French Troops Smash Their Way Across-Evacuation of Flanders Is Almost Complete

Somme Valley yesterday with the French repulsing successfully such atacks as were vainly launched by was calm while on the Aisne there was light artillery contact. East of the Moselle there was also light activity today.

There was artillery action at numerous points in the Moselle and Vosges areas yesterday and heavy combat on the Aisne River then.

French troops Saturday smashed their way across the lower Somme River, establishing themselves at a bridgehead which they held against repeated German counter-attacks. The point where the bridgehead was established was not disclosed but it was presumed to be in the Abbeville sector where the Germans were said to have been dislodged from the south bank of the river. French reconnaissance planes were also active.

The Germans hurling 15 divisions (some 200,000 men) into the attack, bitter battle continued with vigorous resistance and further success by the Allies in the Dunkerque region where the British and French continued their heroic and successful withdrawal from Flanders despite heavy and seemingly unceasing atacks of the enemy by air bombing and artillery shells across the fields as siege on the port kept up.

British Tommies saved from the Nazi-laid Flanders trap by the greatest rescue in military history estimated late Saturday that all but one division—fifteen thousand men-of the original British Expeditionary Force of 175,000 had been safely removed. This and two French divisions were the only Allied troops still covering the Allied retreat. Of the 270,000 Allied troops

All London evening papers proclaimed that the Germans had lost 500,000 men in the attempt to wipe out the British Expeditionary Force. In the 23 days since the inva-

sion of the lowlands, Paris claims that there have been 600,000 German casualties, 300,000 alone in the Battle of Flanders.

on Dunkerque today as the rearguard defenders fought valiantly to facilitate completion of the embarkation. Magnetic bombs were dropped from the planes and incendiary bombs started widespread fires. It was estimated that 1000 planes were pounding the port. Torpedo motorboats of the enemy were also active in the unsuccessful attempt to frustrate the embarkation.

French planes have been engaged in dropping supplies to troops in the Dunkerque area.

North of Abbeville French planes have been bombing the enemy, striking two convoys and cutting a railway line as well as doing other damage.

At Calais a small British garrison is still holding out, supplies being dropped to it by plane.

While the British and French have been driven out of! Belgium, the Germans in the action incurred such losses that it has in that respect been a victory for the Allies. Especially in the air has the advantage been to the Allies. [As the men arrived home they were greeted as if they had! succeeded in winning a victory. The rescue was so spectacular that it has appealed to the imagination of the Uverwaitea people of the whole world.

And incidents that cannot be forgotten are little ones! such as that where British boats carrying the men home bombed and threatened with torpedoes and machine gun attack, took time off to stop and rescue Germans who were struggling in the water and who would have been drowned but for the assistance given them by their enemles.

ATTITUDE MUST CHANGE

While Germans were preparing for this war years ago, the British people, led by Ramsay MacDonald and other idealists, were trying to show the world that the British people were ready to lead in peace as well as in war. They reduced the strength of the army and navy and tried to inculcate the principles of peace everywhere. For doing this they have been branded as decadent, outof-date, a dying race, no longer fit to rule. Germany and Italy, Japan and Russia have taken advantage of this lapse to increase their strength, inculcate in their people? warlike ideas and try to wrest the world leadership from the British Empire. These peace gestures must never be repeated. When the British and French have again asserted themselves they will have to teach the young people of the Empire that perpetual preparedness is the only safe! way.
