## BELGIUM DIPLIANT

BRUSSELS, April 17.—The Belgian foreign minister declared yesterday that Belgium is determined to maintain its neutrality and will fight should its independence be threatened. It is pointed out that Belgium has so far been faithful to its obligations to Great Britain and Germany as well as to France.

## MORE MEN CALLED UP

Twenty-Seven Year Old Britons To Register May 25, Making Total Of 2,750,000 Under Arms

LONDON, April 17: (CP)—Twenty-seven year old Britons have been ordered to register May 25 under the conscription program. This will bring another 850,000 men to the colors. Twenty-six year olds will be called up April 27 to register. Twenty-five year olds are called up April 6. By June 1 it is estimated that Great Britain will have 2,750,000 men under arms in addition to which there will be another 500,000 from the Dominions. Already 1,700,000 men have been mobilized by registration under the conscription program while 1,000,000 have volunteered.

## Oslo, Rendered Impotent By Nazi Ruse, Resigned But Not Happy Under New German Rule

OSLO, April 17.—It is revealed now that occupation of Oslo last week by the Germans was facilitated to large extent by the ruse of giving widespread dissemination to a rumor that the Norwegian government had ordered evacuation of the city to the Nazis.

Now firmly under the Nazi regime, the people of Oslo are a resigned but sorrowful people. The press has been brought, like the Oslo radio station, under German control. The pride of the city, the new \$5,000,000 City Hall, has been turned into a barracks for Nazi soldiers and the National Theatre and Parliament Buildings are being used for a similar purpose. The provisional government of major Vidkun Quisling, having accomplished its task of disarming and immobilizing the Norwegians, has been replaced by a new Nazi puppet government headed by Ingvald Christiansen. Direct communications between Oslo and New York have been reopened.

## Give Timber To Germany

BUCHAREST, Roumania. April 17: (CP)—The Roumanian Senate today provisionally accepted a government bill to give Germany a thirty-year lease on almost 100,000 acres of timber despite the testimony of Army officers that the lease would jeopardize national defence.

## ROUMANIA IS READY

Russian Troops Massing And Naval Concentration Being Watched By Bucharest

BUCHAREST, April 17: (CP)—With the threat of massing Soviet troops near the frontier and concentration of naval units in the Black Sea, the Roumanian government is taking extraordinary military measures to guard its neutrality and independence. Emergency supplies of food, oil and fuel are being held for use only in the event of general mobilization.

## PUSH BACK NORWEGIANS

German Advance Along Railway Line Between Oslo And Trondheim Reported

STOCKHOLM, April 17: (CP)—Rushing a train through a district still held by the Norwegians, German troops were reported yesterday to have reached Storleir Heights, three miles from the Swedish border and fifty miles east of Trondhjem.

By gaining control of the railways running north from Kongsvinger to Trondhjem and east from Kongsvinger to the Swedish frontier, the Germans would have succeeded in bisecting Norway. To the northward the Allies are attempting a bi-section inland from Narvik.

Contact Near Narvik  
It was reported today that Allied and German forces had contacted in the Narvik region.

## WILL PRAY FOR PEACE

Pope Sets May Aside As Period of Supplication For Return Of Happier World Order

VATICAN CITY, April 17: (CP)—Pope Pius today asked Roman Catholics to pray to the Virgin Mary during the month of May for a return of peace.

"Our hearts are full of sorrow," said the Pontiff "for terrible calamities which have already occurred and evils which are menacing other nations. We must pray to God for an end of this calamitous order and a return of tranquility and justice. May the rainbow of peace reappear and a happier order be restored."

The Pope declared that, since the war had started, nothing had been left undone with a view to bringing about a restoration of peace on a basis of mutual fraternity and charity.

WINNIPEG, April 17: (CP)—Oshawa Generals defeated Kenora Thistles by a score of 2 to 1 last night in the opening game of the best of five Memorial Cup finals for the Dominion junior hockey championship. The next game will be tomorrow night and the third Saturday night.

W. C. ## Bombing Attack On Important Norwegian Port By R.A.F. Planes

Loss of British Submarine Thistle is Admitted By Admiralty—Clyde River Shipbuilding Area is Seeded With Mines

LONDON, April 17: (CP)—Great Britain today disclosed the loss of the submarine Thistle while forces in Norway were apparently racing with the Germans for control of Trondhjem. A communique said that, while returning, one cruiser was hit by a bomb and sustained some damage but continued to her base. The Air Ministry announced that a bombing attack had been carried out on the strategic Norwegian port and on a seaplane base nearby. Military observers expressed the view that a drive through Trondhjem was developing as the first phase of British land operations in Norway. The Admiralty announced tonight that the Royal Navy had bombarded Stavanger airfield for one hour and 20 minutes this morning.

## Blockade In Pacific May Be Tightened

WASHINGTON, (D. C., April 17: (CP)—Lord Lothian, British ambassador to the United States, forecasts an even tighter blockade in the Pacific to prevent shipments of goods being made to Germany via Vladivostok and Russia.

The executive was also authorized to plan a big outing at Prudhomme Lake during the summer when competitions will be held and prizes awarded.

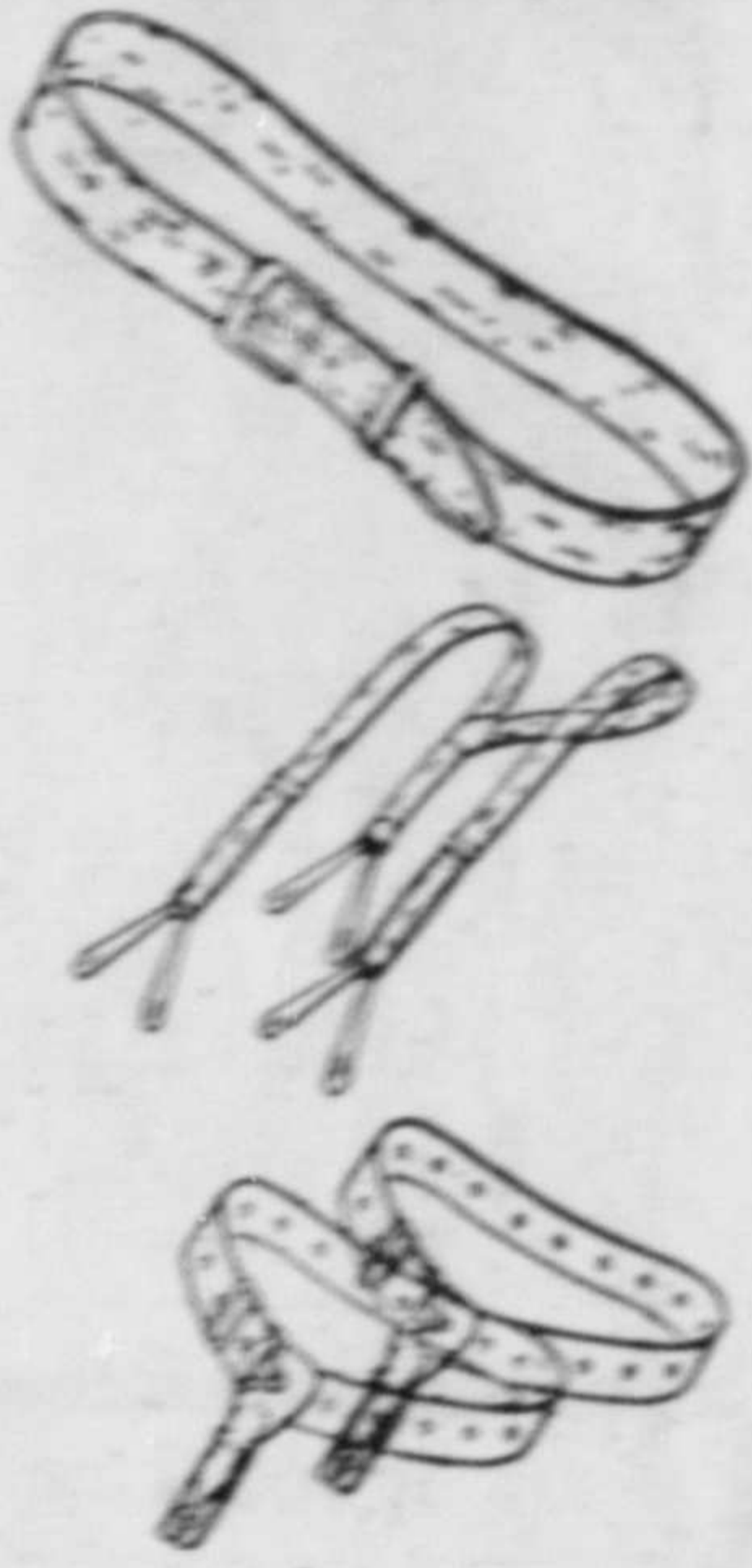
