TURKO-GERMAN TREATY LONDON-A surprise development in the European picture yesterday was the signing of a commercial treaty between Turkey and Germany. It is estimated to represent an annual trade value of £11,000,000.

TO POLE IN SUBMARINE MONTREAL Sir George Hubert Wilkins, noted explorer, is here on his way west. He is now working on a plan to reach the North Pole by use of a midget ice-breaking submarine. YOUTHFUL DELINQUENTS

Those in the best position to judge say that, in most cases of juvenile delinquency, the parents are chiefly in | fault. Judge Ernest L. Reeker, writing in the current number of the Rotarian, says that in most cases when youngsters get into trouble, a warrant should be issued! for the arrest of the parents. He has treated 1560 cases and he sent only fifty to correctional institutions and only six continued in a life of crime. He has little use for reform schools.

Judge Reeker, while primarily laying the blame for juvenile deliquency on the parents, says that "society itself has a pretty rotten record." He suggests that juvenile courts need cleaning up and that lawyers and judges need training. The conditions which bring about crime need eliminating. He urges leaving nothing undone so that the children of today do not populate the prisons of tomorrow.

LOSS TO STEWART

The death of the late H. W. M. Rolston, editor and proprietor of the Stewart News, has meant a great loss to Stewart and to the whole of the province. He took a keen interest in mining, as every Stewart resident is bound to do, and he exercised great care in his newspaper to see that the information he published in regard to mining developments in that section of the province was correct. He was keenly opposed to wildcatting and did everything possible to prevent it. In that way he earned the respect of the mining community.

BRITISH ISRAEL

Last week the Rotary Club heard an interesting address on late developments in their relation to the British Israel theory. The idea is that the lost ten tribes of Israel are the Anglo-Saxons and any member of the British Israel organization can explain exactly how they reach their conclusions in regard to this. What is more interesting is that, as a result of their interpretation of Bible prophecy. they were able to foretell the present conflict and its. trends. They also say that the final struggle for supremacy will be between the forces of righteousness and the forces of evil.

If the theory is correct, the result should prove very cheering for Canadians for the prediction is that, after much tribulation, the Allied forces will win.
