## ELECTION OF ALEX. M. MANSON CONCEDED BY CONSERVATIVES

McBRIDE AND YOUNG APPEAR TO HAVE GIVEN UP HOPES OF ELECTING SILENT WILLIAM—PEOPLE OF SKEENA SEE END OF RING RULE—FOLLOWERS ALL HAVE COLD FEET.

William Manson's followers the other night did not have a representative at Alex. Manson's meeting although the Liberal committee had sent Silent Bill a cordial invitation to be present. Silent Bill's gang were afraid to face the music and have completely lost heart. Of course they realize that they could send no person able to smooth over the past useless record of him and his government, and were not foolish enough to attempt it. The realization that the people, regardless of political parties, are solidly united against him as he has dashed all their hopes of winning the election and they have all but given up the contest.

The Premier had banked great hopes on Skeena and it was his original intention to come here and assist in the campaign, but he has evidently been informed that there is so little chance of the election of William Manson that it would be a waste of time to come here and has left William to go down to defeat alone.

In order to give the local boosters a little prodding in the back, the Premier sends characteristic "promise" telegrams that mean nothing. Time was when they might have been useful to the cause, but the people have learned from past experience that these

mushy promises mean absolutely nothing.

Cold feet on all sides of the Conservative machine is apparent to most every man on the street. The latest to be attacked with the ailment was Dr. Young, minister of education. News of hopeless defeat staring them in the face evidently traveled north rapidly to Skagway, where Dr. Young was awaiting a steamer for the south. He was going to sail on the Curacao, but when he learned that she was going to call at Rupert he switched over to a later boat, the Humboldt, in order to save himself from making a stop at Rupert and the humiliation of taking part in William Manson's defeat. The local Conservative gang had confidently expected him up his arrival here to help them out of the ditch. But—nothing doing with the doctor. He was wise and arranged so they could not lay hands on him. Upon his arrival at Victoria beyond reach he sent the local gang a consolation telegram telling them how sorry he was in not being able to assist. He was afraid to face the music.

It seems they have all deserted Silent Bill and have left him and his agent to their fate. None of the other government flunkies want to be connected with Silent Bill's defeat.

### ALEX. MANSON TURNED THE TABLES ON HIM

Dr. Clayton Twined William Manson's Long Address into Ridicule and Was Heartily Cheered—The Liberal Candidate Stated Conditions as They Stung William Manson Out of His Customary Supineness and He Became Abusive

The following is a brief account of the meeting held by Mr. William Manson at Terrace on Saturday, the 23rd, and also his meeting at Kitsumkalum the same evening, at which Mr. Alex. Manson, Dr. Clayton and the representative of Mr. Montgomery were present.

Mr. Manson opened his Terrace meeting with a lengthy and tiresome account of the McBride railroad policies of the past as well as that of the present, dwelling particularly upon the latter, lauding it to the skies, before an audience that the said policy is designed to practically rob, insofar as the Vancouver-Fort George railway is concerned. He also spoke upon the land policy and told of the great revenue derived from the tax on timber. He reminded the audience of the amount of money he had obtained for the building of roads, trails and bridges, and praised the admirable educational system of British Columbia.

Mr. Manson spoke for an hour and when Mr. Frank Angers of Kitselas requested an opportunity to address the meeting he was graciously accorded five minutes to set forth his ideas. The five minutes were well used, and when Mr. Angers finished his energetic speech, Mr. Manson's speech and the policies he had set forth certainly looked very ystame.

## HYDRO ELECTRIC POSITION PRESENT STAGE OF THE WORK

PIPE LINE NEARLY COMPLETE—PILING IN PROGRESS—ACROPOLIS HILL TANK EXCAVATED; CEMENT ORDERED—MAYOR SAYS PUMPING CAN BEGIN WHEN PIPE IS LAID.

Work on the pipe line excavation for the Woodworth water supply has been making rapid progress in the excellent weather for the past weeks, and the excavation is, in fact, very nearly complete. From the reservoir on Acropolis Hill to the beach at Shawatlans Passage the cut runs straight along Sixth avenue for a long stretch. Practically all the excavation in muskeg for this has been finished, and men are engaged at present in piling the bottom of the trench to support the steel pipe when it arrives and is laid. The pipe is consigned direct to Prince Rupert from England, and the steamer with the first shipment has already sailed. Another boat starts in April with the rest of the pipe.

A little rock excavation remains to be done on the pipe trench, but this will not occupy many more days. Meanwhile the rock cutting at the Acropolis Hill reservoir is all finished, and the cement has been ordered for the finishing of the reservoir.

Asked about the position of the hydro electric scheme the other day, the Mayor mentioned matters as stated, and added that it is calculated that by the time the pipe line is laid to Shawatlans Lake the pumping engine at present augmenting the city's fire protection service at Morse

Creek will be removed to Shawatlans. Once the engine is installed there and connected with the completed pipe line to Acropolis Hill reservoir the full resources of Shawatlans water can be turned to the city's advantage to be used until the Woodworth Lake supply is tapped by the completed pipe line to the upper lake.

The position in regard to the production of electric power at the head of Shawatlans Lake remains unchanged so far, the contract for pipe line beyond the near side of Shawatlans Lake not yet being let. But with the new units running at the power plant in the city there is plenty of juice for present requirements in Rupert.

Winnipeg, March 22.—Hundreds of settlers are passing through Winnipeg weekly for British Columbia points. Seventy-five from the steamer Asonia will leave Portland, Maine, Wednesday. Over one hundred came in tonight. Tomorrow the Jonian's passengers are due with a big party aboard for the coast.

AS TO SALE OF GOVERNMENT LOTS.

## A NEW YUKON RAILWAY NOW

Deputation, including Dr. Thompson, M. P. for the Territory waits on R. L. Borden regarding Project.

Premier Borden has been waited upon the other day by a deputation consisting of Sir Rodolphe Foraget, Edmund Bristol, M. P., Toronto, and Dr. Alfred Thompson, M. P. for the Yukon. They asked for a government subsidy for a line of railway from Haines Mission to Fairbanks, Alaska, skirting the coast for 40 miles to a branch line to Dawson. The necessity for a railway in the territory it was proposed to serve was emphasized and a liberal subsidy for the portion of the line which would be in Canadian territory asked for. Mr. Borden said that the proposal would receive the serious consideration of the government.

### FEARS OF LANDSLIDE

Two Million Dollar G. T. P. Hotel is Threatened.

Winnipeg, March 22.—A catastrophe threatened this afternoon on the site of the Grand Trunk Pacific Hotel on Broadway, the Fort Garry two million dollar structure in course of erection, when thousands of tons of earth started to sink rapidly into the excavation.

The first intimation of what was happening was the creaking and groaning of the timber stays on the northeast corner. Nothing could be done to stop the slide and it is calculated that the pressure exerted by the earth was six thousand pounds to the square foot. Heavy steel pillars were bent in as if they had been paper and the entire east side of the steel structure is badly strained. A gaping fissure six feet wide marks the extent of the landslide; it extends the entire length of the east side of the excavation and half way across the north front.

## MORGAN BUYS WINNIPEG TRAM

Sir William Mackenzie Accepts Thirty Million Dollars for His Winnipeg Electric Tram, Heat, Light and Power Plant.

Winnipeg, March 22.—A few days ago all negotiations were concluded for the purchasing of the Winnipeg electric street railway and heat, light and power plants at a cost of \$30,000,000. The J. Pierpont Morgan interests are the new owners. Mr. Joseph H. Choate Jr. is here for the legal side, and Messrs. Foster and Richardson, experts for the J. G. White Company of New York. The company agrees to spend William Mackenzie of Toronto, the owner, desires to put the money he gets out of the deal into other enterprises where friction with municipalities is not so intense as in Winnipeg.

The only remaining act is the ratification of the agreement by the Legislature of Manitoba, which is now in session.

Winnipeg, March 22.—J. P. Morgan & Co. officially deny that they are interested in the purchase of the Winnipeg Street Railway Company. Mr. E. M. Reese, chief factor in the Manitoba Power Company, says, in spite of Sir William Mackenzie's denial, that the deal is completed, and that he is only awaiting the necessary legislation to pay over some \$25,000,000.

Mr. Noden said it was often asked why the Liberals did not join with the Progressives in placing a candidate in the field to defeat Wm. Manson. He had replied that the Liberals had something stronger than mere office to fight for and vote for. Dr. Clayton would not fight for Liberal principles (cheers), and it was these principles which led to a Liberal candidate being placed in the field (cheers). They were in it to fight against the McBride government. Sir Wilfrid Laurier had endeavored to assist this northern country by a railway that should open up more country to development, while McBride had actually done nothing in this direction.

Speaking of the road building he said a party of these road-builders were at Alton Arm last year for the purpose of building a road to the Kias River, about twelve or fourteen miles. They started out the week before election with supplies for thirty days. How were they going to get these men back to Goose Bay to vote? They managed it. The very week of the election the foreman got a telegram to bring them all in to report. So the government had these votes to help beat Duncan Ross, and paid the cost of them out of your money.

"We should vote against the McBride clique as long as we have breathed in our bodies. (Cheers). Will Dr. Clayton fight our battles or will he jump into the band wagon and say: 'Well, Bill, I'm with you.' We have a candidate fighting for Liberalism. (Cheers). Alex. M. Manson is making this fight for us. It could not be with any good grace I could vote for Dr. Clayton as a Progressive or any other kind of a Tory, and I think you all feel as I do. (Cheers). We are all bound to vote against the abuses of power under which we are suffering."

The Brevens system of British Columbia is maintained solely as a vote making machine.
