Churchill Speaks In Parliament

Great Britain, Even Subjugated And Starving, Will Never Yield To Nazi Tyranny, Premier Says

Suggests That New World May Have to Rescue and Liberate the Old—"Colossal Military Disaster" Ended in "Miracle of Delivery"

LONDON, June 4: (CP)—Great Britain will never surrender or give up the struggle against Nazi tyranny, Prime Minister Winston Churchill declared in the House of Commons today. Even if Great Britain were subjugated and starving, the Empire across the seas, armed and guarded by the British fleet, would carry on the struggle until the New World sets forth to the rescue and liberation of the Old. Meantime, he warned the country to be ready for any eventuality. Mr. Churchill announced that 30,000 men of the British Expeditionary Force had been killed, wounded or were missing but, in a "miracle of delivery," 335,000 men of the Allied armies—"the whole root and core"—had been evacuated from Flanders. The Prime Minister admitted that last week he himself had feared these forces would be annihilated. However, they had been delivered to carry on the war. The Premier warned, however, that wars were "not won by evacuations" and it must not be forgotten that Great Britain and France had suffered a "colossal military disaster" on the field of battle. Great Britain had lost enormous quantities of materials, guns and transport vehicles—some of the best in its possession—and an effort to make up the loss would delay expansion of military strength. The result of the Flanders campaign Mr. Churchill freely admitted was to leave France weaker, Belgium lost, large industrial and mining areas in German hands, Channel ports held by Nazis and Great Britain facing invasion. The Prime Minister said that an entire force of 4,000 had been practically wiped out at Calais. He paid high tribute to all the armed forces and said that the defences of London were ready for combat. "The Allies will stand together to the last man," declared Mr. Churchill. Mr. Churchill told a listener that it might be convenient to hold a secret session next Tuesday to discuss home defence against German attack.

EVACUATION DIFFICULT

Savage Attacks On Dunkerque—Other French Fronts Quiet

PARIS, June 4: (CP)—The French Admiralty announced today that the last Allied naval and army units had abandoned Dunkerque entirely to the Germans after destroying all supplies. It was admitted that seven French destroyers and a supply ship had been lost in carrying out the embarkation but it was said the port was made completely useless before the last defenders left.

PARIS, June 4: (CP)—German land, sea and air forces renewed savage attacks on Dunkerque yesterday and continued them today, a military spokesman said, making evacuation of remaining Allied forces there "increasingly difficult" although continuing steadily. The attacks, however, failed to halt withdrawal operations. Except for minor artillery engagements, other French fronts, including the Somme and Aisne, reported quiet and a spokesman said that both Allies and Germans have reached a "period of waiting in which each side is preoccupied with preparations."

There were indications today that Germany was about to shift its military weight from Flanders to other regions. Reinforcements were known to be moving up to the Aisne and Saar Rivers. Meantime German troops have reached the outskirts of Dunkerque to find the town nothing but a shambles following the fierce fighting of the past week during the rearguard battle of the Allies to cover the evacuation. From London it was reported today that a large proportion of further Allied Forces which had been landed since yesterday at British ports were French. Several of the motor torpedo boats which the Germans have been using at Dunkerque to hamper the evacuation have been sunk.

ANKARA, June 4:—The Premier of Turkey warns the people to be "ready for anything." Turkey, while wishing to be non-belligerent, is ready to beat off any aggression.

GOOD WORK BY POLICE

No Complaints In Regard To Handling Of Sabotage And Espionage In Canada

OTTAWA, June 4: (CP)— Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, stated yesterday that the public of Canada must accept the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and other police bodies to take care of subversive elements and in connection with espionage and sabotage. There was no need to become stampeded.

There had been no serious complaints in regard to police work in connection with these matters after nine months of war, said Mr. Lapointe.

Le Havre Is Raided

PARIS, June 4—German bombing planes dropped high explosives on the region of the important port of Le Havre today. A number of private houses were hit and people were entombed in the wreckage. Six planes took part in the raid and some were brought down. The first raid was during the night and there was another today. Fires were started by incendiary bombs. A British radio broadcast today said German planes had bombed Cherbourg.

CANADA IS DOING BIT

Dominion Troops Twice Ready For Embarkation—McNaughton Aided Evacuation—Britons Equal To Anything

OTTAWA, June 4: (CP)—Since the invasion of the low countries Canadian forces overseas on two occasions have been at debarkation points ready to take their places in the front lines, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King told the House of Commons today. He said that Major General McNaughton, Canadian general officer commanding, had made a personal reconnaissance of the battle area in Northern France and Belgium and had turned in a valuable report which aided in preparation of plans for the retreat from Flanders.

If the speed of the German rush through the low countries gave cause for great alarm there was in the evacuation of the British Expeditionary Force even greater cause for believing that the Allies will prove more than equal in any circumstance, said Mr. King.

The Prime Minister disclosed that Canadian troops had been sent to the British West Indies to relieve British forces there and some Canadian destroyers were now serving with the Royal Navy in British waters. Some British ships had been assigned to Canadian waters.

NO DOUBT OF ITALY

Moving Steadily Toward War—Council of Ministers Meets—To Strike This Week?

ROME, June 4.—The Italian council of ministers, in session today with Prime Minister Benito Mussolini presiding, took another step towards war by approving a series of measures putting Italy and its African Empire on a basis of conflict. Details of the measures were not announced but one, it was reported, provided for the entering into "international agreements of various kinds."

No longer is there any doubt anywhere of Italy entering the war on the side of Germany and against France. The only speculation is in regard to when and the general consensus of opinion appears to be that it will be before the end of the week.

Munich And Frankfurt Are Bombed By Allies Taking Reprisal For Paris Raid

PARIS, June 4.—War Ministry spokesmen announced today that German planes had bombed airports and industrial plants of Munich, Hitler's favorite city, and Frankfurt in reprisal for the German raid on Paris yesterday. The cities were scored on one of Germany's biggest factories by French planes that raided these cities, the Air Ministry announced. Activities were confined to military objectives.

It was also announced that British aviation had engaged in reprisals, bombing railroad stations, oil refineries and other industrial objectives in the Ruhr region.

Several German radio stations closed down suddenly last night as the raids proceeded, evidently so that their beams would not aid the Allied planes in their raids.

NEXT MOVE IS AWAITED

Paris, Following Air Raid, Speculates on Future—Mass Offensive Is Anticipated

OVER 200 DEAD PARIS, June 4: (CP)—The Nazi air raid on the Paris region Monday took a toll of 906 victims of whom 254 were killed, it was officially announced tonight.

PARIS, June 4.—With indications that the casualty list as a result of yesterday's German air raid, the worst so far in the war, was far greater than originally estimated, Paris today proceeded with the clearing up of debris and calmly awaited the next development of the war. A new German offensive against France, it was felt by observers, might coincide with Italy's entry into the war. Preparations are being made to meet a renewed grand military offensive with the use of every military weapon known and further aerial bombardments probably on a great scale. The new German offensive, it is believed, will probably start between the Somme and the Aisne.

Details of Raid The German air raids yesterday to large extent appeared to be directed against military objectives although there was no very evident discrimination about sparing civilian institutions. For instance, a hospital was bombed and four persons killed and eighty injured. Twenty-five towns outside the city itself were attacked and fires started by incendiary bombs were still burning in some of these today. Extensive damage was done to industrial plants including a large automobile factory now engaged in airplane production.

The list of raiding planes brought down yesterday is placed at seventeen but there may have been more. Today was again clear, hot and sultry in Paris, "perfect for air raids," but none developed.

The French government acknowledged today that airdromes, factories and railroads had been damaged in the German air raid on Paris yesterday and authorized sources said that, in view of this evidence that bombing had been aimed at military objectives, the French did not feel justified in making reprisals for civilian casualties.

SWISS GUNS DOWN NAZIS

German Planes Ignore Neutral Country in Passing Over on Raids

BERNE, June 4: (CP)—The Swiss High Command announced today that two or three German planes are believed to have been shot down in an air battle over the Swiss Jura mountains in which one Swiss plane was brought down and its pilot killed.

German bombers, presumably from squadrons, are reported to have attacked the Rhone Valley in France today.

The Nazi planes crossed the Swiss frontier despite anti-aircraft fire.

Canadians On Sniping Duty In North Sea

LONDON, June 4: (CP)—Thirty-four members of the Canadian First Division are seeing action in manning protective Lewis guns aboard merchantmen in the North Sea forming seventeen sniper teams. It is believed that one pair shot down a Nazi plane swooping on a convoy of trawlers.

# EDITORIALS

## BOMBING OF CIVILIANS

It seems as if the ruthless bombing of civilians was about to commence. The people of Great Britain expected it from the beginning when they evacuated children from the centres of population. The people of France must have known it was likely to come. They knew they were fighting a ruthless enemy that would stop at nothing.

It is a horrible thing, this modern warfare. Hitler has been told by the Allies again and again that, if his planes bombed either London or Paris, Berlin would get a similar dose. So far Berlin has always escaped war but may not for long.

## DOROTHY TO IL DUCE

In a syndicated article published in a chain of newspapers in United States and Canada, Dorothy Thompson, journalist, addresses herself to Il Duce. She says in part:

"Duce: Before you take your nation into this war, think well and long concerning the United States of America. We are an odd people, Duce. Our democracy may seem to you sprawling and uncompact, composed of all the peoples of Europe, divided in its opinions, quarrelling among ourselves.

"But that is only one America. The other is the America that flies together in an emergency; that being slow to anger is terrible in wrath; that detesting imposed discipline can impose it in itself; that being individual can be, briefly or for long, united in gregarious self-discipline.

"Although we detest aggression—particularly the aggression of the strong against the weak—we despise the vulture who waits until his prey is locked in a life and death struggle and then falls on him from behind."

After telling of the immense capacity for production in the United States she goes on to tell how pleased Italians in that country appeared when there seemed a likelihood that Italy would be friends with Great Britain. She shows how, when the United States comes in, she will not be a nation exhausted with wars. "We shall have no sympathy for the vulture, for the profiteer on the misfortunes of others." She then concludes with:

"Duce, your industrialists do not want this war. Your peasants do not want this war. The women of Italy do not want this war. Only a part of your youth wants it now before it has begun when you can sway them with your magnetism. But, if this war becomes worldwide and is long, there will be consequences for your youth and for your nation which you too in the watches of the night must have thought about and turned, troubled, on your pillow."

## THEIR LEAD IS REDUCED

Boston Red Sox Now Only Have One Game Margin Over Cleveland Indians—Yanks Still Forge Ahead

NEW YORK, June 4: (CP) — Cleveland Indians, by blanking the Philadelphia Athletics four to nothing at Shibe Park yesterday, pared to one game the American League margin of leadership of the Boston Red Sox who were beaten out 7 to 4 by the Chicago White Sox. Meanwhile, the New York Yankees continued their pennantward drive by pounding out a 7 to 1 victory over the St. Louis Browns. The third place Detroit Tigers were beaten 9 to 3 by the Washington Senators in the fourth American League game of the day, the Senators, as a result, moving into sixth place ahead of Philadelphia.

Three close games were played in the National League, resulting in victories for the top three teams and leaving the standings unchanged. The leading Cincinnati Reds had a 3 to 2 victory over Boston Bees, the second place Brooklyn Dodgers defeated the Chicago Cubs by a similar score while the third place New York Giants defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 4 to 3.

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## ROAD WORK DISCUSSED

Continuation of Usk — Cedarvale Link All Depends Upon Federal Assistance, Chamber of Commerce Advised

In answer to representations that the present contractors, Mannix & Co., be allowed to finish the Usk-Cedarvale gap in the northern provincial highway, Premier T. D. Pattullo, in a letter to the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night, stated that the government had this in mind but it was all a question of money being available.

E. T. Kenney, M.L.A. for Skeena, advised the Chamber that the Premier was fully seized with the importance of the matter but the financial situation was none too encouraging and everything depended on the present visit of Mr. Pattullo to Ottawa. Mr. Kenney suggested that the matter also be taken up with the federal member, Olof Hanson, in the hope of being able to obtain sufficient further funds to carry on for the meantime at least.

Arthur Dixon, chief engineer for the provincial department of public works, explained that the Usk-Cedarvale work was being carried on jointly by the Provincial and Dominion governments and its continuation would depend upon federal policy.

H. G. Perry, M.L.A. for Fort George, and Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, also wrote on the subject.

The outcome of the discussion was a motion by Theo Collart and G. W. Nickerson again drawing to the attention of Premier Pattullo that the contractors were ready to accept government bonds in payment of carrying on the Usk-Cedarvale work.

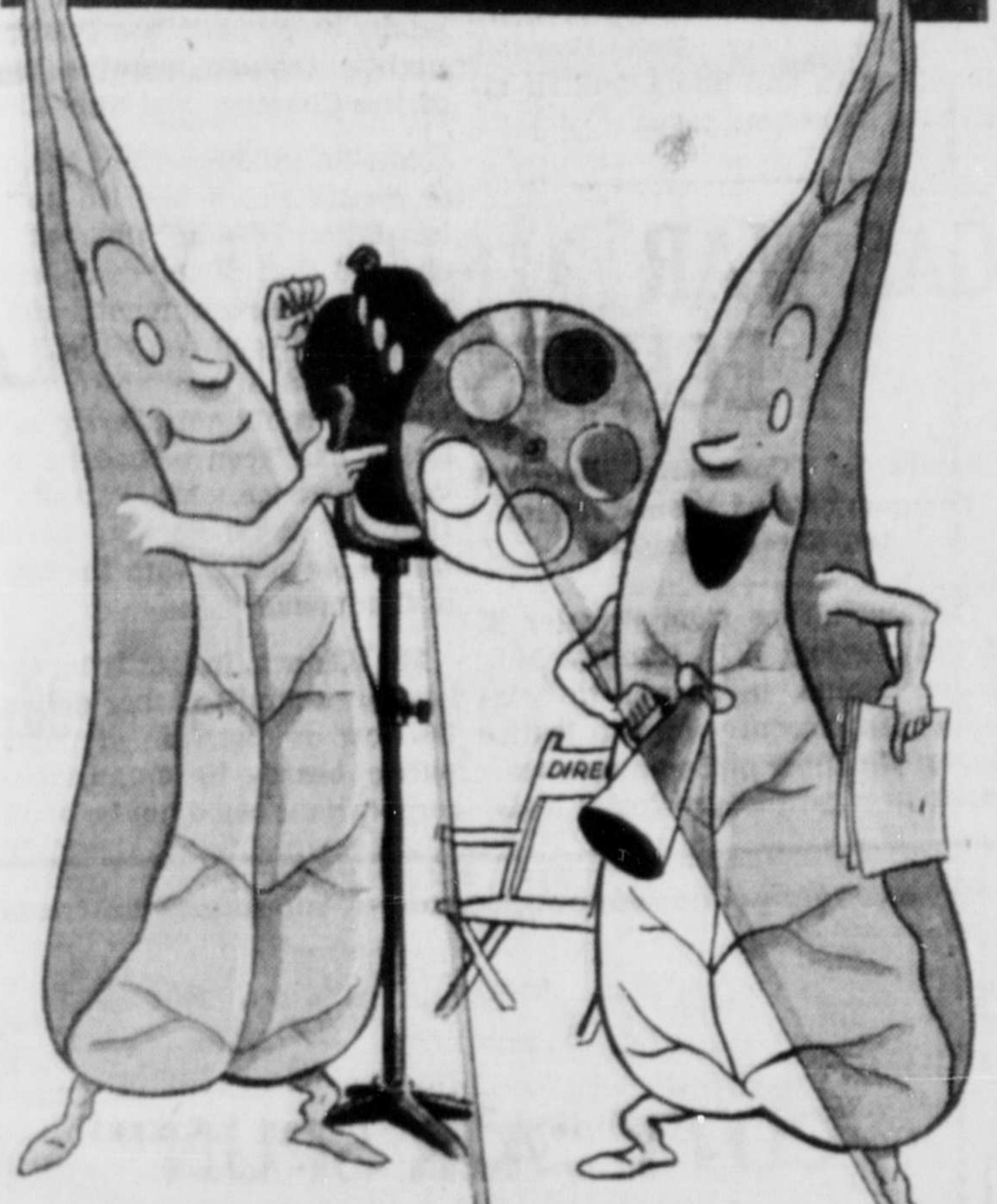

connection with Canada's war effort and, with that end in view, decided at last night's meeting, on motion of G. W. Nickerson and F. A. MacCallum, to take up with Olof Hanson M.P. the possibility of putting the plant to work in addition to shipbuilding speeding up of which is also being sought.

The matter came up at last night's meeting with the reading of a letter from Mr. Hanson in which he stated, following a visit to Montreal, he was satisfied that Canadian National officials were doing all in their power to get the work under way here as quickly as possible. He felt that the Prince Rupert plant was getting a full measure of consideration in delivery of materials.

Mr. Nickerson felt that there was too much indirect control of the work at the local plant. This plant he was told was as well equipped as any to carry out war contracts. He believed there were unnecessary delays in orders having to pass between Montreal and Prince Rupert via Vancouver and Winnipeg. The entire local management should be in Prince Rupert, he felt, and the local plant should report direct to Montreal, eliminating Vancouver and Prince Rupert.

Theo Collart believed that the local plant could readily be used for the manufacture of munitions and possibly other war materials.

## Air Service For Rupert

Better Air Mail Connection With East Still Being Sought—Commercial Service With South

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its meeting last night, decided to continue its efforts towards having improvements brought about in the air mail service between Prince Rupert and Eastern Canada. Not satisfied with an explanation from G. H. Clarke, inspector of postal service, that Prince Rupert's air mail was already being routed to the best advantage, the Chamber, on motion of G. W. Nickerson and Theo Collart, decided to follow the matter up with a view, if possible, to having removed a delayed connection at Edmonton on east-bound air mail.

The Chamber is also continuing work on the possibility of interesting commercial air companies in the establishment of a regular service between Prince Rupert and Vancouver. It was pointed out that the commercial companies would desire to have some assurance that there were possibilities of having sufficient volume of business before interesting themselves. F. A. MacCallum offered the suggestion that commercial air services between Alaska and Seattle might include Prince Rupert on their schedule.

## Consolidating Of War Appeals

Local Chamber of Commerce Endorses Move to Place All National Blanket Basis

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its regular monthly dinner meeting last night, endorsed a proposal emanating from Toronto that all war charity appeals in Canada should be consolidated on a national basis in the interests of increased efficiency and effectiveness in the raising of such funds. The endorsement of such a principle was recommended by the trade and commerce committee of the local chamber consisting of R. G. Hopkins, J. J. Payne, John Bulger and C. C. Mills.

F. A. MacCallum asked if such a move had been endorsed by such bodies as the Canadian Red Cross Society, the Salvation Army, etc., which were carrying out war service activities. President W. M. Watts, reading further from correspondence in regard to the proposed consolidation plan, advised that provision was made to take care of the Red Cross, etc. Already many eastern Boards of Trade had endorsed the move.

## LIMITATIONS OF PROFITS

Local Chamber of Commerce Endorses Dominion Chamber Motion With Rather Pointed Rider

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its meeting last night, endorsed a message of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce to Premier King urging drastic government action was necessary to accelerate Canada's war effort on a more comprehensive basis of mobilization of economic resources. At the suggestion of G. W. Nickerson the motion of endorsement was passed with the addition of a rider that there should be no objection by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce to a limitation of profits on war business of five percent and possibly elimination of profits altogether.

Mr. Nickerson had somewhat pointed remarks to say about people who talked about speeding up the war effort and at the same time protested so loudly when there was suggestion of limitation of their profits on war orders.

## Whifflets From The Waterfront

Capt. Rod Davis of the New Metlakatla, Alaska, combination halibut boat and seiner, Mary Lou, which was in port yesterday with a catch of halibut, reports a decided dearth of spring salmon this season so far in southeastern Alaska where trollers are doing very poorly. So scarce are the fish that such grounds as Cape Omaney and Forrester Island, where normally there are large numbers of trollers, are practically deserted now. However, expectations are that there should be a good run of pink salmon this year. That is what the old timers anticipate. Capt. Davis said he did not think he would bring any more catches into Prince Rupert. "There is too much red tape and running around here," he said "and the prices for fish are no better than in Ketchikan."

Making a special voyage to Alaska with a party of 186 members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers from all parts of Canada and the United States who have been in convention in Vancouver, C.P.R. steamer Princess Alice, Capt. Robert Thomson, arrived in port at 8:15 this morning and sailed at 10 a.m. for Skagway and other northern points whence she will be back here next Sunday afternoon southbound. It was the first call of the Princess Alice here this year.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, returned to port at 10:25 this morning from Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.

## PROTECTION OF RUPERT

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its regular monthly dinner meeting last night, decided to appoint a committee which will confer with the authorities with a view to ensuring adequate safeguards for local vulnerable points from sabotage or espionage in this time of war.

G. W. Nickerson appeared to be in doubt as to whether adequate protection was being given to local vulnerable points. Royal Canadian Mounted Police were supposed to be in charge of this but he saw few around Prince Rupert.

A motion by J. J. Little and Peter Lakie covered endorsement of a resolution of the Winnipeg Young Men's Board of Trade that Canada's home defensive measures be strengthened, particularly with a view to protection from possible subversive activities of enemy aliens and "fifth columnists," and asked for the appointment of a committee to make a comprehensive report on the local situation. This motion was carried.
