Churchill Is Full Of Confidence

Premier Predicts Ignominious Passing Away Of Third Reich; Britain Stands Up Splendidly

Danger of Invasion Not Passed But is More Difficult For Hitler — Superiority Over Enemy Gradually Increasing

LONDON, September 5: (CP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill declared in Parliament today that the British-American exchange of destroyers for defence bases was a memorable transaction which would enable the United States "to take danger by the throat while it is still hundreds of miles away." He added, however, that Hitler will, no doubt, pay the United States if he gets a chance. The Prime Minister expressed boundless confidence that the Third Reich will pass away as swiftly—perhaps more swiftly—than did Napoleon's army although, of course, without any of its glitter or glory.

RUMANIA DICTATOR

King Carol Gives Over His Complete Power To General Antonescu BUCHAREST, Rumania, Sept. 5: (CP)—King Carol surrendered his vast power of state today to the strong man, General Ion Antonescu, and was reported to have consented to the banishment of Magda Lupescu, long credited with being the power behind the Rumanian throne. Government quarters said that Carol might abdicate soon in favor of his son, Prince Michael. Surrender of power was the price Carol paid Antonescu for taking over the government. Parliament has been dissolved and the constitution suspended. Antonescu will reign as a dictator.

HUNGARIANS TAKE OVER

Dictator Horthy Marches Triumphant Into Transylvania SATU-MARE, Transylvania, Sept. 5:—Admiral Nicholas Horthy, regent of Hungary, led the Hungarian army triumphantly into this city today, beginning occupation of the war-lost territory Hungary has regained by a Vienna fiat of Germany and Italy. The triumphal entry started the Hungarian army's push toward the Eastern Carpathians.

Empire Daughters Doing War Work

Reports Presented at Municipal Chapter Meeting Show Much Accomplished The regular meeting of Municipal Chapter, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, was held on Tuesday at the home of Mrs. H. A. Breen. The report of the war work convenor showed that since June the local chapters had contributed \$300 to the I.O.D.E. Bomber Fund and \$100 to the United Services Hut. In addition 130 pairs of Indian made socks were purchased for the navy and 120 knitted garments were shipped last month to provincial headquarters for distribution to the navy and Canadian Active Service Force. Arrangements were completed for a tag day to be held on Saturday, the entire proceeds of which will be devoted to war work. As part of the educational work for the year, a grant was made to enable a promising student to attend High School.

CANADIAN SHIP DOWN

Two British Destroyers Also Sunk With Another Damaged By Enemy Naval Action LONDON, Sept. 5: (CP)—Sinking by enemy aircraft of a Canadian steamship with loss of ten lives is disclosed today. In accordance with Admiralty practice, the name was not announced. The Admiralty announced today that the destroyers Ivanhoe and Esk had been sunk by torpedoes or mines and the destroyer Empress damaged.

Moose May Take Refugees From British Isles

The possibility of Moose members' rescue children from war-ridden British Isles being brought to Canada and placed among members of the order in this country for duration of the war was disclosed at a meeting of the local Moose Lodge last night and it was decided to canvass the membership locally on the matter. This was the principal business at the meeting of the local lodge which was presided over by F. H. Cameron, the governor.

MANCHESTER CARRIES ON

Incessant Night Raiding On Great Midlands Industrial Centre Has Little Effect MANCHESTER, Sept. 5: (CP)—The great Manchester industrial area is functioning normally in spite of three weeks of sporadic night raiding, an American correspondent has found on an independent tour. He was unable to find a single factory hit. All are working full blast.

GERMANY HARD HIT

R.A.F. Still Effective in Attack—54 to 11 is Wednesday's Score LONDON, Sept. 5: (CP)—The Royal Air Force last night bombed a power station and airplane factory in Berlin during widespread raids extending from Stettin on the Baltic to Cherbourg in France. The Air Ministry announced. Five German raiders were reported shot down over southeast England this afternoon, making the day's unofficial total fourteen. Yesterday, in the course of intensive combat and anti-aircraft fire as waves of Nazi planes came over, fifty-four German planes were brought down with loss of only eleven British. London was under air raid alarm for one hour and twenty-six minutes today. Waves of enemy aircraft had crossed the south-east coast and some were approaching London when the alarms were sounded. The raid was one of a series over England at widely spaced objectives. Some bombs were dropped on the outskirts of London and others did considerable damage in the north-west. Preliminary reports indicated that there was no great harm in London but in the north-west gas and water mains were broken and a hospital hit. In addition to intensive air attacks, British long range guns were effectively played across the English Channel on the coast of France yesterday. The anti-aircraft barrage in London yesterday was the heaviest since the start of the war. The Royal Canadian Air Force took part in yesterday's fighting when a dozen Canadian fighters met a similar number of Germans. The Canadians brought down two or three enemy planes, losing none themselves.

PRODUCTION IS DOUBLED

Large Increase In Output Of Both Sawlogs And Forest Products In This District Timber production in Prince Rupert forestry is this year running almost double that of 1939 both in output of sawlogs and forest products. The sawlog scale for the first eight months of this year has been 120,226,453 board feet in comparison with 79,924,472 board feet in the same period last year. The log scale for this August was 36,874,400 feet compared with 24,262,111 feet in August 1939. All varieties, except fir showed a substantial increase over last year. The production of poles and piling this August was 322,765 lineal feet as compared with 150,538 lineal feet in the same month last year, bringing the output for this year to date up to 1,357,278 lineal feet in comparison with 756,948 lineal feet in the first eight months of 1939.

Despite August, Weather Better This Year Here

Despite an exceptionally dull and wet August in which 13.41 inches of rain and only 49 hours of sunshine were recorded as compared with 6.81 inches and 125.6 hours in the same month last year, the weather for 1940 to date still shows improvement over that of 1939. So far this year the sunshine has totalled 724 hours as compared with an aggregate of 666.7 hours in the first eight months of 1939. The precipitation so far this year has amounted to 55.20 inches compared with 64.03 inches in the corresponding period a year ago.

Bulletins

MINISTER COMING Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of municipalities, is arriving in the city on tonight's train from the interior and will proceed tomorrow night to Victoria. Arrangements are being made for meetings tomorrow with the minister in regard to the local municipal position.

MRS. PERRY DIES Just six days following the death of her husband, the late Roger Francis Perry, Mrs. Perry, the widow, passed away this morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. Ill herself for some time, she had been visibly affected by the passing of her husband. She had been in the hospital for only one day. Her passing will be widely mourned and there will be general sympathy for the bereaved.

REACTION TO HITLER NEW YORK—The speech of Adolf Hitler yesterday declaring unlimited aerial warfare on England and admitting that the war might last for another four years was construed here as meaning that Hitler had found the British resistance to be more than he had bargained upon. The threat of more intensive bombing of Britain by the Royal Air Force kept up its attacks on Germany was taken as an indication that Germany does not like the effects of modern aerial warfare of which this has been her first taste. The turn of the tide definitely in favor of Britain is expected next year. In view of Hitler's failure to break British resistance the stock market rallied sharply yesterday.

NAZI TRANSPORT DOWN STOCKHOLM—A German transport, the Marion, carrying troops to Norway, was sunk in the Kattegat by a British submarine. Some three thousand soldiers were drowned. This is the second German transport ship to be sunk recently in the neighborhood of the Gulf of Bothnia.

ULTIMATUM REJECTED SHANGHAI—The French colonial government of Indo-China is expected to reject the Japanese ultimatum to be permitted bases and passage of troops to be used against China.

ITALIANS RADIOS OFF ROME—For mechanical reasons Italian radio stations will henceforth close down at 10 o'clock each night (1 p.m. Pacific Standard Time).

MUST SALUTE AND SING VICTORIA—An order-in-council was passed yesterday whereby school children of British Columbia must salute the flag and sing God Save the King at least once a week.

REVENUE AWAY UP

Customs and Excise Collections Here This Years Are Almost Double Those Last Customs and excise revenue at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of August this year amounted to \$33,941.25 as compared with \$12,123.48 in the same month last year. This brings the total for 1940 to date up to \$133,278.92 in comparison with \$72,051.77 at the corresponding date last year.

CANADIANS LANDED IN OLD LAND

Large Contingent Arrives at Northern Port and Is Warmly Welcomed AT A NORTHERN BRITISH PORT Sept. 5: (CP)—A fresh contingent of Canadian troops arrived at this port, it was announced today. A number of Americans, Poles, Norwegians and Netherlands were included. A Press Association dispatch said that some wore "battle dress of a Quebec battalion and an Alberta battalion and a surprisingly large number had red and blue service chevrons of the First Great War." It was learned in Canada that it was one of the greatest contingents to leave for Great Britain since the war broke out, numbering several thousand and consisting substantially of engineers and artillerymen with some Royal Canadian Air Force units included as well as numerous nursing sisters. In view of enemy air activity over the British Isles, the arrival of the Canadians was shrouded with more than usual secrecy and no one was permitted to approach the docks during the landing. The soldiers singing in the troop trains which carried them to camp, however, soon disclosed their arrival and crowds gathered to greet them as they passed along.

DESTROYERS TO CANADA

United States War Vessels Are Already On Their Way From Boston WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 5:—The first five of the fifty 1200-ton destroyers which are being loaned over by the United States to Great Britain are already on their way from Boston to Canada. They will be delivered to the Canadian navy by American skeleton crews. Ten more of the destroyers are being made ready to leave while it is expected twenty-five will be away inside two weeks. The value of the entire fleet which the United States is making available to Great Britain is placed at \$100,000,000.

Construction Of Seal Cove Base Is Proceeding

Cement piers for the eighteen buildings to be erected at the Seal Cove seaplane base are about completed and all seems in readiness for the timbers. The whole site has a peculiar appearance, dotted with little piers. To some the first impression is that they are miniature tank obstructions.

More Phones Are In Use

One Hundred More Instruments Installed Today Than at First of Year There are almost one hundred more telephones in use in Prince Rupert today than there were at the first of the year, it is announced by Sam Massey, superintendent of utilities. The increase is continuing. The number of telephones in use here today is greater than since eight years ago although not yet to the department's peak for all time.

EDITORIAL

A BROKEN REED

Canadians who for many years looked to the United States for the defence of this country now are beginning to realize that they were depending upon a broken reed. The United States is not yet prepared to defend herself and will not have modern defences, such as might be effective against the Germans, for at least two years.

We all appreciate the aid that the Roosevelt administration is giving to the British in their supreme struggle against the European aggressors but as Canadians we must be prepared to defend ourselves rather than depending on our good neighbors.

THE RIGHT STUFF

The children who were torpedoed by the Germans a few days ago are made of the right stuff. To them the sinking of the ship was an adventure. Evidently they had been instructed how to act in the case of trouble and, like good little soldiers, they remembered their instructions, kept cool and then sang as they rowed away and waited to be picked up. It was a splendid exhibition of pluck and self command.

ON THE ROAD TO VICTORY

Several of the British leaders have stopped talking about defence but speak of the time when they will leave the British Isles and march against the enemy. In the meantime efforts are bent on preparing men and airplanes to cover the actions of the ground forces, not only at home but in the invaded countries.

SHIFTING SCENES

The war scene in Europe shifts from day to day. Seeing what Britain is doing, the people of the various countries on the continent are stiffening their backs and the Hitler club has to be applied more and more and will yet be applied before the time comes that German might is broken and Hitler is forced from his present position. Just now Rumania is in the limelight but other countries will be dealt with individually.

If only there had been real co-operation between the countries opposed to Hitler, the present situation might have been avoided.

Whifflets from the Waterfront

With most of the areas closed at the present time to permit escape-ment of pinks to the spawning grounds, seining, gill-netting and trolling for cohoes and chums in Prince Rupert district is now quiet. The only areas open at present are Bella Bella, the south Queen Charlottes and part of Lowe Inlet. Most of the salmon canneries are still in operation, Sunnyside on the Skeena and Wales Island and Arrandale on the Naas being now closed. Others may cease operations for the season this week-end.

Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. S. Nickerson, arrived in port at 4:30 this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed at noon in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.

With Area No. 3 scheduled to close to halibut fishing at midnight on September 26, the increasing preponderance of landings at Prince Rupert between now and then is expected to be from American vessels. The number of Prince Rupert vessels on the grounds is becoming less as fall closes in. Yesterday's landings at Prince Rupert totalled 135,000 pounds, coming from four American vessels. Prices ranged from 10.2c and 8c to 10.8c and 8c.

Making her final call of the season at this port, C. P. R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. William Palmer, was in from 3:30 to 5:30 yesterday afternoon south-bound from Skagway to Vancouver. She had on board 140 passengers of whom nine disembarked at this port, three going aboard at Prince Rupert for the south. Of the through passengers sixty-eight were round trip tourists returning south. A number of Alaska

college students were also on board going south to resume their studies in the United States after spending summer vacations in the north. Inaugurating a ten day schedule of sailings for the fall, the steamer Princess Louise will be here next Monday northbound.


