GERMAN OPINION ON CHURCHILL'S PROPOSITION

CHURCHILL TRIED TO GOLDBRICK GERMANY

Comments on Leading German Newspapers on Churchill's Bluff to Induce Germany to Abandon Increase in Naval Strength

(Special to Daily News.)
Berlin, March 20.—If Winston Churchill hoped by his speech in the British House of Commons to induce Germany to abandon the proposed strengthening of her navy, he will be disappointed by the comment of the German morning papers. Not a single newspaper considers this alternative. A few ultra-patriotic organs have indulged in the usual abusive replies, but the comment generally is restrained though firm.

The 60 per cent. standard, constituting the Britain ratio of new construction above that of Germany, as proposed by Mr. Churchill, has a surprisingly wide acceptance, but it is repeatedly pointed out that Mr. Churchill's figures are deceptive and would work out in reality not less than two to one.

The Berliner Post referring to this point says: "Churchill is undoubtedly attempting to gold brick Germany."

MINIMUM WAGE BILL SEVERELY CRITICIZED

Bonar Law Says the Remedy is Worse Than the Disease, But the Bill Has the Strenuous Support of the Labor Members

(Special to Daily News.)
London, March 20.—The government's minimum wage bill passed its first reading last night. It was rather severely criticized and it is predicted that it will not have an easy passage through the commons. Bonar Law said the

remedy proposed seemed worse than the disease, but he would wait for the printed text before committing the opposition to any attitude on the measure. Lloyd George declared there was nothing revolutionary in the bill.

The House of Lords have a special sitting on Saturday to rush the measure through so that the men can resume work on Monday.

The bill has the support of the labor members. Fenwick, Liberal, who is a working collier,

thinks it necessary to take a ballot of the men on the bill before work is resumed and that it will be impossible to open the mines on Monday.

BIG CROWD HEARS ARGUMENT ON ISSUES OF THE CAMPAIGN

Dr. Kergin, Ald. Montgomery and Thomas Dunn Get in Some Hot Ones Anent the Uselessness of William Manson

ALEX. MANSON MAKES BRILLIANT SPEECH

Demands a Business Government and That Money Voted for Roads and Bridges Shall be Expended in a Business and not a Political Way—Would Take the Liquor Trade Out of Politics and Also Civil Service—Local Conservatives Have by no Means Buried the Hatchet

The first political meeting of the campaign was held in the Empress Theatre last night. It was an open-to-all meeting and the great crowd the announcement gathered, not nearly all of which could crush into the building, was an evidence of the deep interest taken in the issues of the day. On the platform were Dr. Kergin, who presided; W. H. Montgomery, the Socialist candidate; Thomas Dunn, Thomas McClymont and the Liberal candidate, Alex. M. Manson. Both candidates were cheered as they took their seats. Dr. Kergin invited any supporters of William Manson to take seats on the platform and there was no response.

In the course of an able and lengthy introductory speech the chairman referred to the statement running in the Journal to the effect that a vote for a Liberal candidate was a vote thrown away, and that to obtain anything from the provincial government we must have a friend at court. Nothing could be more misleading. To prove this he quoted the appropriations for this district published in The News yesterday and showed that the increase in these appropriations had not kept pace with the growth of the district, because Skeena had recently grown more rapidly than any other riding in the province; had increased enough to have the vote of three ridings. As far as his experience in the legislature went the government was willing to listen to opponents as well as supporters, but the morning paper insisted that the McBride government would not give opponents fair treatment. If that was the case we had advanced little more than Russia in representative government. (Cheers.)

W. H. Montgomery was the first speaker. He spoke at great

SILENT WILLIAM HIKES

Takes to His Heels When Challenged to Meet Clayton at Hazelton.

William Joliffe Manson (Silent Bill) was afraid to meet Clayton at Hazelton when the latter announced a public meeting, to which the gentle purring ex-member was publicly invited. Silent Bill immediately upon hearing of the Clayton meeting cancelled a meeting of his own, which he had previously arranged for, and departed post haste for Aldermer. Clayton, undaunted, followed in his wake, determined to make Manson face the music.

It shows that William has a yellow streak and is afraid to face the people on his shiftless record as a representative of Skeena. The people of upper Skeena are thoroughly disgusted with him and he and his followers know it. They are solidly against William Manson. None have suffered more than they through the unfairness of the Two-Man government.

William is doomed in the Hazelton district just as surely as he is doomed in Rupert.

length and with ability, clearly defining the issues from a Socialist and labor point of view. He pictured the hardships settlers and pre-emptors had to suffer, and on the railway policy said the dominant idea of the government

was to draw all the revenue possible from the northern part of the province and spend it in the southern. "The man we sent down to Victoria to represent us never did so (cheers). William Manson always voted with the government no matter what the question was. (Renewed cheers)

Thomas McClymont, made a brief address in which he pointed out that Wm. Manson should have demanded the sale of the government lots of this city. It was better for the representative from Skeena to fall out with the leaders of his party than to fall out with his constituents. He should know that his political life depended on the issue.

Thos. Dunn made a brief address on behalf of Dr. Clayton, speaking in his usual aggressive and incisive style and eliciting cheers. Wm. Manson claimed that he had obtained an appropriation for this district of \$551,000, but it was really only \$351,000. This was a mere bagatelle to what had been given to other parts of the Province. Out of \$8,236,360 we get the magnificent sum of \$351,000, not as much as the government takes out of Queen Charlotte Islands in taxes. (Applause.) "Wm. Manson has never raised his voice in the house on behalf of his district and has never obtained anything for his district." (Cheers.)

Alex. M. Manson, the Liberal candidate, had to wait until the applause which greeted him had died away. He made a long but always able and explicit argument on the issues before the people, of which only brief paragraphs here and there can be given here. Referring to his being chosen as the standard bearer of his party, he said:

Harvey appeared and paid his fine. Goodman, who had put up a gold watch as bail and left a five spot to meet his fine, did not appear, but a friend settled for him and recovered the watch deposited. Both men came into town by a recent boat.

PROUD OLD INDIAN CHIEF AND STEAMBOAT OF THE BUSH

HOW THE PATRIARCH OF THE KITWANGA INDIANS RESIGNED HIS CHIEFTAINSHIP TO THE LOCOMOTIVE AND HOW PAT PHILLIPSON PERSUADED HIM BACK.

"I am no longer chief! The steamboat of the bush has come and he is the chief now. I will go away and make place for him."

With these words the fine old chief of the Kitwanga Indians, by whose territory now the G. T. P. steel is passing, wrapped his blanket about him and departed far into the bush away from the gleaming steel and snorting locomotives.

With the utmost difficulty the old chief was persuaded to return to his people, who are welcoming the coming of the railway as a great advance for their country. Sergeant "Pat" Phillipson had to go himself into the far retreat in the bush where the old chief had secluded himself, and with much exercise of persuasive Irish eloquence, not to say blarney, managed at last to induce the chief to return.

The sergeant showed the fine old Indian that the railway would bring advantages with it to the chief and his people, and that the marvelous "steamboat of the

bush" that went snorting past would not usurp the chief's place and power over his people, so that he would have to retire into the bush to await death after the manner of the most ancient tribes.

At last the old chief was convinced and returned with "Pat" to his people, whom he found all hailing the railway with delight and watching the coming of the "steamboat of the bush" with wonder. Satisfied that he was still chief of his tribe the proud old Indian decided to stay with the railway and have his share of the good it brings.

P. gets through, the enterprise to include the establishment of a fleet of trawlers, with a special steamer serving the fleet taking the fish to Prince Rupert for shipment. The cannery at Queen Charlotte Islands is the first of Sir George Doughty's fishing concerns on this coast to take actual industrial shape. It will be shipping this year.

MCDONALD NEVER WAS MADE DEPUTY RETURNING OFFICER

THEREFORE NEVER COULD BE DISCHARGED AS SUCH—FULL STATEMENT OF THE CIRCUMSTANCES MADE BY RETURNING OFFICER CLARKE.

Ed. Clarke, returning officer, was rightfully aggrieved at the statement in The News yesterday that J. F. McDonald, his deputy returning officer for Hazelton, had been discharged because he had told Dr. Clayton that he was pledged to vote for William Manson. Mr. Clarke says that he received no wire from Dr. Clayton on that or any other subject; that as returning officer Socialists, Liberals, Independent Conservatives and old line Conservatives all look alike to him; that he is endeavoring to be strictly impartial as it is his sworn duty to be. The facts in the case he states as follows:

"I had to send stationery, locks, forms and all that goes with ballot boxes except the boxes themselves, which were ordered in Hazelton, up the river. I was going to send one man with them. I tried to get a pass for him on a work train from Van Arsdol to the end of steel, but Mr. Mehan told me he did not think any train would be running. It would therefore take

two men to pack the stuff from Van Arsdol to Skeena Crossing, so I sent two, J. F. Joice and J. F. McDonald, the former taking the papers from this office and everything except the instructions which Mr. McDonald was to call for. He never did call for them and they are here now.

"I had to wire these instructions to Mr. Allison, the government agent at Hazelton. Joice wired me that he had arrived there, but I heard nothing of or from McDonald. I then wired the government agent at Hazelton to make all arrangements with Joice for the distribution of the ballot boxes to interior points. I also wired to Joice to take full charge of this work and wired to McDonald that when he reached Hazelton the government agent would settle with him for his services to date.

"The deputy returning officer at Hazelton is Barrister Hovell. I never heard from McDonald since he left here and the instructions prepared for him are still in this office."

**Highest Railway in the World
 Just Completed in Bolivia—
 Pretty Steep Grades Down
 There—Cost \$13,750,000.**

Messages from Chile announce that the great railway across the Andes from Africa in Chile to La Paz in Bolivia was completed on Monday when the rail ends near the Chile-Bolivian frontier were joined. The line is 270 miles in length. The contract price was \$13,750,000. The work has taken less than three years, despite the difficulties presented by the nature of the country which the line traverses. In the first fifty or sixty miles the train way

crosses a desert, then it crosses the Andes, while the last 200 miles or so are over high tableland. Many short tunnels had to be constructed.

Sir John Jackson, head of the English firm which built the line, says it is the highest in the world. The line gives Bolivia a much shorter route to the Pacific coast. It was constructed for the Bolivian and Chilean governments in accordance with treaties signed in 1904.

They stripped the corpse of Bishop Ranierie of a very valuable gold robe, mitre, ring and a cross and chain. They also damaged paintings and altar pieces in an attempt to detach them from the frames, and scattered the consecrated wafers on the floor. The cathedral has been closed until it can be consecrated again because of the desecration.

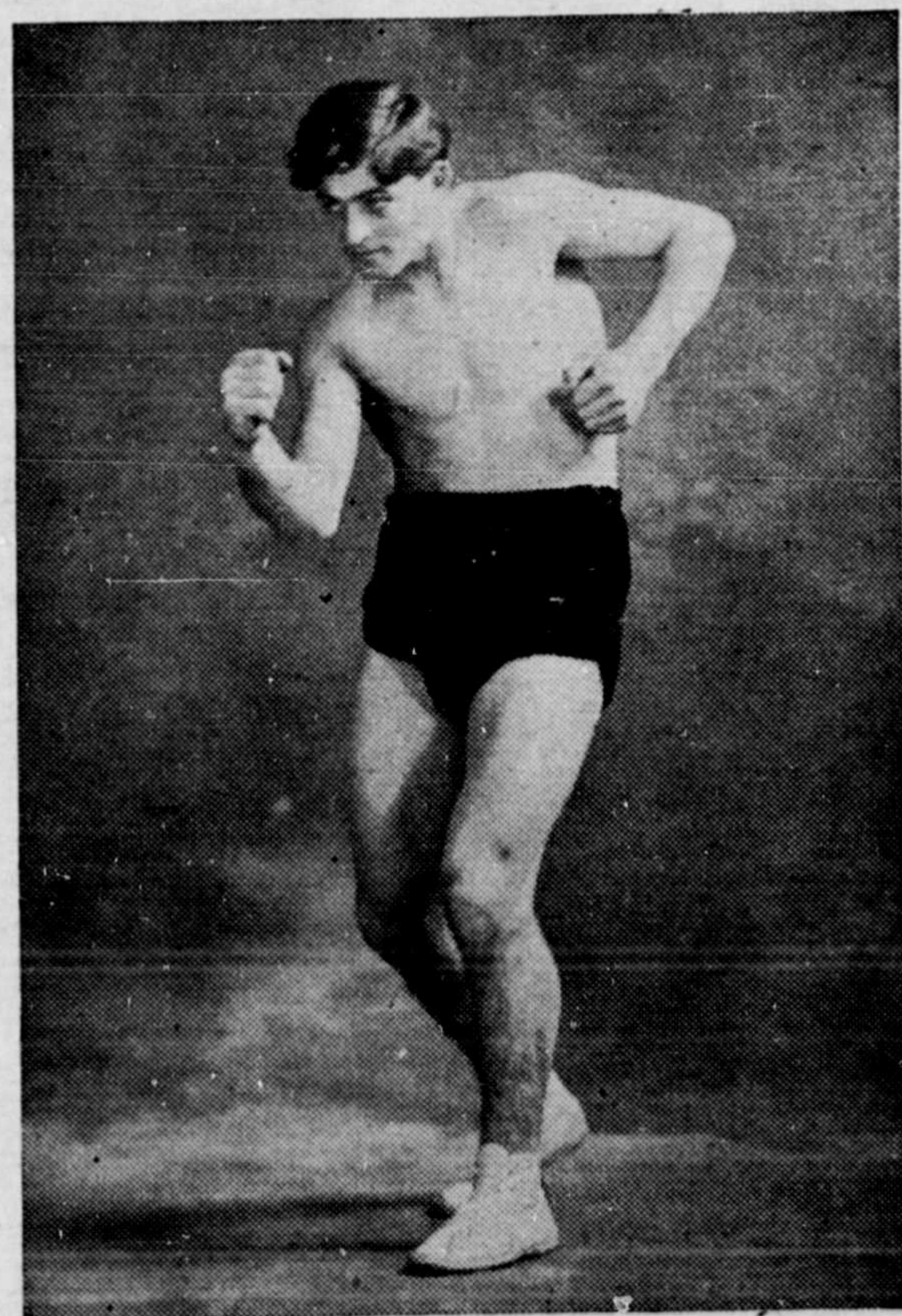

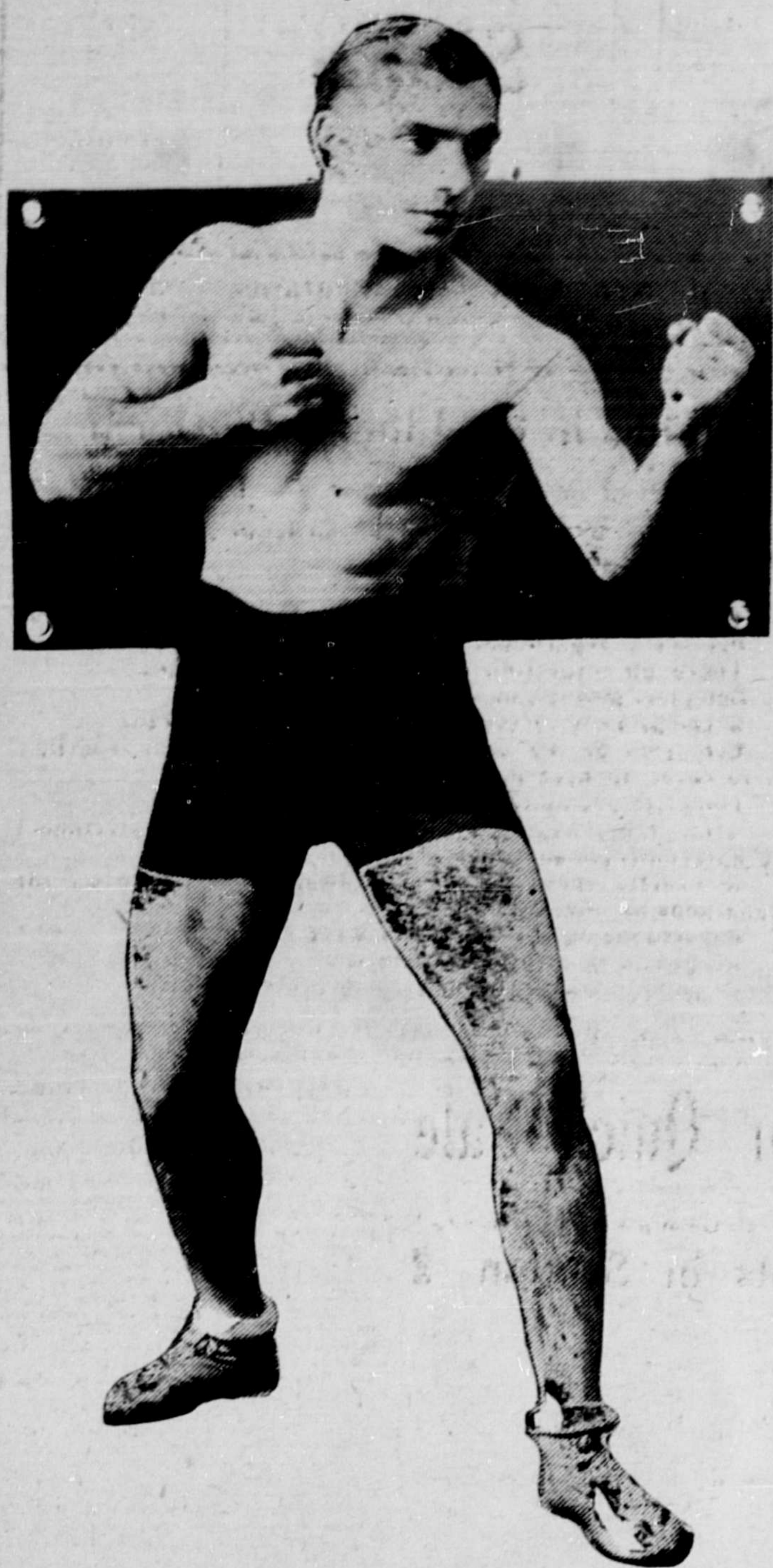

AS BENEDICT HE RETURNED

Arrival of W. D. Vance, Assistant City Treasurer, with His Young Bride Greeted with Cordial Congratulations This Morning. By the Prince George this morning there returned to the city Mr. W. D. Vance with his young bride. Friends and the sunshine welcomed the young couple to Prince Rupert.

BIG CROWD HEARS ARGUMENT

"I ask your support not for myself, but for the principles of democracy. I am for principles and not personalities. I have no quarrel with William Manson but with his government I have. (Cheers.)"

"The calling of this election is a most extraordinary thing; it is a farce. We were given from February 28 to March 28 in which to present the issues in all the constituencies, which is not possible. It is a stifling of the suffrage for which McBride has got to answer. (Cheers.)"

"I smile when I read in the Empire that the Conservatives have buried the hatchet. Up the Skeena I found a great many who had not buried it, and there are many in Prince Rupert. Yet what do you read in the Empire. (Laughter.)"

"I want to see the civil service taken out of politics and kept out. What I want is a business government that will handle your affairs and your funds as they are handled in a business concern."

"I find up the Skeena that the roads and trails are pitiable; trails built at a cost of \$1800 per mile when a \$600 a mile would have made a wagon road. They run from nowhere and get to nowhere. Our roads and bridges should be built on business principles, not on political."

"The government should be the forerunner of development and not wait for it."

"In this northern country the government has huge blocks of land for purchase and has reserved land for pre-emptors after the best land is gone. As a result you have a pre-emptor here another seven miles away, and another twelve miles away. What opportunity does this offer for churches and schools? As business people we ought not to stand for this, nor for the heavy taxation to which the pre-emptor is subjected. The province is wealthy and can well afford to have a homestead law with land at a dollar an acre."

"Dr. Kergin got a greater pro rata appropriation for Skeena than William Manson has ever got. (Cheers.)"

"Our licenses and our police are controlled by the provincial government. Why should they be? As soon as we become sane enough to remove the control of the liquor traffic from the political party, whether Liberal or Conservative, the better it will be for us. We should control the liquor traffic and the police through a non-partisan body."

"Upon the labor question I will be frank with you because you have been fooled by politicians for generations. They have told you on the hustings what they would do and forgotten it afterward. I can only ask you to trust me. The government can well afford to pay a minimum wage as well as be in the real estate business. (Laughter.)"

"The Workmen's Compensation Act is very narrow. It should be enlarged and I would alter it to extend to all hazardous work. Railways should not be paralled but run into new country to aid its development. I want to see some of the
