Big Proportions of Greatly Increased Revenue Will Be Diverted to Fighting Purposes-Luxury Imports To Be Restricted

OTTAWA, June 24: (CP)-Finance Minister J. L. Ralston delivered his first budget address today, announcing an over-all deficit of \$118,000,000 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1940, and forecasting a heavy increase in the national income, "a very large proportion" of which will be diverted for war purposes. Much of the planned increase in government revenues will not be collected during the current year.

The minister warned that some reduction in personal consumption must be made "and can easily be made by those of us who are above the minimum standard of living."

Col. Ralston sounded a warning against economic collapse that would follow if private spending was encouraged and prices allowed to rise with increased civilian consumption.

Restriction on luxury imports was forecast to divert foreign exchange to war needs.

The minister expresses the opinion that war industry and kindred activity in Canada would bring about "before very long" a situation where every one able and willing to work and not needed for military service would find productive employment. "Maximum efficiency, maximum production and maximum speed must be the supreme objectives of us all today" and the war effort must not be limited by financial calculations or "by what we can comfortably accomplish."
