CAUSE FOR CONFIDENCE

British Critic Surveys Reasons For Nation's Faith

LONDON, March 23: (CP)—Records of British army chiefs throw much light on reasons for British military confidence, says Major-General Sir Charles Gwynn. The distinguished teacher and writer recalls that such men as Wolsey, Roberts and Kitchener were known by name to the nation at the start of the First Great War but adds: "British generals in this war have not had the same opportunities of catching the public eye."

Then in his weekly letter, "What The War Means," the General sketches the records of the present high command, including Sir Edmund Ironside, chief of the general staff; Viscount Gort, commander-in-chief of the British forces in France; General Sir John Dill; Lt. General A. F. Brooke and Lt. General Sir Ronald Adam, corps commanders.

Aberhart Government Appears Returned In Alberta Although Outcome Is Not Certain As Yet

EDMONTON, March 23: (CP)—The Social Credit government of Premier William Aberhart in Alberta has evidently been returned to power but with a much stronger opposition consisting of the Liberal and Conservative fusion under the Independent title. Figures as available up to early today showed the trend of results as follows:

Social Credit, 32. Independent, 23. Labor, 1. C. C. F., 1.

Prospects are, however, that the actual make-up of the next Legislature may not be known until after the federal election as only twenty-seven of the fifty-seven seats have been so far definitely decided, seventeen going Social Credit, ten Independent, the amalgamation of Liberal, Conservative and Unity movements, Social Credit was leading in fifteen other seats, Independent in thirteen, C. War News

SEA LOSSES HEAVY LONDON—In intensive attacks on shipping by Nazi bombing planes and submarines thirteen vessels, mostly neutrals, were sunk with loss of life estimated at seventy-nine in addition to some twenty missing. This was within a period of seventy-two hours. The Danish were the worst sufferers with Great Britain and Norway also losing vessels, some of which were torpedoed without warning.

RUSSIA TAKES OVER HELSINKI—At midnight last night Finland formally turned over the strategic Hanko Peninsula to Russia under terms of the recent peace treaty.

BRITISH PLANE DOWN BERLIN—Two German fighting planes shot down a British plane in a dog fight so close to the Dutch frontier that the British machine fell in flames in Dutch territory. Both occupants were killed. Nazi planes attempted to bomb Cramer lightship off the Norfolk coast but are believed to have been driven off.

REYNAUD HOLDS ON PARIS—There is doubt if the new "total war" of Premier Paul Reynaud can long remain in office owing to its widely divergent elements of political feeling. On a critical vote in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday the government had a majority of but one vote when abstentions were taken into account, the actual vote being 268 to 156 with 111 abstaining. With Chamber of Deputies adjourned until April 2 and Senate

Sir Arthur St. Arthur, candidate in Red Deer, came to Canada 37 Years Ago

RED DEER, Alta., March 23: (CP)—Sir Arthur St. Arthur, National Government candidate for Red Deer in the Dominion election March 26, holds a baronetcy that dates back to the reign of Charles I. He is the 17th holder of the title. A native of England, he became Sir Arthur in December, 1937, on the death of a cousin. The old family manor is Radley College in Berkshire.

Sir Arthur came to Canada in 1903 when he was 18 years old, took a course at the New Brunswick Agricultural College and came west to farm near Lacombe, Alta. Although he left Alberta for a number of years to pursue a mining venture in Mexico, he returned 17 years ago and since then has farmed at Pine Lake, 15 miles southeast of Red Deer.

This is not his first venture into politics. In 1935 he ran as a Conservative in the Innisfail provincial riding. That was the year Social Credit swept the Alberta political field. Sir Arthur, who was plain Mr. St. Arthur, then, received only 318 votes of the approximate 4,000 cast in the riding. He is married and has one son and three daughters. His son, Philip Allan, is a student at Queens University. The daughters, Geraldine, Margaret and Marjorie Kathleen, live at home.

# EDITORIALS

### EASTERTIDE

Tomorrow is the day on which Christians celebrate the resurrection of Christ. It is the most joyous of all the church festivals. Formerly it was a festival celebrating the return of spring and named after the goddess of spring, Eostre. The resurrection of the plants following the winter when growth ceases is symbolic of the resurrection of the body in which most Christians believe. It is a happy thought that at some future time all will reassemble in a purified form in a state in which the frailties of this life will have been left behind.

### THEY LIKE PRISON

There are in Holloway Gaol, London, about one hundred interned German women. Some of these women have been given the opportunity of returning to their own country but they prefer gaol in England where food is plentiful and they are very well treated. This is in sharp contrast to English women in German prisons or camps. Complaints of terrible treatment for some of them comes to hand, indicating great brutality at the hands of the German Gestapo.

### STILL IN CABINET

Premier Edouard Daladier is still a member of the French cabinet as minister of defence. That means no appreciable change in France's war policy, except possibly more active aggression than heretofore. It was an expression of opinion from the Chamber of Deputies that they will stand for no policy that is not aggressive. It must be real war and not just sitting back and waiting for the enemy to come. Similar expressions have been given in England.

## Today in Sports

### PR. RUPERT WON AGAIN OVER FALLS

Makes It Two Straight In District Hoop Final With Fifty Point Lead—High School Captures Intermediate Cup

Standard Oilers of Prince Rupert defeated Ocean Falls at the Armory here Thursday night by a score of 63 to 32 in the second game of the Northern British Columbia basketball championship four-game final series. Thus the locals won the first two games straight with an aggregate score on the pair of 125 to 75. The fifty-point surplus puts the Oilers in a very commanding position for the final two games to be played later at Ocean Falls.

In the final for Intermediate championship and the Grotto Cup Thursday night, Booth Memorial High School defeated Ben's News Stand by a score of 33 to 32 in a real thriller which was far more exciting than the Senior inter-town contest. During the intermission between senior and intermediate games, Bert Morgan made presentation of the cup which was received by Captain Helge Holkestad for High School.

#### Rupert vs. Falls

The Oilers built up a strong lead from the outset in Thursday night's game. Before Ocean Falls was able to make a single point, Sonny Beynon, Herbie Morgan and Angus MacPhee between them had made twelve points for the locals on five field baskets and two personal throws. There were flashes of pretty passing play between Ray Burgess, Kazu Nakamoto and Ron Foote but they were effectively kept from scoring by the heavy local defenders. Half time score was 26 to 8 for Prince Rupert. During the latter part of the first half, the mainspring of the Ocean Falls team, Ray Burgess, suffered what seemed to be a sprained ankle but he was able to return for the second half.

The second half was largely a repetition of the first with the bigger locals having no difficulty in keeping the play largely in their control and scoring effectively. The visitors tried gamely all the way, however, and did their best to make things interesting. For Prince Rupert, MacPhee and Beynon vied for scoring honors. Herbie Morgan was himself again. Don Arney, besides being a stout

guard, was responsible for seven points, snaring two or three spectacular field baskets from long range. MacPhee was the bad boy for the locals, being banished for personals not long before the end of the game.

Burgess and Nakamoto starred for Ocean Falls, the latter breaking through to score some pretty baskets from hard angles during the latter half. Just before the end of the first half, Foote was sent off for personals.

Ideas from America but for the pattern of institutions and organization they had gone to Great Britain with its principles of personal liberty. To build up a country in such a short time, dictatorship was virtually necessary. It was brave and clever what the Letts were doing in creating such a beautiful state in so short a space of twenty years.

In Estonia was a different type of people—possibly the most fascinating of all in the Baltic States. They were less austere and gayer and they looked towards Paris. They were not afraid of Russia because of its inefficiency but they were in deadly terror of the Germans. Mrs. Watt told of Tallin, a beautiful city, distinctively northern, reminiscent of Peter the Great with heavy architecture having a Moorish touch.

In Finland Mrs. Watt went on to a description of Finland which she had visited after a flight from Tallin to Helsinki. There had seemed to be a close connection between Finland and the Scandinavian countries. In view of this Finns, while there was talk of it, would not acknowledge the possibility of war with Russia.

Meals in Finland were extraordinarily good and extensive too. There was nothing outside of Denmark that could compare with them. The farmhouses were the homes of cultured people. It was amazing what the Finnish women had time to accomplish. They were also organized to back up the fighting men.

Mrs. Watt alluded to the tendency of the Finns to poke fun at the Russians owing to their inefficiency and ineptitude. As for the Germans, Finns were appreciative of assistance they had received

Littler, manager of the Stewart branch of the Bank of Montreal, and Mrs. Littler and family arrived in the city on the Prince George Thursday evening from the north and sailed on the Princess Louise last night for Vancouver enroute to Montreal and other points in the East where they will spend a vacation.

We wish to deny the rumor that has been maliciously spread around town that a person, to obtain work at the Dry Dock, has to have a letter from Liberal Headquarters. We have in no way interfered with the hiring of men there.

On Scandinavia Moving on to Sweden, Mrs. Watt said she gathered the idea that Swedes, Norwegians, Finns and Danes would always stand together. They had much in common in language, ideals and customs and all had had to fight for their independence. Sweden was not so democratic as Finland. Swedes were a ceremonial people—strong on etiquette. There had been a great many classes in Sweden but it was to be gathered that this class distinction was breaking down.

Turning to Norway, Mrs. Watt said Norwegians had been pro-Germans in the last war but they had not approved of the Hitler regime. They were a highly educated people. One was amazed to find among a gathering of women fifty who had graduated from university over fifty years ago. The speaker knew nothing like that in any other country.

Mrs. Watt drew from the Baltic and Scandinavian nations an example of how mixed populations had worked together and learned to co-operate in building up their countries. It was something that might be emulated in Canada. Original cultures and traditions of the people who came to Canada might be retained for the benefit of the Dominion at the same time as real Canadian spirit and culture were built up.

Tribute To Speaker Mrs. Fraser, in her opening remarks, expressed the pleasure it was to have Mrs. Watt as guest speaker. She mentioned the high honors that had been conferred upon her not only by the British but by the French and Belgian governments in recognition of her work on behalf of women.

Miss Lillian Halliwell presided at the piano to accompany "O Canada" at the opening and "God Save the King" at the closing of the meeting.

New Deputy is Popular Choice—Reduction Plants Close With Herring Fishing Over

The appointment of Dr. D. B. Finn to the post of Deputy Minister of Fisheries should meet with the universal approval of the fishing industry, says Canadian Fisherman in its feature article for March. Since the retirement of Dr. W. A. Found, the appointment of a successor has been the subject of controversy among various sections of the fish trade. The Pacific Coast urged that the new deputy be a British Columbian, or some person with an intimate knowledge of Pacific Coast conditions. Down in the Maritimes, the demand was for a deputy who knew something of the industry on the Atlantic seaboard. All were united in blocking the appointment of a political job-seeker, or a lawyer, or any outsider whose intimacy with fisheries was perfunctory. In Dr. Finn, a happy combination of all the desired requirements is to be found. He is a young man—40 years old—which gives him a sufficient length of time ahead of him to study the problems of the industry from an administrative point of view and to build up a career of real service in promoting the welfare of the commercial fisheries in years to come. In education and training he is well-equipped for the responsibilities which he will assume. A scientist primarily, nevertheless his work has been closely identified with problems of commercial fisheries and he is intimate with freezing, salting, smoking and canning processes. And since the scientific side of fisheries development and conservation is playing a more important part than ever before in successful and intelligent government administration, the new deputy is well-equipped in that respect. In addition, his personality is one that inspires friendship and confidence, and he should prove a popular official. The choice of Dr. Finn in the selection for Deputy Minister of Fisheries is one based on merit and fitness and is free from any political complexion. He should make a well-informed and considerate official, young enough to have the desire to make a success of the job. He has a difficult task ahead of him, but he can be assured of the fullest measure of co-operation from all sections of the industry.
