### STILL ANOTHER NAVAL VICTORY

LONDON, November 13: (CP)—British warships sank one Italian supply ship, set two others on fire and damaged a fourth supply ship and an Italian destroyer in an attack on a convoy off the port of Valona, Albania, Monday night, the Admiralty announced today.

LONDON, November 13.—Prime Minister Winston Churchill told a wildly cheering House of Commons today of a major victory of the British fleet air arm over the Italian navy. Naval planes had raided the important Italian naval base of Taranto and put six, and probably seven, Italian warships out of commission. A 35,000-ton battleship of the Vittorio class had been partially sunk as had been another 25,000 ton capital ship and possibly a third. Two cruisers and two auxiliary vessels had also been put out of commission. Churchill described it as a crushing and crippling blow against the Italian navy. Virginio Gayda, official Fascist editor, complained today at Italy having to bear the brunt of the naval war and admitted that Italy was having a difficult time on account of the great British naval strength in the Mediterranean.

The smiling Prime Minister, reading an Admiralty communique to the House of Commons on the successful British attack against the Italian navy, commented: "The result of the action affects decisively the balance of power in the Mediterranean. As a result of the determined and highly successful attack, reflecting the greatest honor of the fleet air arm, only three Italian battleships now remain effective."

The communique evoking this comment disclosed that fleet air arm planes on the night of November 11-12 struck a crippling blow at Italian navy strength in Taranto Harbor. The communique said that a 35,000-ton battleship of the Littorio class was so badly damaged she was down by the bow with her forecastle under water and a heavy list to starboard. A battleship of the 23,622-ton reconstructed Cavour class had to be beached with her stern under water up to the after gun turret. Another battleship of the Cavour class was probably damaged and appeared to be beached when reconnaissance planes returned to survey and photograph the result of the raid. Three cruisers in the inner harbor were struck by bombs and developed heavy starboard list. Two Italian fleet auxiliary vessels lay with sterns submerged.

"I have some news for the House," said Mr. Churchill in commencing. "It is good news." There were wild cheers as the Prime Minister went on to describe the naval victory. Owing to

the cheering, he had to wait sentence after sentence for the applause to die down.

Only two British planes were missing following the attack, the as Durazzo and Valona on the Prime Minister said.

The damage done had been confirmed by photographic reconnaissance, said Mr. Churchill.

This was no boasting. Rome admitted that British air-

planes had pounded not only Taranto but also Brindisi as well the Mediterranean.

# IMPORTANT

Much May Result From Meeting of Molotoff and Hitler, Washington Believes

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 12 .-Military observers here believe that the conference being held in Berlin between Premier Foreign Minister V. M. Molotoff of Russia and Chancellor Hitler of Berlin may have an important bearing on the future course of the war. If Russia assures Germany of military co-operation or benevolent neutrality, an Axis drive toward the Balkans, the Dardanelles and the oil fields of Iraq would most certainly ensue. Germany might hesitate, however, if there appeared danger of Russian resistance.




