Capitulation of Leopold is Not Recognized By His Government—Churchill and Reynaud Expressed Greater Determination Than Ever

"VERY DIFFICULT" SITUATION

PARIS, May 28: (CP)— A French War Ministry spokesman said tonight that the Belgian army almost in entirety had given up as prisoners to the Germans and, as a result of the capitulations, the situation was "very difficult" for the Allies. The spokesman placed the number of Belgians surrendering at 300,000.
