Mr. Churchill made only passing reference to the decision of Premier Petain of France to collaborate with Chancellor Adolf Hitler and expressed confidence that the navy would find means

Mr. Churchill said that 14,000 civilians and 300 soldiers had so far been killed by air raids on Britain with 20,000 wounded. IRISH BASES

The fact that Great Britain is unable to use Eire bases to refuel submarines and destroyers "is a most heavy and grievous burden," Churchill said.

Roosevellt Expects Endorsation By Voters Of His Principles-Speaks On Democratic Benefits

NEW YORK. Nov. 5: - In his final speech prior to the United States election today. President Franklin D. Roosevelt, from his home at Hyde Park last night, declared that the right of a people to choose its own elected representatives without coercion of any kind was the greatest safeguard of democracy.

Prior to a nation-wide address. the President spoke briefly at Poughkeepsie for his final public appearance before the election. He voted at Hyde Park today and will receive the results at his





ORIGIN OF HALLOWE'EN

Canadian soldiers may have reminded Icelanders and dwellers in the British Isles of some customs they have forgotten in the celebration of Hallowe'en.

Observance of the ancient Druid and Christian festival is not general in the old land, but it's not likely the Canadians, where-ever they are, forgot to carve a Jack O'Lantern, if they have an opportunity.

Scots and Welshmen once lit bonfires on the eve of November 1, the day dedicated by the Druids to the mount and evil spirits stalked the week.

Varied Methods

In Canada the methods of Hallowe'en importunity vary. Maritime youngsters disguise themselves and challenge neighbors to recognize them. - As a forfeit for their tactful failure to identify the revellers, householders will yield candy, apples and nuts. Quebec children follow a similar procedure. Ontario children are more aggressive in their demands and gather to chant outside stores until tribute is yielded in copper or in kind.

The apple is king of the prairie Hallowe'en, but the "candy-applenut" motif of the eastern festival is insidiously challenging the supremacy of the rich red fruit in the celebration. And Pacific Coast juveniles add their own touch with firecrackers which seldom appear in cities of eastern Canada.
