HELSINGFORS- Soviet armies massed in offensive on the Karelian Isthmus continued the ninth successive day of their assault, the Finns reporting that all attacks had been thrown back with heavy losses. Nowhere were the Finnish lines broken. A communique reported the destruction yesterday of 31 enemy tanks and four Russian planes shot down. The Finns reported also that the Russians had lost eight hundred men killed north of Lake Ladoga.

Defends Bren Gun Contracts-Tells of Defence Work Government Has Done-B. C. Secure

VANCOUVER, Feb. 10: (CP)-Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of pensions and national health, was ; last night renominated to contest Vancouver Centre at the forthcoming federal election.

In his acceptance speech, Capt. Mackenzie replied to criticisms of his activities as minister of defence. He defended the Bren gun contract and said that delivery had begun six months ahead of schedule with production at double the required speed.

The minister said that in 1935 when the Liberals took office the Royal Canadian Air Force had no modern planes, bombs or service ammunition and the navy had only two modern vessels. Since then the Liberals had sponsored the aircraft industry. When war broke out, Canada had three hundred aircraft and 100 more were under construction.

"I know today that we have a defence fortification in British Columbia which brings a feeling of comparative safety to our citizens."

Turn an ordinary Russian peasant loose one hundred, miles from his home and he probably would never find his way to it. Turn an ordinary Canadian loose in the Saharai Desert and he would probably find his way out and from there to his home. What is true of the Russian in true of peasants in some other European countries, only possibly not to so great an extent. The man that lacks general education is not much use outside his own vocation. A Canadian can soon be taught to be a soldier but the Russian peasant takes a long time to learn and then he does not know how to adapt himself to a sudden change of conditions. It is such considerations as these that count, to some extent, for the failure of the Russians in their military operations against the Finns. Add to that the fact that they are poorly led and the fact that the Finns are fighting for their homes, their fatherland, their religion, everything which they hold dear and you have the present set-up.


