World Awaits Decision Of Vichy

Germany's Production Badly Smashed

Rebuilding of Hamburg Now Facing Germany; Invasion Coup Broken

NEW YORK, October 23.—The New York Times said today that damage caused by the Royal Air Force in Germany and German-occupied territory is "more serious and widespread" than admitted. The Germans are getting "a taste of their own medicine" and the newspaper questions if they can take it. The Herald-Tribune makes similar comment.

LONDON, October 23: (CP)—Authoritative quarters said today that they have reliable information that 75 per cent of Germany's productive capacity has been affected by British bombing and that the Germans have been forced to contemplate rebuilding Hamburg.

Wounded Mayor Running Again

MONTREAL, Oct. 23: (CP)—Madame Camillien Houde, mayor of Montreal, announced reports that her husband would seek reelection in the December 9 municipal elections. Other sources interested in Houde's candidature said that nomination papers would be forwarded to the mayor at an election camp where he would meet following his arrest under the War Measures Act. From there the papers will be forwarded to the city clerk after being signed by Houde. These sources said that, if nomination in this way is not permitted, "some other means will be found." In Ottawa the opposition is expressed that under existing legislation, there is nothing to prevent Houde's nomination.

NAVY WINS IN ACTION

LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—In the Red Sea the 1700-ton destroyer U.S. Kimberley has destroyed an Italian destroyer. This Italian destroyer and a second one attempted to attack a British convoy. The second Italian destroyer, the Kimberley, which was sunk in the second battle of the Red Sea, forced the Italian vessel to retreat and then finished her with torpedoes. The Kimberley carried on in spite of fire from shore batteries which damaged her slightly but two or three of which succeeded in silencing. Only three British sailors were injured in the spirited action.

Seventy-Five Special Trains To Take Children Away
 BERLIN, Oct. 23.—Seventy-five special trains during the next ten days will evacuate children from Berlin to East Prussia and Polish territory to make them safer from bombing attacks.

DIRECT HIT IS SCORED

Royal Air Force Bombers Strike Enemy Vessel In Channel
 LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—Royal Air Force bombers attacked an enemy cargo vessel of nearly two thousand tons off the Hook of Holland this afternoon, scoring a direct hit.

SEINER IN DIFFICULTY

Boat Wheenamok Rescued By Cape Naden And Crew Safe At Adenbrooke Island

ALERT BAY, Oct. 23: (CP)—Capt. Charles Johnson of the Canadian Fishing Co.'s packer Cape Naden reported here yesterday that he had sighted the Nelson Bros. Fisheries seiner Wheenamok wash one mile north of Adenbrooke lighthouse, north of Rivers Inlet, yesterday and towed it behind the lighthouse. The crew was safe at the light. Capt. Johnson reported. The Wheenamok was enroute from Prince Rupert to Vancouver.

STAYS AS DEMOCRAT

Farley Makes His Position Clear In Forthcoming Election
 NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Former Postmaster James A. Farley broke a long political silence yesterday by announcing that he will support the straight Democratic ticket at the forthcoming election. Differing on the third term issue, Farley had himself been a candidate for the Presidential nomination.

HITLER IS IN SPAIN?

London Hears Fuehrer and Franco Confering on Frontier

LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—A Reuters dispatch from Madrid quoted a German wireless report as saying that Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany and General Francisco Franco of Spain, accompanied by their foreign ministers, have arrived at the French-Spanish frontier where they are presumably conferring. Reports in Spain said that the leaders had had two meetings.

Lisbon earlier today reported General Francisco Franco enroute today to San Sebastian near the Franco-Spanish frontier where it was rumored he might meet the German foreign minister, Joachim von Ribbentrop. An official statement said that Franco was on his way to San Sebastian to meet "one of the world's leading personalities."

Bulletins

DIFFICULT TASK
 It was stated at Canadian National Railways offices here today that every effort was being made to recover bodies of victims from the engine which plunged through the flood-weakened Lorne Creek bridge last Saturday night. On account of the engine with tender and one freight car being buried in soft silt and driftwood and owing to rising and falling water, the task was proving difficult. It is possible that the bodies may not be recovered until it is possible to tackle the engine, which lies in an awkward position below the track, and haul it out. Up to noon today no bodies had been recovered.

KING ARRESTED
 SEVILLE, Spain—Former King Carol of Rumania and Madame Magda Lupescu were placed under virtual arrest today with the possibility of their being returned to Nazi-controlled Rumania. Also arrested is Ernest Urdareanu, former Rumanian cabinet minister, who accompanied the pair into exile.

RENT CONTROL
 OTTAWA—Extension of rent control to hitherto uncontrolled areas in Canada may be made soon. Mr. Justice W. M. Martin, rent administrator, hinted today.

BASES ON PACIFIC
 LONDON—Official quarters confirm that British naval bases on the Pacific Ocean are likely to be granted by Great Britain to the United States. Negotiations with that end in view are proceeding. This is in line with a similar statement made yesterday in New York by United States Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox.

RESORT TO FORCE
 TOKYO—The newspaper Asahi says that negotiations with the Netherlands East Indies for supply of oil to Japan have failed and that it may now be necessary to resort to force.

SHIP LOSS FOR WEEK

Total was 63,265 Tons, Far Below Extravagant Claims of Germans

LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—British, Allied and neutral merchant shipping losses for the week ending October 14 totalled 63,265 tons, somewhat larger than the weekly average for the war but far below extravagant German claims.

MAY HAVE TROUBLE

Detroit Auto Industry Has Many Alien Agents

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—Martin Dies, chairman of the committee on un-American activities, says that there are many agents of Germany, Italy and Russia in the automobile industry of Detroit and predicts acts of sabotage when the industry turns over from private automobile production to arms contracts.

WAR COUNCIL IN AUSTRALIA

Will Consist Of Four Members Of Government Party And Four Of Opposition

CANBERRA, Oct. 22: (CP)—Prime Minister R. G. Menzies announced yesterday the formation of a war council to assist and advise the government in the war effort. It will consist of four members of the government party and four of the opposition. The Prime Minister will be chairman. This is being done instead of forming a national government, a move Prime Minister Menzies had proposed but to which the Labor leader, John Curtin, had failed to agree.

NO FRILLS THIS TIME

Formalities at Opening of Legislature to be Reduced

VICTORIA, Oct. 23.—Formalities will be cut to the minimum when the session of the British Columbia Legislature opens next Tuesday. It will probably be the last session at which Lieutenant Governor Hamber officiates as his term expires April 30. The life of the present government continues until June 1, 1942, but it is not usual for the provincial government to continue for the full term of office.

Violent Battle Within Petain-Laval Cabinet Over France's Course

Issues Are Whether There Shall Be Declaration of War and If Navy is to be Yielded up to Nazis

BERNE, Switzerland, October 23: (CP)—As Europe awaits a possible Nazi coup which might bring France into the war with Germany against Great Britain, well-informed sources express the opinion that the future of Vichy and unoccupied France apparently hinges on the outcome of a violent battle inside the Petain-Laval government over whether to let what remains of the French war fleet "collaborate" with the Axis powers against Great Britain. It is said that battle lines at Vichy have been clearly drawn following a cabinet meeting last night and a conference between Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany and Vice-Premier Pierre Laval.

Meanwhile the Vichy foreign minister is reported to have said that there will be no military action by France against Great Britain and that France will not, under any circumstances, declare war against Great Britain. There was no question of a declaration of war against Great Britain or any other nation or the turning over of the French navy or air force to any other power. There was absolutely no foundation for reports that France was negotiating to fight against Great Britain or any other country.

Another report is that, while Germany wants the remnants of the French navy merged with that of the Reich, Vichy is not expected to participate directly in the war. The remnant of the French navy consists of one or more battleships and several cruisers and destroyers as well as smaller craft. The remainder of the French fleet was reported today to have gathered at Toulon.

Hitler was accompanied to his conference with Laval yesterday by Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop. The conference took place in France but at what point was not disclosed.

Italy's Position

According to reports from Rome, Count Ciano, Italian foreign minister, was on his way to Vichy to engage in discussions with the French government. Too easy terms for France might not be so acceptable to Italy which has long coveted Tunisia, Corsica, Nice, Savois, etc.

EDITORIAL

Natural Inference . . .

There are feelers out again regarding the possibility of a compromise peace between Britain and Germany. These feelers emanate from a source which indicates they are German inspired. The natural inference is that Germany would like to stop fighting just now and have time to recover and then complete her contemplated conquests at some future date.

Britain has already laid down the terms on which she will make peace. It is that the Nazis move out of the occupied countries including Poland, Norway, France, Holland, Belgium, Denmark, Czechoslovakia and Austria and restore to them full government powers. It is possible also that she will be asked to help rebuild London. Of course these are not the terms Germans would expect to discuss so it is quite useless to consider any discussion.

Greatly To Be Regretted . . .

The accident which occurred Saturday night when the engine and tender of the incoming train was wrecked and the two members of the engine crew killed is greatly to be deplored. Both men were well known railway employees and their deaths will be a loss to the company as well as to the town of Smithers where they resided. Doubtless there will be an official inquiry into the accident.

SMITHERS SADDENED

Railway Accident, Involving Two Pioneers of C.N.R. Service, Shocks Community

SMITHERS, Oct. 23—The town of Smithers was greatly saddened last Sunday when the news spread around that two of its well known citizens in the persons of Engineer J. C. Carpenter and Fireman S. J. Mayer were victims of a railway accident which took their lives when their train plunged into the waters of Lorne Creek which had been greatly swollen by the heavy rains of the past few days. The message of the disaster had reached Smithers late Saturday evening soon after the accident occurred but it was not until Sunday that it became generally known.

Both Mr. Carpenter and Mr. Mayer were among the oldest residents of Smithers. They came here in the early days and had raised their families in the town. Nearly all of the members of both families still reside here.

Mr. Carpenter would have reached the superannuation age in a short time. He had bought a piece of land at Dorreen near Pacific which he had been improving steadily with the view of taking up his permanent residence there when he was superannuated. During Saturday afternoon in Pacific he had been relating to his friends his plans for living on his farm.

Mr. Carpenter leaves a widow and two daughters in Smithers, a son John in Nelson and a daughter, Mrs. Art Hanford of Vancouver.

Mr. Mayer was one of the best known railway men along the whole line in Northern British Columbia, having been very active in the work of the Brotherhood of Railway Engineers and Firemen. He was secretary of the local organization for many years and a frequent delegate to conventions in Winnipeg, Montreal, Cleveland, Ohio and other places. He was the man that many of them brought their troubles to be straightened out and he will be greatly missed by many of the railway men and townspeople in general. Mr. Mayer was also an ardent and very active Liberal and no election was ever considered in the Skeena riding without the advice of "Sam." He took a leading part in all conversations and other campaign activities and he was one of the best posted men in the north on politics. He leaves besides his widow, three daughters and one son all living in Smithers, as well as a brother, Frank M. Mayer, of Smithers.

Both families have the deepest sympathy of the whole community and also of friends all along the line, in the tragic loss which they have sustained.

SMITHERS

Four Smithers boys, all members of the Royal Canadian Artillery at Prince Rupert, were among the passengers on the delayed train reaching here on Monday afternoon. These were Dick McDonald, Carl and Henry Anderson and Bob Laidlaw. They are home for a short leave. Laidlaw was to have been married in Teikwa on Saturday night to Miss Dora Wocyk but the wedding was delayed on account of the disruption in the train service and took place on Monday evening in the presence of the friends of the young couple.

Cy Arnett, head of the Arnett contracting firm of Vancouver, who has contracts for building a road at Pinchi Lake and a piece of the Skeena highway near Usk was a visitor in Smithers recently. He states that work is going on satisfactorily on both of these contracts. Mr. Arnett is well known to many of the old timers who knew him in the early days of railway construction on the Skeena River and he is always a welcome visitor to Smithers.

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
