Norway Is On Spot Over Altmark

FINNS ARE HOLDING ON IN BATTLE

Bull Sunday in Karelian Isthmus Fighting as New Positions are Consolidated

New Victories For Defenders

Reds Still Paying Heavily in Loss of Life and Equipment—24 Planes Downed

DIVISION "ANNIHILATED"

HELSINGFORS, Feb. 19: (CP)—"Annihilation" of the Russian eighteenth division with 18,000 Russians killed and taken prisoner was reported today by the Finnish high command. Large quantities of war materials, including twenty tanks and thirty-six guns, were listed as booty in a "great victory" northeast of Lake Ladoga. A communique said the division "piece by piece" in tenacious fighting after surrounding it near Syskylä.

HELSINGFORS, Feb. 19.—Although it was admitted that the Finns had made an orderly and systematic strategic retreat five miles into the main defences of the Mannerheim Line, Baron Mannerheim, commander-in-chief, in addressing a message to the people, expressed confidence that the Soviets would never break through the line. He gave assurance that foreign help was now arriving for Finland in "appreciable quantity" and that new positions were being held and new victories won.

The Finnish high command Saturday night balanced announcement that its forces on Karelian Isthmus had withdrawn to new positions with reports of victories at Kuhmo on the eastern front, in which 3,000 Russians were killed, and elsewhere to the north.

The Isthmus battle continued in its seventeenth day Saturday with undiminished intensity but yesterday there was a weakening of the drive on the western sector with only local skirmishes while at the eastern end heavy artillery fire was successfully withstood, the Russians making no progress.

The Kuhmo sector battle lasted several days, ending in complete destruction of special Russian ski troops consisting of three battalions and reconnaissance detachments.

In the Karelian Isthmus fighting the Russians lost 4,000 in killed alone in three days, the Finns claim. Russia claims to have captured 450 fortified positions on the Mannerheim Line and to have reached almost the gates of Vilipori which is completely evacuated and largely in ruins.

Fighting in Air
Meantime fighting in the air continues with unabated intensity. In Russian air raids over south Finland five cities and towns were bombed and forty civilians are reported to have been killed.

The Finns were effective in response to the air attacks and twenty-four Russian planes are declared to have been brought down if not more.

There were two air raids on Helsinki Sunday.

German Ships Are Captured

LONDON, Feb. 19:—Having been captured at sea by Allied warships, the 3,000-ton German freighter Morea and the 2,542-ton Rostock were brought into west coast ports yesterday. The Morea had a huge cargo of 3,000 tons of manganese from Vigo, Spain, for Germany. The crew of seven officers and 23 men will be interned. This capture was by the French. There were no particulars of the rest of the cargo or crew. They were two of six German ships trying to run from Spain to Germany.

British Columbia Has More People

Election Enumerator Indicates 800,000 Population in Province

VICTORIA, Feb. 19: (CP)—Enumeration for the forthcoming federal election indicates a population in British Columbia of around 800,000 as compared with 690,000 shown by the last federal census. The Victoria voters' list is 20 percent heavier than in 1935.

Steamer Stopped By Shell Going Into Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Feb. 19: (CP)—A steamer, entering Vancouver at the week-end, gave the wrong signal to the naval examination service outside First Narrows and was stopped by a firing shot. Later she was allowed to proceed.

Baxter Critical Over Propaganda

Canadian Writer Comments on Work of Ministry of Information

LONDON, Feb. 18: (CP)—In paying tribute to Beaverbrook and Northcliffe as successful propagandists, Beverly Baxter, parliamentarian and writer and native of Toronto, takes a dig at the Ministry of Information in his new book "Men, Martyrs and Mountebanks."

He writes: "... In Britain there was also a realization that propaganda had become 50 times more difficult to put over than in 1918. As it was impossible to find people 50 times more competent than Beaverbrook and Northcliffe, the government did the opposite. They staffed an entire Ministry with people 50 times less efficient." He also gives a sidelight on Lord Gort, the British commander-in-chief in France. Gort returned from the last war to a private income of \$89,000 a year and a military record which included a triple D.S.O. and the V.C. His friends asked him what he was going to do. "I think," said Gort, "I would like to learn soldiering."

Baxter tells how "Fat Boy" Gort—a title his friends gave him—applied for a course at the Staff College and sat with pencil and paper to study a profession in which he had already achieved distinction.

War News

FRENCH AMBUSHED

PARIS—Twenty French soldiers are missing and believed dead as a result of a patrol falling into a German ambush before dawn today. It was the heaviest single skirmish or patrol casualty list for the French since the war began. Elsewhere strong German raids were repulsed. French soldiers on Saturday got into a German land mine field and one was killed, eight wounded with three missing. French outposts underwent heavy artillery fire but there was heavy counter-fire with no change in positions. Another German attack east of the Moselle failed entirely.

FRENCH ADVISE FINNS

HELSINGFORS—A high ranking French military officer has arrived here to advise the Finnish command in the war against Russia. He proceeds to the front to meet Baron Mannerheim, the Finnish commander-in-chief.

DASH FOR HOME

SAN PEDRO, Cal.—Forty German seamen, from vessels held in Mexican and South American ports, were scheduled to sail today aboard the Japanese steamer Meiyo Maru in an attempt to reach home.

TAKE U.S. SECURITIES

LONDON—Holders in the United Kingdom of sixty principal United States securities have been ordered to sell them to the Bank of England at current prices. This is in connection with the national fiscal program to stabilize currency for paying of war bills abroad.

SINO-JAPANESE WAR

HONGKONG—Chinese reports state that the Japanese have evacuated Nanning, capital of Swangsi Province, leaving large numbers of dead and wounded behind. The reports are officially denied by Japanese, a spokesman for whom says that the Japanese have no intention of making peace with Chiang Kai Shek. Landing near Amoy, the Japanese are sweeping inland into southern China, invading the southeast province of Fukien for the first time. There the attack seems for the time being at least to be centred. Japanese dispatches today reported that the French-operated Hanoi-Jumping railway had been bombed for the second successive day although both French and American governments had protested previous attacks on the road.

GERMAN DRIVEN OFF

COPENHAGEN—Danish anti-aircraft guns today drove off a German military plane which was flying over Danish territory in Schleswig near the frontier. The German plane was not hit.

NORWEGIAN LOSSES

OSLO—Since the start of the war forty-seven Norwegian ships have been sunk with loss of life of 309 crew men, an official statement says.

BRITONS CALLED OUT

LONDON—Men of the 24-year-old class are being called to register for military service on March 9, three weeks earlier than was expected. On Saturday 258,000 twenty-three-year-old conscripts were registered, the largest number for a single day since the war began.

LONDON—The Royal Air Force announces the failure to return or a second plane from a North Sea patrol. Another had failed to

First Mayor Of Alberni

Arthur Edward Waterhouse Passes Away In Victoria

VICTORIA, Feb. 19: (CP)—Arthur Edward Waterhouse, pioneer of Port Alberni, died here Saturday after a long illness. A native of England, he was 71 years of age. He came to Vancouver Island in the nineties, spent a year at Nanaimo and went to Port Alberni where he became the first mayor. He operated a general store there and established the Somass Hotel.

MUST BE ARMED

LONDON—The British Admiralty has decreed that all merchantmen leaving United Kingdom ports must be armed so as to protect themselves against air attack.

ITALIANS VOLUNTEER

PARIS—There is lack of official confirmation that ten thousand Italians in France, members of the Italian Society, are about to leave for Finland as volunteers to assist that country in the war against Russia. It was said that the Italians would be leaving within a few days and would soon be on the front lines helping a small nation outnumbered 40 to 1 in the defence of western civilization.

MORE SHIPS TO BOTTOM

One Dutch, Two Norwegian and One British Are Listed

LONDON, Feb. 19.—One Dutch, two Norwegian and two British ships were listed over the week-end as victims of the war at sea. The 4500 Dutch steamer Ameland was sunk by a mine just after leaving Rotterdam. The crew was rescued by another Dutch vessel. The Swedish freighters Linia and Lsmeb were sunk in the North Sea. The British ship Baronessa, 3600 tons, was sunk after an explosion in the North Sea. The captain and a fireman died in an open boat. 35 other crew members being saved by a naval trawler.

DESTROYER TORPEDOED

H.M.S. Daring Lost With 157 Officers and Men on Board While Engaged in Convoying Service

LONDON, Feb. 19: (CP)—The British destroyer Daring has been sunk by a German submarine torpedoed with loss of 157 officers and men. It is announced by the Admiralty. The Daring was sunk while she was engaged in convoy service. No information was given as to where she was sunk. The Daring was the sole British naval loss in a week-end of sea warfare which brought a spectacular series of victories to the Royal Navy. The Daring was a 1375-ton vessel and was seven years old. She was the first British destroyer to be torpedoed in the war.

Caught Between Great Britain And Germany, May Appeal to League

First Class International Issue is Developing Following Week-End Incident in Scandinavian Fjord

OSLO, February 19: (CP)—Finding itself in an extremely difficult position as a result of the incident of the German naval auxiliary prison ship Altmark, from which the British destroyer Cossack liberated more than 300 captive British seamen, the Norwegian government, through Foreign Minister Koht, indicated today that it might appeal to the League of Nations over the seizure of the prisoners within Norwegian waters.

Great Britain has sharply protested to Norway at a violation of neutrality in permitting the passage of a German naval vessel with prisoners on board. They should have been taken off at Bergen and, at least, interned. Norway, Great Britain complains, had every reason to know the character of this ship. Oslo is criticized for failing in its duty as a neutral.

On the other hand, Germany is burning with fury at the incident and demands not only recompense from Norway but insists that action be taken against Great Britain. There are dark threats from Berlin as to Nazi vengeance in settling the score with British "criminals" and "lawbreakers."

Norway protests to Great Britain at the "naval invasion of Norway." Oslo is fearful that Germany may take it as a signal for drastic reprisals.

The Altmark is still ashore in the Norwegian fjord where she was boarded by the British. Two of the German injured have died since the battle, making the total seven.

Harrowing Treatment

LONDON, Feb. 19.—British seamen, home after being released by the navy from the German prison ship Altmark, tell harrowing tales of the treatment they received in the verminous holds of the vessel. They reveal that they were rescued just in time as the Nazis had threatened to blow the ship up with them in it.

Dublin Hotel Is Raided By Army Of Eire

DUBLIN, Feb. 19: (CP)—There was uproar in downtown Dublin for a time yesterday when 150 armed soldiers raided a hotel and placed six men under arrest. The nature of the charges was not immediately disclosed.

WHEAT PRICES

WINNIPEG, Feb. 19: (CP)—Winnipeg wheat futures were up 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c Saturday with May closing at 88 1/2c. New York prices, after a heavy upswing on Friday, fell back to 1 1/2c with May closing at \$1.03.

Island Whaling Stations To Run Again This Year

VICTORIA, Feb. 19: (CP)—The Consolidated Whaling Corporation will operate on the Queen Charlotte Islands again this year after having been closed last season. The war has stimulated the market for oil products.

C.N.R. SHED BURNS

PORT MANN—A Canadian National Railway shed here was destroyed last night by fire. Burning of gasoline and acetylene tanks made the conflagration more spectacular. Most of the supplies for lines throughout British Columbia were destroyed with the shops. The round house and paint shops had a narrow escape. The building was 200 feet long and thirty feet wide. It was two storeys high. Company officials estimate the loss at \$100,000.

JAPAN WARNS U.S.

TOKYO—Japan issued a new warning today to the United States to relax its pressure. The attitude of Japan against the United States, it was said, has stiffened owing to the failure of United States to negotiate a new treaty and to the embargo against Japanese goods. The Japanese Foreign office spokesman described the situation with United States as "very serious." A final offer had been made to remedy the non-treaty status.

ROOSEVELT AT PANAMA

PANAMA—President Franklin D. Roosevelt arrived at the Panama Canal Zone Sunday to inspect the defences and confer with the military governor of the Zone. The President, stating that he was impressed with the defences, headed today into the Pacific in the direction of the Cocos Islands or Pearl Harbor. He was given a 21-gun salute on arrival here.

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AN AMERICAN TO AMERICANS

A few extracts from an article by Lawrence Hunt in the New York Times, January 14, 1940

"Pontius Pilate still lives."

"For the last twenty years we Americans have been fooling ourselves as Pilate tried to do in another practical situation."

"As a nation we have managed so far to escape from reality and the tough responsibilities of being a first rate power."

"Had Germany won (the last war) the Treaty of Versailles, in comparison with the German peace terms, would have seemed like the Sermon on the Mount."

"We wanted to preach, not work, for a world of peace and ordered liberty."

"England and France and associates fought the war for three years while we waxed rich at their expense."

"Let's stop talking about being 'bamboozled' by wily foreign diplomats. It's just another way of fooling ourselves and evading our responsibilities."

"America entered the last war for many reasons. The most immediate and compelling reason was simply that Germany, after repeated warnings and protests, continued to sink ships without warning with a loss of American lives. If Germany had not sunk our ships and, if American lives had not been lost in those actions, we would not have entered the war."

"English people, French people, American people believe in their hearts that individual freedom is one of those few things worth fighting for and if needs be dying for."

"The conquest of Austria, the ruins of Czechoslovakia, the massacre of the Poles, the attack on Finland, the torture of concentration camps, the bestial crimes against race and religion, purges, 'blood baths', Mein Kampf and the Communist manifesto—they are not English or French or American. No, we are not all alike. We know all about that. But how long shall we let these propagandists help us to delude ourselves?"

"Perhaps the loveliest self-delusion we are enjoying at the moment is the picture of America acting as a sweet, holier-than-thou peacemaker when the war ends."

"Suppose the Nazi-Communists win? Well, brothers and sisters, if that happens we'll have to do an awful lot more than preaching—far more than if we frankly and actively aided England and France now."

"If the Allies win without our aid, by what right will we have a voice in the peace terms? What will have been America's contribution? A few cheers, lots of 'moral support' and words for cash down. Again I say don't let the propagandists fool us. Let's not fool ourselves. We should at least be too adult for that."

"We are asked to shut our eyes to the most blazing truths, to avert our gaze from the plain facts of our contemporary life, to stuff our ears and harden our hearts so that somehow in some way we can escape from the tough realities of this world and as a nation evade the tasks which nature, our moral traditions and the uncompromising forces of destiny have set for us to do."

"In due course Uncle Sam will rub his eyes, stand up, take off his coat, and do a man's job in a hard but worthwhile world."

DEATH OF PRINCIPAL

Arthur Sutton, Head of Local High School, Passes Away After Illness Of Two Weeks

Arthur Sutton, principal of Booth Memorial High School, passed away at 7:50 Sunday morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for two weeks. News of Mr. Sutton's death was received by the community with a deep sense of shock and regret, particularly among the young people with whom he had working in his pedagogical capacity during the past eight years. Since his admittance to the hospital, his condition had been recognized as serious but he had shown signs of definite improvement until Saturday when a turn for the worse set in, culminating in his death.

The late Mr. Sutton was born December 15, 1899, at Burslem, Stoke-on-Trent, Staffordshire, England, his parents having been identified with the Staffordshire pottery industry. Near his birthplace he received elementary schooling until the age of thirteen when he himself entered the pottery works in which he was employed until about sixteen years of age.

In 1915 he commenced a year's course of wireless study in Manchester and was successful in obtaining a position through the Marconi Company as wireless operator on various merchant marine vessels plying between Singapore, India, Hong Kong, Japan, Northern Russia and other ports during the war. After the war he continued as wireless operator on vessels of several steamship lines. He had many interesting experiences including that of being operator on wooden vessels built in Victoria towards the close of the war which were taken over to England after many difficulties. He also held posts on the trans-Pacific run of the Empress of Russia and local coast passenger vessels.

Takes Higher Education

Mr. Sutton left the sea in 1922 to take a High School course at Columbian College, New Westminster, and entered Provincial Normal School at Vancouver in 1924 to train as a teacher. A year's training at Normal School was followed by entry into the University of British Columbia in the fall of 1925 with graduation as a Bachelor of Arts in the spring of 1929. During three of the summers during his college years he resumed his wireless activities as operator at certain canneries along the coast. In the fall of 1929, Mr. Sutton was appointed as principal of Agassiz High School in the Fraser Valley and he held that post until 1932 when he came to Prince Rupert to join the local High School staff, being associated with the English department of the school. At the beginning of the fall term of 1937, one year before the High School was removed from King Edward to Booth Memorial school quarters, Mr. Sutton became principal of the school, continuing as such until his death. He took a great interest in extra-curricular and student work as well as in the Aurora school publication. Mr. Sutton also engaged actively in church work and was a member of the session of First United Church. He was a member of the Canadian National Recreation Association Lawn Bowling Club.

In August 1932, just before coming to Prince Rupert, Mr. Sutton married Miss Mary Kathleen Clarke of Vancouver, daughter of the late R. G. L. Clarke, formerly Dominion fruit and vegetable commissioner for British Columbia. He is survived by two children, Wendy, aged six, and Barrie, five. They will have the deep sympathy of many friends in their deep and sudden bereavement.


