

BATTLE OF ALBANIA

ATHENS—While the British Navy made a smashing attack at the Italian port of Brindisi and the Albanian port of Valona with the British and Greek air forces also pounding away effectively at the enemy, the Greeks continued to advance all along the front today. Italian attempts to regain certain lost positions resulted in their repulse with heavy casualties and loss of equipment.

MERSEYSIDE HEAVILY HIT

LONDON-Liverpool was subjected to a heavy bombing attack by Nazi airplanes last night. Elsewhere along Merseyside damage was also done to buildings and residences. Casualties, however, were light considering the intensity of the attack. The German bombers also visited London and elsewhere throughout the country but the Mersey bore the brunt of the attack.

HEAVY DEMANDS ON FRANCE

BERNE-New German demands are reported to have been made upon France and the Vichy government is in emergent session to consider them. The demands include reinstatement of Pierre Laval as automatic successor to Marshal Petain as chief of state, permission to move German troops through unoccupied France and transfer of the French government from Vichy to Paris.

GERMANY WARNS STATES

BERLIN-Germany warns Berlin that any move to requisition German and Italian ships now in United States with a view to selling them to Great Britain would be considered as a warlike act. A Nazi spokesman said today that United States is following a policy of "pin pricks, challenges, humiliation and moral aggression" in regard to Germany. Hitler's newspaper, in comments undoubtedly directed at the United States, said that any nation which desired to engage one of the Axis powers would have to face all three and their strength should not be underestimated. It is reported that Germany has already asked the United States to recall some of the members of its embassy staff as their presence endangers the national security of Germany.

BERLIN RAIDED AGAIN

LONDON-There were new and effective raids by the Royal Air Force during last night on Berlin, the industrial Ruhr and such channel bases as Antwerp, Flushing and Amsterdam. An airplane factory at Berlin was left in flames. The British fleet air arm has struck again at the Dodocanese Islands.

"He sees our present economic and social order as it really is—obsolete. He has the common sense not to say too much so that the war effort of the masses will be affected. He does, however, say enough to give hope to the under dog.

"British labor leaders will be the ones who will give special anthems by Junior Choir assisted by the Senior Choir. Anthemsleadership to the new era after the war. Coming events cast their shadows before. They have given assurance that the old school tie is out; that if secondary school boys can defend England in their Spitfires, they should be eligible for the best jobs in the Civil Service if they have intellectual capacity.

"A British labor leader also pointed out that if the importation of luxuries can be curtailed to help the war effort they can be curtailed in peacetime until the poor are supplied with necessities. The British aristocracy and high finance have been told pointedly that they have failed England and that from now on the people are really going to run it.

"Skilled technicians have been assured that they will not be kicked out on the streets after this war. In the intervening years between 1918 and 1938 many artisans lost their cunning. This resulted in a terrific shortage of skilled tradesmen necessary to put the nation on a war footing.

"It is the crowning glory of England that in the throes! of a death struggle her leaders never allow the vision of a better world to fade from their thoughts or from the minds of the common people. In many countries so-called democratic it would be impossible to say the things that British labor leaders say without being called a Communist or a fifth columnist.

"Yet this is the spirit of England, and that is why England will live and Germany will die. Richard Boyer, the newspaperman, recently home from Germany, remarked about the apathy and war-weariness of the German masses. The reason for this is that they have no hope for the future. They thought they were exchanging their freedom for economic security. Actually, they sold their birthright for a mess of pottage."


