NEEDING HELP

The local Red Cross Society is in need of helpers in! order that it may do its share of work for the men who are in service in Europe and at home. They have a great deal! of material to make up, they have a work room, the sewing machines and everything necessary but they have insufficient workers.

What we have said does not mean that there are no Red Cross workers here. A number of women have been carrying on excellent work but there are not enough of them to produce the garments required. We feel sure that a hint will be sufficient to have the room crowded with workers.

#### WHAT IS TRUTH?

After reading a book on European affairs by a modern writer we feel more confused than ever as to who is telling the truth and who is lying. What seems to be more apparent than ever is how a fairly reliable person may be influenced by his prejudices. He has made up his mind that something is right and then sets out to make the facts fit into his theories. The writer in question sees Great? Britain wrong in everything and looks on the British democracy, the most truly democratic of all nations, as an imperialist power.

#### A DEMOCRATIC EMPIRE

Canada is an important part of the British Empire! and surely this country cannot be looked upon as anything! but a democracy. The same is true of New Zealand, of Australia and of South Africa. Newfoundland was a democracy until she got into financial difficulties and asked? to be taken back under the wing of Great Britain as a crown colony until her affairs become more settled.

India is the outstanding country that is quoted by some writers as having been "bled by Great Britain." And yet Britain has educated the present leaders of that country, has brought about various improvements in the health and education of the people and taught them the elements of self-government until today they are asking to be allowed to carry on independent of Britain. The difficulty there is that the population is mostly Hindu or Mohammedan in religion and these two sects cannot agree. Britain has offered them Dominion status with slight restriction for the protection of the Mohammedan minority but this was refused. As a matter of fact, that country is so ridden with superstition and religious bigotry that it is doubtful if they are ready to take on responsible government even yet.

Britain itself is even more democratic than Canada. The fact that Britons often choose titled representatives! for Parliament is their business. They have a chance to choose others if they so wish. That does not make them less democratic. Gradually the large estates in that country are being divided. Taxes imposed because of the work of policing the world get heavier and heavier until today they are a grievous burden. Yet the people are willing to allow themselves to be taxed in the interests of democracy, not of imperialism. We still use the word "Imperial", because there is no other suitable word to speak of the British Empire which is mostly self-governing but there is no cause for speaking of it as anything but democratic.

There are, in addition to India, a number of small colonies governed more or less direct from Downing Street: but it cannot be said that any of these are fit to become self-governing units. Egypt, formerly a part of the British Empire was recently given complete self-government, independent of the British. The aim of Britain is to make each country self-governing, to develop democracy and the democratic spirit. To quote one or two solitary examples of where officials have made mistakes or where the central government has not taken the wisest course is to bag the question.
