

Russian Activity In Bringing Up New Forces Presages Decisive Russo-Finnish Battle

Finns Claim to Have Decimated 15,000 Reds-Petsamo Recaptured

Division Wiped Out

HELSINGFORS, Jan. 2: :(CP)-With veteran Red troops replacing conscripts under cover of continuous artillery bombardment of Finland's Karelian Isthmus defences at the week-end, many military experts believe that the first major battle of the Russo-Finnish war is under way.

Meanwhile Finnish communiques claimed that the Red Army had been thrown back across its own frontier at three points north, east and southeast of Lieksa on the central sector. Unofficial reports also told of the penetration of Russian territory by skitroops in the Sala region.

It is acknowledged officially that Swedish volunteers are in Finland.

Enormous Red Losses The Finns claimed New Year's Eve to have wiped out the entire . 163rd Passian Division after a fierce two-day battle. Twenty thousand Soviet soldiers were dead and remnants were being pursued through the forests.
