# King Dies

British and French Are Withdrawing in Good Order-"March of Glory" Says Gort

LONDON. May 39 .- Outnumbered three to one by forty highly mechanized German divisions and battered relentlessly by diving hombing planes and heavy artillery completely reckless of the toll of human life, British and French forces in Flanders today continued their desperate rearguard action to cover withdrawal to the coast port of Dunkerque which, in a thirty-two mile stretch of channel coastline in that area is still in Allied hands.

Lord Gort, British Expeditionary Force commander - in - chief, answering a message of encouragement from the King, described the British action as a "march of glory to the sea." The British were fighting in complete order with unshaken morale. They had succeeded in establishing a definite line and it was almost certain that any equipment abandoned would be des-

WHICH WAY NEXT?

BERLIN, May 30: (CP)— Although the situation in Flanders might place Germany in position for an invasion of Britain, the Nazi press hinted today that France rather than Great Britain was the next major target. At London, however. Sir John Anderson, Home Secretary, asserted there was every prospect of an early call on the civil defence service and urged them to keep fully manned and ready.

LONDON, May 30: (CP)— Thousands of first arrivals from the Flanders battle ground reached England tonight in warships, transports and hospital ships—their uniforms torn and their faces grimy, bearded and powderburned. 





Now In Charge At Regina

Royal Canadian Air Force recruits, training for their wartime jobs at No. 4 Training Command of the British Commonwealth Air Training plan with headuarters at Regina, have their work cut out for them to follow in the footsteps of their stern-visaged chief, 45year old Group Captain Leigh Forbes Stevenson, who is well known in Prince Rupert through having been here in connection with preliminary surveys a couple of years ago for the Seal Cove air

But fledgling war birds can go about their chores in the knowledge that their commander has an especial regard for men of the ranks. He was a ranker at one time himself.

At the age of 16 Group Captain Stevenson joined the 73rd Northumberland Regiment as a private and ever since this fighting flying man from Richibucto, N. B., has

been climbing steadily. Today he has charge of 23 air training units scattered as far west as the Pacific Coast. His job is to look after the administration ! of all kinds of schools-flying. observing, bombing, gunnery and wireless training stations.

With shim at his Regina headquarters Group Captain Stevenson has a staff of 22 officers, 25 airmen and 12 civilians.


