feet by visions of millions of money, reduced freight rates and all sorts of philanthropic

works to be done for British Columbia by the railway corporations, should thank Heaven that under the circumstances the railways for the time being have been comparatively merciful in their exactions.
"At a time when railways are so successful in the money market it is an extreme statement that no better terms could have been made, or a more reasonable policy devised.
"Party government has long ceased to exist in British Columbia. For instance, with its inception there was the avowal of the principle of government ownership of railways in British Columbia. We are now in the hands of a government owned by railway corporations.
"Any mountebank who succeeded by the influence of party or otherwise in gaining office could well do all that is being done for the railway kings. It needs but to do their bidding and retain power until the deluge comes. If matters under the act of 1910 become troublesome he can bring on another election and promise increased expenditures before exposure comes and be re-elected. Does any one suppose Laurier could have been beaten in September if the G. T. P., C. P. R. and C. N. R. had unitedly supported him?"

Wreck of U.S. Fishing Schooner "Patrician" of N.S. Coast Results in Loss With All Hands.

Shelburne, N.S., March 18.—Ten men were drowned when the American fishing schooner Patrician was wrecked on Bull Rock, two miles off Jordan Bay, near Shelburne. They are the captain William Harding and nine members of the crew of the Patrician. Their fate was told by the survivors of the schooner when early today they reported the Jordan lost.

COAL STRIKE COMES BEFORE HOUSE OF COMMONS TOMORROW

PREMIER ASQUITH ANNOUNCES THE GOVERNMENT MINIMUM WAGE BILL—STRONG OPPOSITION TO MEASURE EXPECTED—TALK OF GENERAL STRIKE MAY 1ST.

(Special to Daily News.)
London, March 18.—Premier Asquith announced today in the Commons that the minimum wage bill will come up tomorrow, with second and third readings the following days. It is likely the government will have a strong opposition to the passage of the measure.
Many of the British miners signify their intention of returning to work this week, despite their leaders. The association's loss to trade union funds, outside of the miners' association, was last week over a million and a half dollars.

More railways have curtailed their services today and hundreds more men are thrown out of employment. The talk now is of a general strike of all trades in May, when the unions meet in joint conference.
Miners Strike in France.
Paris, March 18.—Many of the miners of the Denain district have voted to strike despite the decision against a walkout by the federation. The union officials are attempting to prevent a spread of the movement, but seem to be unsuccessful.

MONKEY SCRAMBLE NOW

Latest Ballroom Menagerie Sensation Invented in Gay Paree.
Paris ballrooms have a fresh sensation to follow the "turkey trot" and the "grizzly bear" dances—the "monkey scramble." This dance opens with the two-step played very fast, then changes to the lancers. At a given signal the music stops and the ladies join hands in a circle with all their partners inside.
The men go down on hands and knees and scramble out of the ring as best they can. Once outside they run to the other end of the room to a tall Christmas tree, on top of which is a hollow cocoon containing a pretty trinket.

DAILY NEWS AGAIN SENDS GOOD NEWS INTO THE EAST

EXCELLENT "WEATHER BOOST" FOR PRINCE RUPERT APPEARS IN AN ONTARIO PAPER, WHICH QUOTES FROM "TWENTY MINUTES AGO."

"Summer time at Prince Rupert" is the heading in the Windsor Weekly Record over the following first rate weather boost for the city. The Record says:
"In the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway's terminus on February 1st the thermometer registered just 64 degrees in the shade and it is stated that there have been only two inches of snow there during the entire winter, while the temperature has only been below zero during a single week.
"The Daily News under a heading "Prince Rupert Twenty Minutes Ago" puts the matter very trenchantly: "Thermometer in sunshine registered 66 degrees, still rising. Big sacrifice sale of slickers and overshoes."
"From this it is very evident that all construction work, or indeed work of any kind, can be carried on throughout the entire year in this summer climate."
The conclusion come to by the Windsor Weekly Record that work of all kinds can be carried on in

Prince Rupert during the entire winter season is of course quite correct. As residents in Rupert know, work on the Acropolis Hill reservoir and pipe trench, building work, railway construction work and a very considerable amount of concrete and cement work have all been carried on without interruption during the winter. The progress of the government wharf was not hindered by weather.
In referring to Prince Rupert's as a "summer climate" the Record is right. Since the end of January the atmosphere has been more summery than in many an advertised summer resort. The other night, after weeks of superb sunny weather, there was a sharp little fall of hail. A few clouds crept up and citizens wondered if the vanished winter were on the way at last. But today we have still the unclouded sunshine and spring-like air. Morning rime is the only indication of winter at all appreciable in Prince Rupert at present.

WEST INDIES' RECIPROCITY

Strong Protest Against the Measure Entered in New York—Merchants Fear Loss of Trade for Canada's Benefit.
Declaring that the enactment of the proposed reciprocal trade agreement between Canada and the British West Indian Islands will work havoc with important lines of American business, a special committee of the New York Produce Exchange has urged the State department at Washington to take immediate action.
Flour, the chief commodity in which the produce exchange is interested, has aroused the members of the West Indies trade. The proposal, it is said provides for admitting Canadian flour into the West Indies at a preference of 24 cents a barrel. Such a step, it is declared, would raise a barrier the American miller could not surmount. The loss of business in this community also would be several millions of dollars a year it is said.

Winston Churchill Admits That It Is Real.

London, March 18.—Winston Churchill, in presenting the naval estimates today, said he was sorry to refer direct to Germany, but was compelled to do so. Britain would keep up her power standards at whatever cost, and unless Germany retarded her program Britain would go on constructing.

FEAR U. S. A. IS TAPPING LAKES

Port Arthur Board of Trade Protests Against Widening of Chicago Drainage Canal Lest Level of Lakes Be Lowered.
The reported enlargement of the Chicago drainage canal caused the board of trade of Port Arthur to petition the government asking that immediate steps be taken to protect Canadian interests on the Great Lakes as they fear that any further diversion of water by Chicago will ultimately have the effect of lowering the waters of Lake Superior and thereby rendering useless many of the existing channels and necessitating a great deal of dredging being done at the docks. The Port Arthur Board of Trade has taken the initiative in securing the co-operation of all the other cities on the Canadian side of the lakes in a combined request to the government for immediate action to protect Canadian vested rights.

MERRY WEDDING IN K. OF P. HALL

Young Scandinavian Couple United by Swedish Pastor on Saturday with All Wedding Honors and Festivities.
A pretty wedding was solemnized by the pastor of the Swedish worshippers in Prince Rupert on Saturday night in the K. of P. Hall. Bride and bridegroom were both Scandinavians, and well known in Prince Rupert. The bride was Miss Mina Norman and the groom Nels Oman.
About sixty guests were present and made merry at the wedding. There was music supplied effectively by Prof. Kauffman, and dancing was kept up merrily during the evening. The wedding cake and refreshments served were of the finest, and altogether a real good time was spent. JUST A FEW CONUNDRUMS FOR M'BRIDE RINGSTERS.

You will perhaps have noticed how the organ of excuse of the misrepresentation of the Skeena district, otherwise called the Trombone, evaded any discussion of that part of the Liberal platform which directly refers to the betterment of conditions for the workmen, how it drops the alleged defense of the alleged sandbagger to rush to the defense of Captain McCoskrie and scorch the settlers of Porcher Island for their impertinence in daring to get out a petition in defense of their rights, and the rest of the ring excuses. Another dose of the Liberal platform might prove salutary to the gasping patient under treatment; its wheezy excuses may at least prove interesting. The dose is in little tabloids so as to be easy for the troubled political stomach.

Under the head of Public Accounts you will find in the Liberal platform these inspiring words:

We denounce the McBride government for withholding year after year the public accounts from examination by the public accounts committee.

We advocate the organization of an auditor general's department independent of the government.

Now why has the McBride government permitted only one session of the Public Accounts committee in seven years?

As that committee is the only safeguard for the proper expenditure of the people's money, are the people not entitled to a report from it?

Why are the people held in ignorance of the real expenditures?

Why is the McBride government afraid to have this committee of their own members report on their own work?

During the past seven years millions upon millions have been expended, with wisdom or with careless extravagance. Were not the people given the right to know where all this money went to and what for when the committee was appointed?

If you were conducting a private enterprise would you not demand a checking up occasionally, and see that you got it?

Why have the people not received an accounting of the expenditure of their money, and also of the revenues coming in?

Is the McBride government crooked?

Premier McBride ran British Columbia into an election two years ago last November. He got all the seats but one or two. Now he is going to have another election. It looks like a habit. There is surely no need for an election, although his eagerness to spend unheard of sums of money does give a handy excuse.—Montreal Herald.

A new morning newspaper, in opposition to the organ of the ring, is to make its appearance tomorrow morning. It is to be antagonistic in every way, even to its title. Reasons Why Wm. Manson Must be Defeated

1. The growth and prosperity of Prince Rupert is being hampered and retarded by the attitude of the McBride government in direct opposition, in order to serve the interests of the rival port of Vancouver.
2. That Prince Rupert can raise no voice of protest so long as she is represented in the legislature by the silent and obsequious William Manson.
3. That the said Silent William did once or twice gently puff in mere explanation of what this city was seeking from the legislature, but never sufficiently loud to wake up any other member of McBride's huge majority.
4. That even on Prince Rupert matters he always voted with the government.
5. That when a respectful petition was sent to him asking when the government wharf would be completed he never brought the matter before the house at all, and that this matter was brought directly before the house by the Liberal representative of another constituency, H. C. Brewster.
6. That with an able and energetic Liberal from Prince Rupert in the house, such as is Mr. Alex. M. Manson, the Liberal nominee, this city might shame the monopolists of political representation into giving at least a certain measure of justice.
7. That the Silent William never brought before the house the subject of the sale of government lots in Prince Rupert, but in default gives us his interpretation of what the premier is alleged to have said, namely, that the government was in the real estate business good and hard and as it had passed laws exempting taxation on these lots it could hold them without expense until the people had made them enormously valuable, and the people could go to.
8. That the Silent William is alleged to have presented a petition from the people of the city for a government wagon road around Kaien Island, and that as an ante-election statement he is now promising the road will be built, but he whispers in an aside that he does not know the amount of the appropriation.
9. That these are the things the Silent One claims to have attempted to do in the interests of this city.
10. That what he ought to have done and which he didn't even try to do would take from now until election day to enumerate.

FAST IN THE ICE

Two Steamers Stuck Off North Sydney Harbor.

(Special to Daily News.)
Sydney, March 16.—The government steamer Stanley and the steamer Bruce are fast in thirty feet of ice off North Sydney Harbor. Unless the wind veers they will be there for some time. The Bruce has already been in the ice for eight days.

AMERICAN EXODUS

Settlers Leaving States for This Side in Great Numbers.

Ottawa, March 12.—Immigration authorities report a greater rush than ever before of American settlers into Western Canada. They report that the number of settlers now heading for the three prairie provinces is from 10 to 50 per cent. greater than last year. American immigration to Canada last year totalled 130,000. This year it will probably reach 150,000. Immigration from the British Isles is being retarded by the coal strike.

FOUR DREADNOUGHTS

Naval Budget Calls for Over Two Hundred Millions.

London, March 12.—The British naval estimates, made public in the House of Commons today, provide for four Dreadnoughts, eight cruisers, twenty destroyers and a number of submarines.

The naval budget carries an appropriation of \$220,427,000; a decrease of \$1,535,000 from that of last year. The reformers expected a decrease of from \$5,000,000 to \$7,000,000.

Home Secretary Churchill stated that the budget was prepared with the expectation that other powers would construct more battleships than they had already ordered.

Welterweight Championship.

St. Louis, March 11.—Harry Brewer of Kansas City and Ray Bronson of Indianapolis have been matched to fight eight rounds before the St. Louis Athletic Club on April 17th for the welterweight championship.

"White Hope" of France. France has a "white hope" in Georges Carpentier, the 18-year-old boy who knocked out Jim Sullivan, middleweight champion of England, in two rounds at Monte Carlo last week. Despatches described the "great enthusiasm" that prevailed at the ringside and told of predictions freely made that Carpentier is the "coming heavyweight champion" of the world.

To the Electors of Prince Rupert:

I had intended at first to retire in the event of a Liberal being nominated, but the dissatisfaction against the ring rule within the Conservative party is so widespread that I think it only right that those Conservatives who cannot conscientiously endorse the candidature of William Manson should still have the privilege of voting Conservative, and I will therefore remain in the field.

I have no quarrel with the McBride government and will loyally support it, but I have a strong objection to the great Conservative party being made the tool of a petty clique who use it merely for their own selfish ends.

Do not allow the ring to persuade you that Mr. Manson is the only man whom the government will recognize. We saw how Mr. Manson stood with the government when a deputation was sent to Victoria to press his claims for a cabinet portfolio. They would have none of him and they had tried him before. Platform of the Liberals of British Columbia

Adopted at the Vancouver Convention, March 1st, 1912

1. Free Lands for Settlers—None for Speculators.

We emphatically condemn the McBride government for its connivance at the evasion of the land laws by persons, syndicates and corporations, who have been allowed to obtain millions of acres of the choicest accessible public lands, which are held without use and to the detriment of the province as a whole.

We hold that agricultural land should be disposed of only on such conditions as will ensure its continuous use and occupation.

Free homesteads to actual settlers. Holders of pre-emptions to be given benefit of this provision.

Advances to settlers on easy terms to assist in land clearing, dyking, irrigation and other permanent improvements.

Surveys of all accessible agricultural lands to be rapidly completed, and survey sheets and all necessary information to be made easily available to the public.

Settlement in block to be encouraged by the removal of reserves, which scatter population and greatly increase the cost of roads, schools and other necessary facilities.

2. Transportation.

The immediate construction of a railway to Peace River. We will co-operate with the Dominion government in securing air-rail connection between the railway systems of Vancouver Island and the railway systems of the mainland.

The construction of a line owned by the government to give direct communication, by the best route as to grades and distances, between the Similkameen and other interior points and the coast.

We favor the husbanding of the Provincial credit and resources not to be wasted in paralleling existing lines.

No land subvention to railways beyond what is necessary for railway purposes.

Abolition of the system of giving away Crown lands for town-sites free of taxation and under railway control.

Aid to railways not to exceed what is reasonably necessary to secure construction.

The prevention of over-capitalization of railways.

The Province to co-operate with the Dominion in aiding railway and highway construction.

All franchises for the construction, operation and ownership or leasing of government-aided roads to be open for public competition.

Freight, passenger and express rates and telegraph tolls of all government-aided roads to be under the jurisdiction of the Dominion Railway Commission.

With a view to meeting the demand for the transportation of grain from Saskatchewan and Alberta, the immediate construction of government-owned elevators.

manual and agricultural training, and the establishment of an efficient system of technical schools.

The present school system bears unjustly on settlers in unorganized districts, and should be immediately remedied.

We favor personal registration and insist on immediate redistribution.

We favor woman suffrage.

Abolition of the poll tax and personal property tax and the raising of the exemption of income limit to \$2,000.

Exemption of improvements on all lands paying taxes to the Provincial government.

A readjustment of the system of taxation whereby the Province may receive a fairer proportion of the unearned increment.

Immediate reform of the present costly, cumbersome and inequitable system of collecting school taxes in unorganized districts.

A Provincial department of labor to be created, and a free government labor bureau established.

Thorough and frequent inspection of all industrial premises to ensure health, sanitation and safety.

The complete prohibition of child labor in factories and shops.

The present system of employers' liability insurance bears heavily upon employers, and is a frequent source of injustice to workmen and their families.

We advocate the establishment by the government of a permanent industrial insurance commission, independent of politics.

This commission to have full charge of a system providing positive compensation to employees for injury received during employment, without recourse to litigation, and giving employers the benefit of accident insurance at minimum cost.

The extension of the scope of the Workmen's Compensation Act, so as to cover all hazardous employments.

The payment of wages should be made at least fortnightly.

We unhesitatingly condemn the hypocrisy of the Provincial government as evidenced by its refusal to re-enact its own remedy—the Natal Act—on the ground that it would embarrass the Conservative Dominion government.

We stand for a "White British Columbia," and advocate continuously increasing stringency in immigration laws until this result is attained.

The Liberals of British Columbia are in favor of the total exclusion of Orientals from the Province.

15. Protection of Water Supply.

We condemn the shortsighted policy of the Provincial government in alienating the timber lands on watersheds tributary to cities, towns and municipalities.

It should be the immediate duty of the government to remedy the mischief caused by this mistaken policy.

The government's policy as to revision of the voters' lists and precipitating the present election without a proper redistribution of constituencies is a complete subversion of all the privileges of representative government.

We favor the organization of a civil service commission for both inside and outside services.

Appointments to the civil service should be based on fitness, and not on partisan service.

Uncle Sam's Pension Army. Since the close of the war four thousand million dollars have been paid out in pensions to the veterans and those dependent on them.

The pension appropriation last year—forty-seven years after Lee's surrender—was \$150,000,000, and in the 435 congressional districts the pensioners average 2,500 per district.

This veteran vote is so large that the two parties openly bid against each other for it, and a measure is now before Congress to make a dollar a day the regular old age pension for veterans.

If it carries \$75,000,000 a year will be added to the already enormous cost of the burden.—Toronto Globe.

AMUNDSEN'S DASH TO POLE

Explorer Tells of Manner in Which He Forced His Way Over Ice Fields.

BUT FOUR MEN WITH HIM

Took Fifty-two Dogs, Four Sleds and Provisions to Last Four Months.

London, March 12.—Scientific men here today are agreed, after reading Captain Roald Amundsen's graphic account of his discovery of the South Pole, that there will be no need for professional men to work out his observations, except for the purpose of making minor corrections.

In the first portion of his detailed account of the Polar dash Captain Amundsen tells the story tersely and interestingly.

The journey for the Pole, Amundsen says, was started from his base February 10, 1911. Before April 11 he had stored about 6,600 pounds of provisions in depots placed at 80 degrees, 81 degrees and 82 degrees.

The depots were marked by flags placed 4-13 miles to the east and west. The sun disappeared April 22 and the winter months were spent in changing equipment.

The real dash, however, was started October 20, but four men accompanying the explorer. They traveled from 20 to 30 kilometers each day. Then they took four sleds and 52 dogs, with food supplies for four months.

Snow pillars were made to guide them on the return journey. The party made 81 degrees south on October 31. Another degree was covered by November 5.

On November 11 Captain Amundsen says he discovered that the Ross barrier terminated at 86 degrees south, 163 degrees west. The 86th parallel was reached November 17.

Here a land and ice barrier connected, with summits 15,000 feet high. It required three days for the party to climb 5,000 feet.

On the other side of the barriers the party encountered terrific gales. December 8 the party had reached 88 degrees, sixteen miles south. From here the party had a downhill haul, reaching 88 degrees 30 minutes on December 9; 89.30 on the 12th and 89.45 on the 13th.

These points were established by observations and dead reckoning, and by the same methods the next and last 15 minutes of the journey was measured, bringing the party within the vicinity of the South Pole on December 14.

The temperature was 41 degrees below zero. When Amundsen calculated that the pole was reached a flag was planted, the explorer naming the plateau for King Haakon VII.

Captain Amundsen then took observations for three days and the return was begun on December 17. Winter quarters at Framheim were reached January 25.

NEW GREAT NORTHERN LINE Winnipeg to Port Nelson on Hudson's Bay—Grain Port.

It has been definitely made known in New York financial circles that the Great Northern, recognizing the importance of the Hudson Bay as an outlet to the grain men of the world, will build a line from Winnipeg and Port Nelson.

NEW MARINE MOTOR TESTED

British Admiralty Interested in Performance of Vessel Propelled by Explosion of Heavy Oil and Air in Cylinder.

The Daily Mail special correspondent on board the motor ship Selandia, on her run from London to Antwerp, described the performance, saying:

"There can be no question regarding the interest the British Admiralty is taking in this latest development of marine propulsion, for Engineer in Chief Vice Admiral Sir Henry Oram made the trip to Antwerp as a sequel to First Lord Churchill's visit to the vessel while she lay in the West India dock at London. Several famous steamship lines also had experts on board.

"There was a stiff southwesterly breeze when the Selandia manoeuvred out of the docks and into the river. The way she twisted her way through the traffic and windings of the Thames was a revelation in handiness.

"I could take her through the eye of a needle," said the river pilot. On Saturday night the wind freshened to half a gale but there was little movement and vibration was practically absent.

"It was in the engine room that the experts gathered. There are sixteen cylinders, eight on a side, absorbing and exploding a mixture of heavy oil and air. There is no bustle of greasers there and firemen for furnaces and boilers do not exist in the Selandia. In the great maze of machinery it is quite cool.

WINDSOR HOTEL CASE UP TODAY

Further Adjournment Necessary - Witness McLean Has Not Reached Rupert Yet - Mayor Newton Attends Again.

No evidence was taken this morning in the Windsor Hotel case. The witness McLean, whose testimony is relied on by the prosecution to carry weight, as he was resident in the Windsor for a considerable time continuously about the time at which the offense charged is said to have taken place, has not yet been able to reach Rupert from up river. The Mayor this morning held a private conference at the police court on this case in his capacity as chairman of the License Commission.

Asquith's Majority.
The Asquith ministry should still have a majority of 114, counting Nationalists, Independent Home Rulers and labor members with the government. The general election of December, 1910, returned 272 Liberals, 84 Nationalists, 42 Labor and 27 Conservatives. Six seats have since been gained by the Conservatives, so that the representation is now 266 Liberals, 84 Nationalists (of whom eight are independent), 42 Labor and 278 Conservatives.

HAPPY HOUSE WARMING
Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Unwin Entertain in Newly Built Residence.

A bright and most successful house warming party was held the other night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Unwin at their newly built residence on Summit avenue. About twenty friends were present and a pleasant time was spent with music, games and conversation. It will be remembered that Mr. and Mrs. Unwin, soon after their wedding, had their pretty little home destroyed by fire.
