Italian Army And Navy On Run

NAZIS ARE BEATEN BY AIR FORCE

Widespread Activity Over Wide Area From Norway to Biscay—Also In Italy and Deep Into Reich

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Following up Saturday night attack, the Royal Air Force was back across the channel early Sunday night soon after dark and subjected the invasion ports there to their worst pounding in weeks. The violent assault was concentrated between Dunkirk and Boulogne including the guns at Cap Gris Nez. Huge fires could be seen from the Dover coast.

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Administrative Body Consists of Eleven Greeks and Four Albanians With Albanian Mayor

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PROTEST AT RAID

British Planes Alleged to Have Dropped Bombs on French Port of Marseilles

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Nothing had been heard up to last night in an official way of a reported vigorous protest which was to be made to the British government in regard to an alleged bombing raid by British planes on Marseilles. It was said that four persons had been killed and twenty fires started.

Credit For Gt. Britain

WASHINGTON D. C., November 25.—Following the statement on Saturday of the Marquess of Lothian, British ambassador to the United States, that Great Britain was nearing the end of its liquid financial resources, a movement is already on foot to repeal the Johnson Act and amend the neutrality laws whereby the sale of arms to Great Britain on credit will be permitted. Lord Lothian is to have an important conference with President Roosevelt early this week.

WARNING OF REICH SENT

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—The German Foreign Office has warned Premier John Metaxas of Greece against extending the war in the Balkans. Exception is taken to a statement of Metaxas that the Greeks are fighting to free smaller neighbors from aggression. This is held to be dangerous.

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IS FULL OF CONFIDENCE

Lord Lothian Takes Optimistic View of War and Gives Reasons Why

NEW YORK, November 25.—Returning to the United States Saturday from a visit to England, the Marquess of Lothian, British ambassador to United States, while stating that 1941 was bound to be a difficult year, expressed his unbounded optimism for success in the war struggle and said that the confidence of the people of Britain in victory was high. He predicted the ultimate collapse of the German war machine owing to economic troubles.

BARI IS ATTACKED

Rome Admits Activity of Royal Air Force on Important Adriatic Sea Port

ROME, Nov. 25. (CP)—Rome admitted Saturday that Bari, important base and point of embarkation for Albania, had been bombed again by the Royal Air Force and fires started. The naval base of Taranto was also attacked again by the Royal Air Force, the British claiming that both attacks had been successful. Incendiary and high explosive bombs were rained on Bari and there were large explosions.

CHANGE IN MINISTERS

Speculation As to What is Implied by Switch of Russian Envoys To Germany

MOSCOW, November 25.—There was speculation as to the reasons for an announcement made in Moscow late Saturday that the Soviet ambassador to Berlin was being recalled, being replaced in the German capital by an assistant foreign commissar.

Italian Raid On Alexandria

Dropped Bombs For Ninety Minutes But Did Not Accomplish Much

ALEXANDRIA, November 25.—Italian planes dropped several bombs on Alexandria Sunday in a ninety minute raid but no military objectives were struck. A few persons were injured but damage was slight. None were killed.

NEW YORK SILVER

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Silver was trading at 34 3/4 per ounce here Saturday.

Prince Rupert Rents Pegged

OTTAWA, Nov. 25 (CP)—Extension of rentals control to North Vancouver, New Westminster, Nanaimo and Prince Rupert was announced Sunday by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. Rents are pegged at the rents payable January 2 last. No tenant need pay a higher rent unless advised in writing by the rentals administration.

Passing Of Lord Tryon

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Lord Tryon, who was three times minister of pensions and once Postmaster General, died suddenly yesterday.

NO WAR IN BULGARIA

Denied That Troops Are Massing On Greek Border — Being Demobilized Instead

SOFIA, November 25.—Bulgarian authorities declared yesterday that Bulgaria was not massing troops along the frontier but was rather demobilizing.

Editorial Giving Spitfires

It has become the fashion to help Britain by presenting the government there with a Spitfire or a bomber. Making a present of this kind enables the people to give vent to their desire to really do something in connection with the war. The first place to make a donation of this kind was Jamaica. That island sent £20,000 to purchase a bomber. Among the numerous places that have contributed Spitfires since Jamaica set the pace have been the following:

- Bahamas 2, Ceylon 300, Gold Coast 50, Hyderabad 75, East India 80, Bombasa 2, Sarawak 10, Rajah of Sarawak 1, St. Vincent 1, Granada 1, Zanzibar 4

A number of places just sent money including £100,000 from New Zealand. Others sent bombers, each costing about £20,000. All over England there are today Spitfire clubs almost everywhere. Large factories have their Spitfire Clubs and so have various organizations.

What we are suggesting is that Prince Rupert donate a Spitfire and ask to have it named after the city. It would cost about \$20,000, a considerable amount but not large considering that the city has benefitted so greatly from the war. If it is considered feasible and if someone will start off with a considerable donation, we shall be willing to publish the names of all donors with the amounts subscribed. Possibly it needs only a start to get the fund going. It would be a great impetus to other places to take similar action if this city were to take action. It also would be a fine thing if it could be done without any personal canvass.

SLOVAKIA SIGNS UP

Another Puppet State of Axis Has Its Name Affixed to Dotted Line

BERLIN, November 25.—Sixth nation to do so, Slovakia signed up with the Axis in P. M. yesterday. Premier Bela Tuka signed on behalf of Slovakia. It was merely a formality as Slovakia, willingly or not had already been co-operating with the Axis. Tuka signed in the presence of German Foreign Secretary Joachim von Ribbentrop.

SHIPMENTS TO TURKEY

Airplanes, Arms and Ammunition Have Been Going There From United States

WASHINGTON D.C., November 25.—It is disclosed that within the last couple of months United States has shipped airplanes, arms and munitions to Turkey to the value of two million dollars. Further large orders are being placed and, in this connection, the Turkish ambassador to United States had a conference with the American government Saturday.

British Launch New Offensive

Defeated Much Heavier Force of Italians in Sudan Engagement At End of Week

CAIRO, Nov. 25.—The British have launched a new offensive against the Italians from the Sudan. In a week-end engagement, the British defeated a much heavier force of Italians.

Airplanes Instead Of Warships Being Given Thought Now

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Nov. 25.—An expenditure of \$20,000,000 which Sweden had been planning for warships may be diverted to airplanes. This is being considered by the government, it has been disclosed.

UNDERSTAND "PERFECTLY"

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Despite the statement of the Nazi governor of Holland that the German Nazis and the Dutch understand each other "perfectly," clashes between the Dutch and the Nazis are on the increase. The number of Germans being drowned in ditches and otherwise meeting untimely deaths increases.

YugoSlavia Is Neutral

Expresses Determination to Stay Out of Conflict in Balkans

BELGRADE, Nov. 25.—The government of YugoSlavia reiterates its determination to maintain neutrality in the face of the present crisis.

Il Duce's Forces Are Fleeing In Albania; His Fleet In Hiding

Eight Thousand More Fascist Troops Taken As Fall of Argirocastro Appears Imminent—Navy is Forced to Leave Taranto

LONDON, November 25: (CP)—While the Italian army continues on the run before the Greeks in the war in Albania, eight thousand more of Il Duce's troops having been captured as the Greeks entered the outskirts of Argirocastro, the main Italian military base in Southern Albania, British naval sources said today that the Royal Navy's bombing of Taranto had forced the Italians to withdraw the major portion of the fleet from that badly damaged port to an undisclosed place of greater safety.

POPE ASKS FOR PEACE

Calls Nations of World to United Prayer—Will Fast for Week to Show His Sorrow

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 25.—Pope Pius appealed to the nations of the world yesterday to unite in prayer for just and lasting peace. The world did not appear large enough to contain the aspirations of all men, declared the Pontiff, who had declared a special day of prayer. The Pope will fast for a week as a sign of his sorrowing for the suffering caused by war. "Jesus," prayed the Holy Father "speaks to Thy Father to intercede for us and bring world peace."

ITALIANS FACE NEW DISASTERS

Greeks Keeping Up General Offensive All Along Front

ATHENS, November 25.—Furious Greek attacks in a general offensive along the entire Italo-Graeco war front early Sunday threatened fresh disaster for the Italian forces which were vainly endeavouring to establish new battle positions. In the mountains northwest of Koritza, which they captured on Friday, the Greeks have taken up new positions, forcing the Fascists back as they continue their steady advance.

EDITORIALS

A Red Herring . . .

It was absolutely necessary for Hitler to do something and do it quickly to offset the breakdown of the Italian offensive against Greece. The loss of prestige during the past week has been so great that, if nothing were done to offset it or to set people talking about something else, there was grave danger that the Axis might lose its grip. That is why Hitler has been so actively engaged in making Balkan nations toe the mark. It is a gesture but little more.

Financial Resources . . .

When the Marquess of Lothian said that Britain was about to come to the end of her resources, it probably meant that pretty soon she would not be able to pay cash on the nail for goods purchased from the United States. Credits would have to be given if the supply of war material was to be kept up. This would mean a change in the method of doing business which must be approved by the United States Congress.

When we consider that Germany has been in an even worse financial position ever since the war commenced, we need not worry about what is going to happen. If Germany can carry on without much ready cash, Great Britain can certainly do so.

An Evident Break . . .

It seems evident that there is a break developing between Russia and Germany. Both Stalin and Hitler suspect each other. Each knows that the other has no conscience and is only out to grab all he can. Each is only using the other as long as it suits his purpose. If Hitler could afford to do so he would throw over Russia at once and seize Ukrainian territory. If Stalin could do without Hitler, there would be no collaboration. Stalin has no use for the present German administration or for any other except his own and that he uses for his own advantage.

PORT CLEMENTS SERVICE

Editor, Daily News:
In your issue of November 5 you report a statement made by Mr. Skipner, agent for the Union Steamship Co., at a meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce to the effect that "The people of Port Clements had not lost anything from the ship not calling except that they did not see the ship." We wish to point out to Mr. Skipner a few facts of which he is apparently unaware.
First, as regards seeing the ship, this is the least important item. The people of Port Clements are not aborigines. Most of them have seen many much larger ships and have long ceased to be thrilled by the advent of a bit of a coasting steamer.
Second, the two general stores at Port Clements have both lost much business through the ship not calling. People who used to spend money here now are spending it at Queen Charlotte City where they have to go to meet the ship.
Third, the Port Clements restaurant has also lost most of its business as this was mainly done on boat days while people were waiting for and arriving from the ship.
Fourth, the beer parlor here has lost a large portion of its business as much of it was done on boat days, many of its passengers calling there while the ship was in port.
Fifth, the taxi businesses at Port Clements, Tlell, Skidegate and Queen Charlotte City have been hard hit as previously many carloads of passengers came to catch the ship from the south and other points on this island. Also many people from the camps on Moresby Island and often four or five carloads used to leave the ship at Port Clements to go south, saving much time and frequently unpleasant travelling around the coast.
The above are only a few of the losses of business sustained by Port Clements through the ship ceasing to call here. Perhaps they will be sufficient to convince Mr. Skipner that we have lost more than just not seeing the ship.
In past years a very great deal of shipping business has been done from this port and no doubt will be again. We feel that it is very poor policy to take away most of the business left to us just because there is not very much doing here at the present time.
Now, however, the ship is calling here on alternate trips. This is better than none but not sufficient as we feel that we should have the same consideration as the other ports on this island.
The majority of the members of the community share the sentiments expressed in this letter.

CONVENTION CONCLUDED

In spite of inclement weather, the Lutheran circuit convention continued Saturday afternoon and evening with very good attendance and great interest. Special services at St. Paul's Lutheran Church yesterday morning also had a large congregation.
The theme for discussion was the Text Luke 15: 1-23. All the pastors present, and also lay delegates took effective part in the discussions.
Saturday evening the church was overflowing. Musical contributions were presented by the Varden Singers, the local String Band Singers, Ketchikan Church Choir, Ed. Sunde and Pastor Odegaard, tenor and baritone, respectively. Inspiring and effective addresses were given by Bishop H. L. Foss, Rev. B. Odegaard of Ketchikan and Rev. Thomas Knutsen of Petersburg as well as laymen who took part.
It was decided to hold the next annual circuit convention at Petersburg, a year from now. Rev. Thomas Knutsen of Petersburg was elected president for next year, Rev. B. Odegaard, Ketchikan, vice president, Ed. Sunde, secretary, and I. Feness, Prince Rupert, treasurer. Pastor Odegaard was elected circuit choral union director and Peter Lien associate director.
An aim is to gradually build up a large choral union which in due time will be in position to meet in one of the coast cities and give sacred concerts jointly.
Resolutions of Loyalty
Resolutions adopted at the closing session of the convention included the following:
"We thank Almighty God for the countries He has given us, and for all the temporal and spiritual blessings He so richly and graciously has entrusted to us.
"We thank God for our governments 'of the people, by the people and for the people,' for personal freedom and civil liberties within law and order, for the sacred heritage of religious freedom, recognized and zealously guarded by all in authority.
"We pray God graciously to bless

and endow with courage and wisdom our governments and all in high authority who, under God, are leading our nations during these most difficult and perilous times in our national history.
"We gladly and spontaneously give expression to continued and unquestioned loyalty, the fullest measure of devotion and of sacrificial service, to the end that the forces of evil and darkness may be subdued and the will of God, peace and righteousness may prevail during ages to come."
The final session was held Sunday morning with formal services, the sermon being delivered by Rt. Rev. H. L. Foss, the altar service conducted by the local pastor, brief address by visiting pastors and beautiful choral and solo selections by several.

Both Morning and Evening at
