Nazi Bombing Plane Scuttled On Yorkshire Moors; Pursuit Planes of R.A.F. Caused It

LONDON, February 3.— A Nazi Henkel bomber, driven inland from sea as Germany essayed a new series of aerial attacks on British shipping today, made a forced landing on the Yorkshire moors where she was scuttled by her crew. When rescuers came up, the plane was a twisted and burning mass. Three members of the plane's crew were taken to hospital where one died soon after. The crew, in burning the plane, had evidently acted on orders from Berlin so that no secrets might be revealed by capture of the ship intact.



Nazis Turn Herrings Into Explosives-Former Local Boy Sailing High



A German chemist has suggested the idea of enlisting the help of the sea in a novel way to help the Reich in the war. The North Sea and Baltic in the locality of the German coast are notably rich in herrings which form more than nine-tenths of all the fish therein. The price of herrings is extremely low and their nutritive value high. But,

The drying and separation into its components can be effected within a week and, at the end of fifteen days, one can wrest from a hundred and twenty herrings enough explosives for a small torpedo! For this reason alone the commonest fish of the North Sea is receiving the consideration of the Reich. But this is not all. In addition to nitrates, most of which are obtained from the female, the herring can be made to yield large quantities of celluloseindustries. And so the herring will help in the manufacture of wireless receivers and insulating materials. From this wonderful fish can also be obtained sodium salts and certain fats (not in large quantitiesbut the Reich is always in great need of fat). 


