British Planes Wreaking Havoc

German Day Attack Again Broken Up; Casualties In Night Attack Were Lower

LONDON, Sept. 21: (CP)—Formations of German warplanes crossed the Kent coast before dawn today and were met by heavy anti-aircraft barrage as well as by Royal Air Force fighters. Three raiders were seen to retreat and later a lone Messerschmidt turned back. At least two enemy planes were brought down by direct anti-aircraft hits. One group of raiders appeared over London after a night-long series of attacks and British counter-assaults on Nazi-held invasion ports.

VESSEL IS TORPEDOED

British Freighter Elmbank Is Victim of Enemy Submarine

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Mackay Radio announced yesterday afternoon picking up of a message from the British steamer Elmbank stating she had been pursued and torpedoed 600 miles west of the Irish coast. The Elmbank is a vessel of five thousand tons registered out of Glasgow and built in 1925.

ITALIANS HELD UP

ALEXANDRIA, Sept. 21: (CP)—Nine persons were injured in a raid by Italian planes on Alexandria today. Most of the bombs fell harmlessly into the sea. The raid lasted only fifteen minutes. In view of heavy damage that has been caused by Royal Air Force and naval attacks on their bases both in Libya and newly-occupied Egypt, it is not expected any further advance by land will be attempted by the Italians for a few days at least. Further heavy damage has been done to the Italians at Benghazi, Torbruk and other points.

United Services Hut Is Carrying On Fine Work For Fighting Men Here

Prince Rupert, like many other communities in Canada, had the "even tenor of its way" suddenly stepped up to a higher tempo by the advent of the second world war. The citizens of Prince Rupert were not long in realizing that they could no longer carry on in their usual easy-going, good natured way; that there was a big job awaiting them, in which every member of the community could take part, and it was necessary that this help was forthcoming. With the ever increasing numbers of fighting forces being stationed in this area it was evident that one of the most pressing jobs was the organizing of recreational facilities for the men when off duty. The foundation of this work has, we think, been well laid by the opening a few weeks ago of the United Services Hut on Second Avenue. This project was made possible by the combined efforts of the ladies' maintenance committee (composed of appointed members from the various women's organizations in the city) To H. Captain R. C. H. Durnford, garrison chaplain, the Young Men's Christian Association and the officers and men of the various units stationed here. In fact one might be more correct in describing it as the result of the combined efforts of the citizens of Prince Rupert.

MORE SHIPS TO BRITAIN

Purchase Twenty-five Freighters From United States For \$8,000,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 21:—Negotiations are reported about completed whereby Great Britain will purchase from the United States twenty-five freighters for \$8,000,000. The freighters were built during the First Great War and will be used to augment the British merchant marine, offsetting recent losses owing to German submarine and airplane attacks.

HILLSBOROUGH, Cal.—Safety of kidnapped Marc de Tristan, jr., was placed ahead of other considerations today as the three-year-old boy's wealthy family declared readiness to meet the \$100,000 ransom demand. Police withdrew from the scene and gave the family a free hand to contact the kidnapper who snatched the boy yesterday.

GERMAN RECAPTURED

PORT ARTHUR.—Fritz Fuchs, German civilian prisoner, who escaped last Sunday from a northwestern Ontario internment camp, is under arrest, Police Chief George Taylor announced today. Taylor said the man had been apprehended last Tuesday by a Canadian National Railways constable near Port Arthur round house, admitting that he was the escaped prisoner.

SITUATION WORSE TODAY

HANOL.—The French Indo-China government reported a turn for the worse today in negotiations with Japan. A communique said that a "new shift has compromised" negotiations and new Japanese demands had put a monkey wrench in the proceedings. Today's statement came in spite of reports last night that Japan had modified its demands and withdrawn a deadline expiring Sunday.

OIL SUPPLY HARD HIT

DURHAM, Eng.—The Royal Air

Royal Air Force Is Still Pounding Hard At Nazi-Held Coast

Unrelenting Attacks at Many Important Points of Vital Importance to Enemy in War Campaign

LONDON, Sept. 21: (CP)—Today it was announced that Royal Air Force bombers had smashed two supply ships in night-long raids on both French and Belgian Channel ports. Again the British planes attacked Dortmund-Ems Canal, inside Germany, and raided many distribution centres in the Reich and Belgium. Channel ports attacked were Antwerp, Zeebrugge, Ostend, Flushing, Dunkerque, Calais and Boulogne. In Germany a supply train, munitions factory and several airdromes were heavily bombed. Two Royal Air Force aircraft were lost in last night's operations. The Royal Air Force also again pounded at German battlements on the Channel coast last night, heavy gun emplacements as well as other military objectives being singled out for effective attack. Again huge fires could be seen from the British side to be burning for a long distance on the opposite coast. There had been devastating raids by the British the night previous on the vital Dortmund-Ems Canal in the heart of the Westphalia district. The Thursday attack against the Channel ports lasted three hours and not a single British plane was seen from Los Angeles where he received a big reception yesterday. WILLKIE IS IN 'FRISCO

Republican Candidate Gets Enthusiastic Reception Today in City of Golden Gate

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—Wendell Willkie, Republican candidate for president of the United States, is in San Francisco today. He arrived this morning and headed a parade throughout the streets which was miles long, the reception being an enthusiastic one. This afternoon Mr. Willkie is visiting the Fair at Treasure Island and tonight will speak at the Civic Auditorium. LOW NAZI MORALE

NEW YORK.—Arrivals here yesterday from Europe said that morale was low among the Nazi invading forces due to heavy losses they have suffered in manoeuvres. Bodies of German soldiers are being washed ashore every day from barges and transports as a result of the British air force bombardments. An attempt at invasion now is unlikely.

Every Right-Thinking Person In United States Is Back of Britain, Declares Rex Beach

MONTREAL, Sept. 21.—Without exception, every right-thinking person in the United States is behind Great Britain in the war, according to Rex Beach, noted American sportsman and novelist, who was in Montreal a short time last night on his way to Regina. Mr. Beach, who have taken him from coast to coast, showed great solicitude for the British cause and gave assurances that the United States would give every assistance possible in the fight against Hitlerism. By no means a supporter of President Roosevelt—in fact, he predicts a defeat for him in November—the novelist nevertheless gave him full credit for his attitude toward Britain. Force has "visited and bombed" ninety per cent. of Germany's synthetic oil plants and eighty per cent. of the Reich's regular oil refineries, Rt. Hon. Hugh Dalton, minister of economic warfare, declared today.

GLOUCESTER VISITS

LONDON.—The Duke of Gloucester paid a visit to positions occupied by Canadian troops yesterday. There was an air raid alarm during the inspection but the Duke proceeded unperturbed.

CHURCHILL'S PROMISE

LONDON.—Paying a visit to the Battersea area yesterday, Prime Minister Churchill promises that the "Nazis shall suffer for these raids. Don't worry. They will get it back." The Prime Minister was accompanied by Sir Kingsley Wood, Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Fire Loss In City Is Very Light to Date

So far this year there have been thirty-three fire alarms in Prince Rupert but damage for the entire year to date has amounted to a mere \$25. Last year up to this time there were twenty-two alarms. During this August there were five alarms as compared with one in the same month last year.

## EDITORIAL

### And Now Spain...

Von Ribbentrop has been down to Rome to see why Hitler's bombastic stooge Mussolini has not been making good in the Mediterranean boat race and now Franco, against whom Hitler and Mussolini have a little account arising out of the Spanish civil war, comes into the picture. Spain, it appears, is to be the next of Germany's allies, coming in, like the rest of them, not because he wants to but because he is afraid the Nazis will descend upon him and break up the rest of his already shattered country if he does not. No one can be surprised about Spain giving active co-operation to the Axis. All Hitler had to do was say the word and it was done.

So Spain, like Italy, takes up its task as Hitler's slave. Spaniards, like Italians, will now co-operate with Germany, at the same time hoping that Great Britain will win. No doubt, the people of Italy and Spain are aware that, unless Great Britain does win, they are lost and that a Hitler-victory would inevitably mean their further submission to the Reich. All the world now knows what that implies. One just has to see the yoke under which France, Norway, Denmark, Belgium, Holland, Roumania and others now groan.

### In the Air War...

Yesterday's dispatches described another great victory for the Royal Air Force in driving home in wild flight another huge squadron of Nazi bombers which essayed to continue the assault upon London. Day after day, it becomes increasingly evident that stout Britain, away behind as she might have been at the start, is slowly but surely winning this air war—not only in the sphere of defence but also on attack.

Prime Minister Churchill told us last week not to ignore the havoc which the Royal Air Force has been wreaking on the enemy bases in the Channel and western Germany. Gradually, indications are beginning to come out of just how successful our attacks on the enemy's bases have been. Possibly there is some significance to Hitler's complaint yesterday about the civilians in Germany who have been killed and wounded and the omission to say anything about what the military losses might have been. Hitler is being stung hard but he is loath to admit it. It would be a whole lot worse for him if Britons were fighting the way the Nazis are.

A. has a latest model 16mm picture and sound camera and each Wednesday evening he gives a full length picture show of the latest feature releases, consisting of comic strip, Universal news and full length screen production, just the same as one would see in any theatre. This program is usually opened with a sing-song by the boys and is much appreciated.

The hut is open every day from 10:30 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. and the full-time staff consists of steward, Bill Lamb (Toc H.) Norman McEwen (Y. M. C. A.) assisted by Padre Durnford, garrison chaplain, and a voluntary staff of women helpers supplied by the various organizations in the city, who take charge of the kitchen and canteen counter from 4:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. daily including Sundays.

**Apart From Hut**

So much for what goes on at the hut. In addition there is also a considerable amount of work carried out in connection with the various forts, etc. in this area. This outside work is very efficiently carried out by Norman McEwen. Monday night he takes his picture show to Barrett Rock Fort; Tuesday to Frederick Point, Thursday to Dundas Point and so on. On these occasions he is usually helped by the Padre who will always be found where there is work to be done.

Outfits for athletic games such as softball, bats, balls and mitts, footballs, horseshoes, etc., have been supplied by Y. M. C. A. funds to the various detachments on duty outside the city. Indoor games and playing cards have also been supplied by the same source. It is intended during the fall to organize a sports committee and start a basketball league composed of teams representing the various units so that competitive games can be arranged during the winter months.

As a side line which the steward attends to in his spare time, parcels of magazines and periodicals are made up and sent out to the crews of the naval examining boats and the forts.

The Hut is run solely for the benefit of fighting forces stationed in the Prince Rupert area. It is supported entirely by voluntary funds and voluntary effort.

**Waterfront Whiffs**

**Halibut Fishing Has Week To Go—Modern New Freezing Plant at Namu—Not Much Doing in Deer Hunting**

With the 1940 fishing season having less than a week to go, halibut landings at Prince Rupert for 1940 up to and including yesterday had reached a total of 16,040,819 pounds as compared with 14,912,700 pounds at a corresponding date last year. The Canadian total for this year is 6,059,219 pounds and the American 9,981,600 pounds,

While the deer hunting season has been open for the past couple of weeks, there does not appear to have been a great deal of activity so far on the part of local nimrods. Salmon fishing of all types including trolling will be closed as from next Friday in the Skeena River, Lowe Inlet, Butedale and Bella Coola areas, it was announced today at the Dominion Fisheries office. The Naas River and Queen Charlotte Island areas will remain open. Fishing just lately has been poor on the Skeena River and the number of gillnetters there has now dwindled to a mere sixty. Inverness, Cassiar, Carlisle, Claxton and Prince Rupert canneries are still in operation.

Frank Warne of the local Dominion Fisheries office is on his annual trip to the Maziaden Lake fish ladder north of Stewart. He will be returning to the city next week, it is expected.
