London, March 22.—Balfour's motion for the rejection of the minimum wage bill was defeated and the government measure passed its second reading in the Commons last night by a majority of 123, a larger majority than the ministerial leaders themselves had hoped for. The vote stood 348 to 225. The Laborites and Nationalists voted with the government. The labor leaders, though they tabled a number of amendments, one for the inclusion of their schedule minimum wages, are now expected to be satisfied with the inclusion of five shillings and two shillings as the minimum wages.

Unless, as now expected, the miners resume work at the beginning of the week, the dislocation of trade and the distress resulting will become unprecedented. It is announced that the Great Western Railway, which up to the present because of enormous coal reserves has been able to maintain a full service, will begin to cut down next week.

From all great industrial districts come tales of increasing destitution, intensified by the cold and inclement weather.

Paisley thread mills closed today, letting out 12,000 workers. All parts of the country are congested by idle shipping. It is estimated that tonnage amounting to 400,000,000 tons is lying idle at Southampton docks, including the liners Oceanic, Majestic, St. Paul, New York and Philadelphia.

CLEVEREST BOXING PRINCE RUPERT HAS YET WITNESSED

Joe Bayley and Paddy Scott Produced the Goods to the Delight of a Crowded Opera House---Gaily Went the Whole Twenty Rounds Without a Flicker--Prince Rupert Athletic Club is Proud of Its Achievement

The initial effort of the Prince Rupert Athletic Club to encourage many sports was a success from every point of view. There was a large crowd at the opera house last night, who went away thoroughly pleased with the box-

ing presented. In the two boxers selected, Joe Bayley and Paddy Scott, the club had two clever youngsters who put on a great stunt. That it lasted for twenty rounds was a surprise to all, and there was quite a lot of betting that it would not go over ten rounds.

Bayley was the favorite, probably for the reason that he had been here before and his work was known. But in Scott he found no mean opponent. In fact, many of the fans said if the fact, many of the fans said if the should have received the decision. Not that there was a single grumble at the decision of Referee C. Nelson Dunn. Both men were on their feet at the finish and fit for several more rounds.

Two clever boys, John Sherman and Gustav Soleman, who showed both style and speed, were heartily cheered.

When Scott and Bayley shook mitts one could see at a glance how evenly they were matched physically. Both had weighed in at 131 pounds and both are of the same age. Of their boxing style Scott appeared to be what the fans call the most "classy," and he seemed to have the better punch. But perhaps Bayley was not seen at his best. He fractured his right hand some time ago, and before the conclusion of the bout complained of his "bum right mitt." Notwithstanding this he put up a plucky fight, in the three last rounds going very strong and keeping Scott particularly busy. The last round was a slugging match. Had the bout been decided on points there would have been difficulty in

making a decision, sometimes one getting the best of it and sometimes the other, but neither scoring a decisive advantage, so evenly were they matched.

Joe Roerig, on behalf of the athletic club, introduced the boxers to the public in a neat little speech and the cheering it brought out made him blush.

Round 1. After brief fiddling Bayley led, landing a light left to head and they clinched. Both got in body jabs and Bayley a left smash to face that raised the first cheers. Several clinches followed, Bayley generally leading with left swing to head which Scott cleverly ducked. Gong sounded. Even.

Round 2. Same tactics, Bayley leading, Scott ducking the clinch. Scott slipped near ropes as round ended and Bayley was applauded. Even.

Round 3. Bayley rushed and landed left to face, Scott countering with heavy right hook to body. Bayley got in two light lefts to face, but Scott landed a heavy punch on nose which drew claret amid loud cheers. Bayley woke up and got in some kidney jabs. Scott's round.

Round 4. Scott made two or three good shots for a knockout, a succession of clinches following. Twice Bayley broke Scott's guard but only landed lightly. Scott getting in two heavy jabs to body. Scott gave a smashing left swing to body land they clinched. Scott led and landed straight left to face, Bayley swung right to head and the boys were getting warmed up as gong sounded. Even.

NEW POWER BOAT PORT ESSINGTON

Large Boat Built for Freight and Passenger Traffic Between Rupert and Essington Makes Her Appearance in Harbor Today.

A powerful new launch, the "Port Essington," has appeared in the harbor today, ready to begin a new enterprise in regular freight and passenger service between Prince Rupert and Port Essington. The new power boat, which is forty-six feet long and very beamy, with abundant room for freight and considerable comfort for passengers charter-

ing her, is owned by John T. Adams and his brother. The craft was built recently at Essington, and engaged last week. She will make about nine miles an hour with her twenty horse power Standard heavy duty engine, and will be seen often in Prince Rupert during the summer. The boat altogether is very like the Rover, without mast, however, and has hatches aft for heavy freight. The power is housed forward under the high pilot house.

TRIED TO TEAR UP LAUNCHMEN'S PETITION

William Manson's Ring Seeks to Intimidate Power Boat Petitioners Against Electioneering by Government Steamers

That the power boat owners of Prince Rupert should dare to prepare a petition to the government authorities at Ottawa asking that the Dominion government steamships should not be allowed to compete with launch owners in connection with their legitimate business in carrying election canvassers and candidates with their representatives about the waterways of this far-spread constituency of Skeena has already caused furious indignation amongst supporters of William Manson.

Threats have been made to launch owners and hirers right

at Prince Rupert waterfront that if they so much as dare to sign such a petition or help it along in any way they may say goodbye to all hope of government patronage for the future.

Amongst those so threatened is F. M. Davis of the Davis float, who does a considerable business in launch hiring and naturally resents the fact that the government steamers Falcon and William Joliffe should have been used in illegal competition with the power boats.

W. G. Thomas, owner of the power boat Alice B, which he has had equipped and finished specially for the better class pas-

senger chartering business in these waters, was another threatened in the most marked manner in the presence of many witnesses.

It was Joe Scott who threatened him with the withdrawal of all chance of government patronage unless he withdrew his name from the petition. An attempt to snatch the petition and threats to tear it up were made, declares this power boat owner, who is indignant at the unfair and illegal use made of the Dominion government steamers by William Manson and his followers of the Ring in Rupert.

LITTLE LIBERTY OF THE PRESS.

In British Columbia there are many newspapers, but little liberty of the press. Most of the British Columbia newspapers are no more at liberty to express themselves independently than the corner saloon, which is owned by a certain brewery, is at liberty to sell another brewery's beer. The Bowser-McBride oligarchy, which holds the Province of British Columbia in fee simple, owns most of the newspapers.

For a long time British Columbia's two bosses, Bowser and McBride, have been running a feudal system of their own in this province, and of course a modern feudalism must have vassal newspapers as surely as a fire must have sticks.

Of course they receive suitable rewards in the form of advertising and job printing and copious subsidies and bonuses and premiums. But how the bosses reduce them to such vassalage, such servitude, and made absolute flunkies of them all, would be a hard question to answer. The little words serfdom, bondage and slavery do not properly express the shackled condition of these newspapers.

Take any of these papers that wear the yoke, for example. You expect a party paper to support its party, of course. But these papers not only do that: they are servile. Their obvious flunkiness makes you sick. They not only follow the government, but they follow at its chariot wheels with chains around their necks. Such cowering, crawling, grovelling obsequiousness is hard to understand.

The government's leading organs fawn upon the two bosses like dogs. Servile flattery and lick-spittle abasement are apparent in every line of editorial matter touching the government and its rule, and the news columns are full of "stories" that would lead the person not supplied with local knowledge to believe that the two greatest men in the world were Bowser and McBride, that their government was an absolutely perfect example of representative government.—Bruce, in the Saturday Sunset.

The morning paper of Prince Rupert is admittedly a government supported paper. It receives practically all the government patronage. The Empire for some reason did not appear to catch a place in this respect. For several days after the opening of the campaign the evening contemporary did not commit itself to any great extent upon the issues of the election. Then behold, it branches out with two large political advertisements on its first page and a lengthy editorial on the good in William Manson, the same William Manson whom the editor of that paper criticized in the strongest terms only a few months before. Certainly the situation here in Prince Rupert bears out the statement of Bruce.

THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND FARMERS COMING TO CANADA

LARGEST IMMIGRATION FROM UNITED STATES TO CANADA
NORTHWEST EXPECTED THIS SEASON—EXODUS FROM
AMERICAN FARMS ALREADY BEGUN.

Chicago, March 18.—Notwithstanding the attitude of R. B. Bennett, the Calgary members of Parliament, who would stop American immigration into the northwest if he could, his former associate, J. S. Dennis, the right hand of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, and in charge of the extensive landed interests of the Canadian Pacific, stated enthusiastically at this morning's session of the Canadian Land Agents' convention that a great wave of American settlers would move into Western Canada this year.

He predicted that not less than 200,000 American farmers would take up homes in Canada before 1913. It is thought that the missionary work now being undertaken by the company will result in an additional 100,000. The statement was made in the presence of about 40 general land agents connected with the Canadian Pacific's undertaking to interest the American farmers in the Canadian Northwest. These agents have under them 3,000 sub-agents, many of whom are in attendance at the convention. With the adjournment of the

convention these agents will go into every state and territory of the republic to exploit Canadian opportunities and induce immigration. "Based on carefully tabulated figures supplied by our agents," said Mr. Dennis, "I may prophesy that 200,000 settlers will acquire land in Western Canada this season. There is renewed interest among prospective customers owing to the administration offering in addition to Alberta rich wheat lands in Saskatchewan and mixed farming lands in Manitoba.

It is thought that in addition to the 200,000 practically assured the campaign of exploitation just being started by the railroad company will result in an additional 100,000 American settlers migrating to Canada, or 300,000 in all this year. The movement is already under way. A solid train of settlers' effects left Minneapolis yesterday. Officials of the Soo Line in attendance at the convention state they have orders for 600 cars this early in the season to move immigrants' effects into Canada.

Car ferry service between here and Ocean Falls is what is promised in the immediate future by A. J. Burroughs, northern manager of the Lester W. David Company of Ocean Falls. And Mr. Burroughs is not a politician talking through his hat for election purposes, but a keen business man.

The present trip of Mr. Burroughs is for the purpose of picking out a wharf site for his company. He says that the company is offered the choice of three available sites and the decision will be made in a day or two. As work will begin at once this means the employment of a number of men, who will not be called upon to give election pledges.

The wharf is only part of the

company's plans for Prince Rupert. They are to have dry kilns and planing mills here, and supply everything in the way of building material. The car ferry will bring raw material and supply Prince Rupert until the railway is completed; then the company will ship from here and have open yards and offices in all the towns between here and Edmonton and perhaps beyond.

Mr. Burroughs was formerly manager of the Westholme Lumber Co. here, and in regard to the company's outfit at Ocean Falls he says they are now employing six hundred men, which number will be increased as the business extends; that their fir mills are the farthest north and now have a capacity of no less than 400,000 feet daily.

**SHOT OFFICIALS
OF THE COURT****Terrible Tragedy in Town of Virginia—Friends of Prisoner Shoot and Kill Judge, Sheriff, State Attorney, and Escape.**

Hillsville, Va., March 18.—Just as Judge Massey had sentenced Floyd Allen to one year in jail for aiding in the escape of a county prisoner, two of Allen's brothers and several of the prisoner's friends opened fire on the court, killing the judge, the state's attorney, Foster, and Sheriff Webb and wounding several jurors. The Allen's, with the prisoner and their friends, backed out of the court room behind their revolvers and escaped on horseback. They have taken refuge in the mountains. The flame of unprecedented outburst has aroused the state, and a general pursuit has been instituted.

Cleveland, March 21.—A wage discussion between representatives of the operators and of 300,000 union miners in the bituminous coal fields of Western Pennsylvania, Indiana and Illinois was held yesterday, but every effort to avert a possible strike failed. The prospect of the mines being closed after the first of the month, pending a new two-year agreement, is said to be imminent. If the strike occurs it will extend to at least 350,000 miners.

(Special to Daily News.) Ottawa, March 21.—"I think the docking of horses' tails is a relic of barbarism. Dealers may not agree with me and say horses sell better when they are docked. I think it a shame to deprive a dumb animal of the tail which God has given it." This was the decision of the Duke of Connaught at the annual meeting of the Ottawa Royal Humane Society.



Round 5. Scott led to a clinch, landed on face; Bayley on body. Bayley landed a terrific right swing on jaw as gong struck. Bayley's round.

Round 6. Bayley led with left swing, Scott cleverly ducked and they clinched. This was the schedule for most of the rounds. Scott again attempted knockout, but Bayley buried his chin and got in on the nose. Bayley rushed left to face and right to body; Scott landed left and right to face. An even round, though Bayley took the most punishment.

Round 7. Scott led with left to head, Bayley countered with right and they clinched. Bayley was sidestepping at time and unable to take advantage. Both laughed and shook hands. Scott landed lightly on face and Bayley got in a stiff right to body and a smashing right to face. This was Bayley's round.


