British Convoy Escapes From Attack

CARNIVAL GETS AWAY TO GOOD START: WILL CROWN QUEEN TONIGHT

Two Thousand Persons Enjoy Themselves to Full With Variety of Entertaining and Interesting Features

Over two thousand persons crowded into the Exhibition Hall last night and, amid settings which had never been more presentable in years, found many items for their interest and entertainment. Despite the fact that, due to transformer trouble just as the evening was getting under way, the lights went off for almost half an hour, it was an auspicious opening, bidding fair for continuation of success during the two remaining evenings, not forgetting the sports programs to be held on the Acropolis Hill grounds this afternoon and tomorrow.

Features of the carnival include vaudeville programs, drawings, dancing and all manner of chance concessions—these for many persons seeking entertainment alone. Then there are many interesting exhibits highlighted by the annual flower show of the Prince Rupert Horticultural Society. A contest photographic display is also of interest. Another outstanding contest of the British Columbia Tuberculosis Association especially arranged to show what is going on in British Columbia in carrying on the fight against tuberculosis. Apart from these displays are a number of well arranged commercial exhibits.

Official Opening
Following a parade from the Court House to the Exhibition Hall in which Leslie's Pipe Band and the Cadets took part, the official opening of the carnival was carried out by Dr. R. G. Large, chairman of the civic centre committee. Dr. Large felt that there was no apology to be offered in staging a carnival at this time, particularly since all the funds to be derived would be invested in war securities until such time as it became possible to proceed with the civic centre project. Dr. Large thanked all those who had assisted in connection with this carnival effort and expressed appreciation at the large attendance. Telegrams of greeting from City Commissioner R. S. Gilchrist and Premier T. D. Pattullo were read.

Immediately after the opening, Announcer Norton Youngs introduced Master of Ceremonies Sam Joy and an amateur stage contest was presented as a vaudeville attraction. Contributing to this were David Eastman, who was adjudged the winner with a vocal solo; Melvin Thompson, accordion solo; Yvonne Riffou, vocal solo; Rose Wynne, yodeling solo, accompanied by Bruce Wilson; Bonnie Perkins, vocal solo, and Mrs. J. S. Black's Dutch dolls singing and dance number in which Jean Murvold, Monica Holtby, Nina and Lorraine Youngman, Leonora Raabe, Mary Margaret Bulger, Lois Thompson, Ann Stevens took part.

CANADIAN EXPLOITS

Domination Marksmen Bring Down Three German Planes—Casualties From Time Bombs

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, Aug. 22. (CP)—Three German bombers fell prey in recent attacks to the marksmanship of Canadian ground crews. Caught in withering fire, the Germans jettisoned bombs, several of which failed to explode.

Two crashed on a square and nearby road, killing three Canadians—Lieut. Leslie Wheeler, Moncton, New Brunswick; Sergeant F. J. Jennings, Verdun, Quebec and Corp. F. C. Shaw, Toronto.

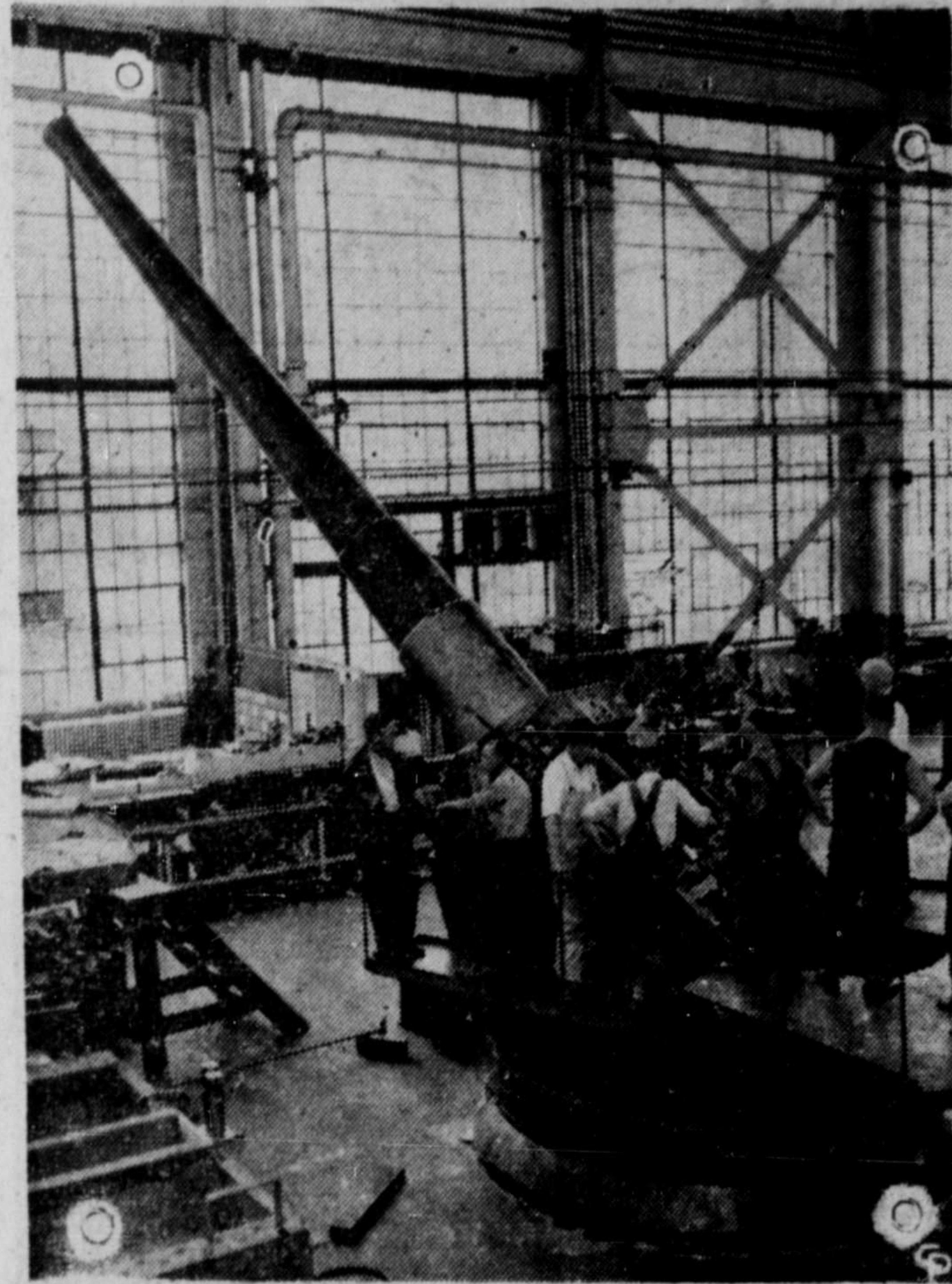

FINAL BULLETINS

TROTSKY IS DEAD
MEXICO CITY—Leon Trotsky, Russian counter-revolutionary leader who had lived here in exile for many years, died last night after whispering the accusation that his pick-axe assailant was "most likely" a member of the OGPU, dreaded Soviet secret police. Trotsky's body will go to New York for burial.

PRISONER RE-TAKEN
OTTAWA—Gunther Lorentz, German naval lieutenant, who escaped from a northern Ontario internment camp for prisoners of war, was recaptured last night in Montreal, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police announced today. Officials said that few details were known of the recapture except that the prisoner was retaken while crossing Victoria Bridge which links the Island of Montreal with the mainland. It had been a first thought that the escaped man was Werner Koche since another prisoner at the camp answered for Lorentz when the roll was called.

HANSON SUBSCRIBES \$40,000
OTTAWA—Subscription to Canada's non-interest bearing war loan have totalled \$2,422,436 on August 15. Finance Minister J. L. Hsley said today. Large subscriptions from individuals included \$40,000 from Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, who was one of the first to suggest inauguration of a non-interest bearing loan.

TENSION MOUNTING
ATHENS—Greece remains calm although the situation with Italy is even more tense. Premier John Metaxas reiterates that Greece will refuse any demands for territory and will defend her honor. There are reports of Greek and Italian soldiers being killed on the Albanian frontier. A Soviet military representative has conferred with the Greek staff.

MEXICAN DAM BOMBED
MEXICO—Eight persons were killed and fifty injured in the bombing of a dam near San Juan del Rio.

GRIM PARCEL
SHANGHAI—A parcel containing the severed head of a Chinese has been delivered to H. P. Mills, new editor of the Chinese American Daily News. It is the second time Mills has received such a parcel.

SIR OLIVER LODGE DIES
LONDON—Sir Oliver Lodge, 89, scientist and spiritualist, died today at his home in Wiltshire, England.

Rumania Gives In
LONDON, Aug. 22. (CP)—Reuters reported from Bucharest yesterday that Rumania has agreed definitely to cede Southern Dobruja to Bulgaria, returning the frontier to that which existed in 1912 prior to the Balkan War.

LEAVE IS NOT MADE
LONDON, Aug. 22. (CP)—Foreign Office sources deny reports that the United States has leased the islands of Canton and Enderbury in the southern Pacific from Great Britain as air bases. The lease was reported to have been for fifty years with provision that it could be extended indefinitely.

ORGANIZE CAMPAIGN
Committee Meets to Start Drive For Sale of War Savings Certificates and Stamps

The local campaign for support of sale of war savings certificates and stamps got further under way last night. T. McClymont, the chairman of the committee, was unable to be present at the opening of the meeting and his place was taken by P. H. Linzey who explained the aims and purposes of the war savings committee. Mr. Linzey emphasized the need of stirring up public interest in the war savings stamp scheme in Prince Rupert and pointed out that, although all over Canada it was meeting with tremendous support, this city was lagging behind in a lamentable manner due possibly to lack of organization. He believed that Prince Rupert would measure up to its responsibilities as it did in the last war if every citizen would become interested and purchase stamps to stamp out Hitlerism.

EXPRESS LOYALTY FOR WAR

United Church Presbytery Here Prays for Success of Empire Cause—Urges Support of Democratic Effort

Several important resolutions—one of loyalty to the war cause—were passed at the fall meeting of Prince Rupert Presbytery of the United Church of Canada yesterday in the First United Church. Rev. Capt. Peter R. Kelly presiding. It read as follows:

The Prince Rupert Presbytery of the United Church of Canada assembled in Prince Rupert gives thanks to almighty God for the preservation of homes, church, and Empire in the face of colossal opposition and, realizing the important part taken by Their Majesties, King George VI. and Queen Elizabeth who, in dependence upon Divine guidance, have welded the defensive forces and stimulated and encouraged the people throughout the empire, the members of Presbytery hereby express their loyalty to Their Majesties and the Empire and express the hope and prayer that continued success may follow their efforts and that ultimately the forces of justice, democracy, and civilization which they symbolize, may prevail.

The session was remarkable for the fact that no less than three of the members present are this year commissioners to the General Council, which meets in Winnipeg in September. Another noteworthy feature was the presence of Rev. Norah Hughes of Hazelton, the first woman minister in the United Church in British Columbia.

Other members present included Rev. Thos. C. Colwell, secretary of Port Simpson; Rev. J. C. More, of Kispiox; Rev. J. C. Jackson, of Prince Rupert United Church; Rev. W. R. Welch of Bella Bella; Rev. E. S. Fleming of Ocean Falls, and the venerable pioneer missionary Rev. Wm. Henry Pierce, retired.

Since much of the mission work in the Presbytery is among the native Indian people and remembering that for over fifty years these people have looked to their church for helpful direction, Presbytery took action with reference to contributions for patriotic purposes as follows:

"Having heard of a large number of donations made by native peoples to the Red Cross and other patriotic efforts, we congratulate them and commend them for their good work in the form of voluntary contributions and, through the purchase of war-savings stamps, etc., in this time of national peril and further recommend that all organizations concerned take care to give due recognition to them as a people for their efforts."

Several encouraging reports were made to Presbytery. Improvements to property frequently noted. Special commendation was given the Rupert pastor and congregation for the great improvements made. Also the Japanese United Church in Ocean Falls and their pastor, Mr. Kabayama, were commended for their industry and zeal in building a fine addition to their church. The Ladies' Aid of Ocean Falls United was highly commended for its work in re-furnishing the manse during the past year or two. Other charges plans for new buildings or repairs to present structures.

Personal congratulations fall to Rev. Capt. Peter Kelly, skipper of the Mission Boat Thomas Crosby IV. Mr. Kelly recently obtained his master's papers.

Presbytery also approved the application of R. B. Vanattar of Klemtu to become a candidate for the Christian ministry and he was recommended to college for training.

Long Range German Guns And Bombers Are Unsuccessful

Small Attacks on England, Wales and Scotland By Enemy Planes—Authorities Advise People to Look Out For Further Intensive Thrusts

LONDON, August 22: (CP)—German artillery on the French coast and German dive bombers went into action today against a long British convoy threading the English Channel off Dover. The convoy escaped without damage from about one hundred shells, the firing of which betrayed the position of the guns. The convoy was later attacked by dive bombers one of which was shot down to bring to an even thousand the number of Nazi planes certainly destroyed since Hitler's intensive air war was launched June 18.

German raids were continued on a small scale over England, Wales and Scotland today but the government warned that further mass attacks and possibly an attempted invasion were yet to be expected.

Some damage and casualties resulted from today's raids but at least two German bombers are believed to have been brought down.

REGISTER WAS 4063

This is total for City—Figures for District Not Yet Available

Figures for the national registration in the city of Prince Rupert give the total as 4063. This will be increased with returns from those forms which were authorized to carry out their own registration. The figures for the whole district will not be available till the returns are received from the hundred and thirty registration centres.

A pleasing feature of the registration was the whole-hearted co-operation of organizations and individuals. Executives of the different firms, logging companies and canneries went to a great deal of trouble to ensure the registration being carried out. This co-operation made the work much easier.

In the city the work of the various deputy registrars and voluntary assistant deputy registrars was admirable. The long hours of work and the need for steady attention to the many details to be answered constituted a heavy demand on the registrars. They were equal to it and the efficiency of those responsible.

EDITORIALS

REVOLUTIONARY CAREER ENDS

The career of Leon Trotsky, the arch-revolutionary, who was one of the moving spirits in bringing about the fall of the monarchy in Russia but who later quarrelled with the present Russian dictator and was banished from the country, is ended under tragic circumstances. Many attempts were made on his life since he located in Mexico. Trotsky was an advocate of Bolshevism, closely related to Communism, but he always claimed that the Russian government had departed from the faith and, in fact, had been traitor to the original aims of the revolutionary leaders in order to keep themselves in power. He was a picturesque figure, a great under-cover fighter, with an unrivalled grasp of affairs. He was the worst enemy Stalin had in the past years.

U.S. GETS BASES

The United States will be given naval bases in Newfoundland and the West Indies. That will give them a commanding position in the Atlantic and enable them to co-operate fully in the protection of Greenland and of the eastern coast of Canada. For a country like Germany or Italy it would be tantamount to handing over the island of Newfoundland and the West Indies but we do not think the United States has territorial ambitions. No matter what party administers the affairs of that country the sentiment of the people of the country is opposed to expansion. A couple of naval stations is but small pay for the help the country is giving the Empire at this time.

BUY EMPIRE PRODUCTS

At a time like this we suggest that all ask for and buy Empire products and especially Canadian products. As the British Columbia Department of Trade and Industry advertisement states "British Columbia thrives by its industries." Take away industries and we have unemployment.

One example we would like to quote. There are a number of farm products that come to the city from Northern and Central British Columbia. The quality is excellent. Why not ask for them? There are vegetables and all sorts of garden stuff, usually fresher than that which comes from farther away points. Prince Rupert thrives by reason of the hinterland.

Summed up we have to suggest that, whenever possible, buy Northern British Columbia products. If these cannot be obtained, buy British Columbia goods. Next comes Canadian and finally anything of British origin. That is good business policy.

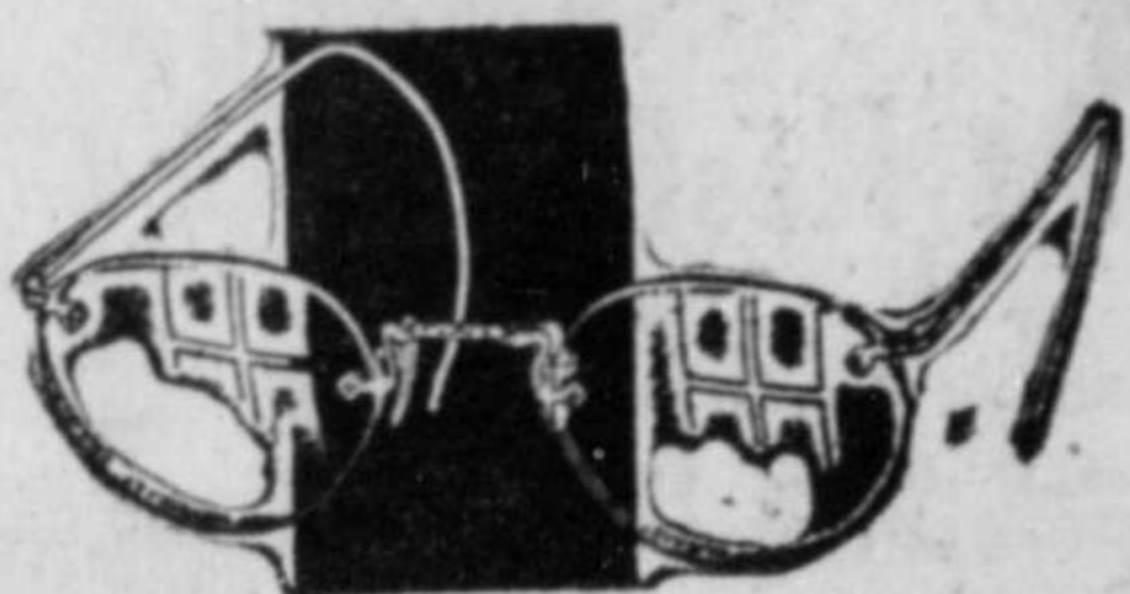

BIG NAZI THRUST AGAINST BRITAIN MAY COME IN AIR; MUST KEEP UP OFFENSIVE

British Military Writer Declares Such Action Now Only Course Open to German Strategists in Following Up War

Written for The Canadian Press

By MAJOR-GENERAL SIR CHARLES GWYNN

LONDON, August 22. (CP)—Germany must now try to defeat Britain or go down herself. Before she conquered France, it was open to her to stand on the defensive for her army more than sufficed to protect her from invasion. By economic expansion in the East and with the help of the neutrals, she might have hoped to

resist the pressure of the blockade long enough to outlast the determination of the Allies to continue the struggle. But a defensive course is no longer open to her. The neutral countries she has overrun are subject to the grip of the blockade and she has to handle their impoverished inhabitants as well as her own people.

Let us, therefore, examine Germany's prospects of securing victory by offensive action. Germany's army was her main offensive weapon. With the assistance of her air force, it crushed France but it failed to crush Britain.

Only a fraction of the German army can hope to reach the shores of Britain and there it would be met by vastly superior numbers and superior armament.

Strong British Army

For Britain's army, in constantly growing strength, is now concentrated in Great Britain. It is reinforced by Dominion troops and the Home Guard.

Germany's navy is insignificant compared with that of Britain's, and neither her U-boats, her motor torpedo boats nor her mining operations have had any disconcerting measure of success.

If Germany is to take the offensive against Britain, her main weapon must, therefore, be her air force.

It rests with her air force to attack British morale, to seek to overcome the resistance of the R. A. F., cripple the action of the British Navy, cover the transport of an invading force and co-operate with it if it secures a landing either by bombing attack or with air-transported troops.

Moreover, it has also to provide protection for its own air bases, assemblage of transport vessels and other vulnerable targets from the counter-attacks of British bombers.

Has Germany any real chance of securing such supremacy over the R. A. F. as would enable her to carry through such a program? I say with confidence, born of what has actually happened in the skies, she has no chance.

Is British morale likely to prove weaker than British armed strength? It has not yet been put to the supreme test. But it has faced reverses, threats and desperate shocks in a manner that inspires high confidence.

The unity of political parties has never before been so complete. The striking British Air Force, the blockading British Navy and the indomitable British morale, based on consciousness of a just cause, will defeat Hitler's Germany.

QUINTETTE HONEYMOON

Newlyweds Form Crew of 78-Ton Schooner Bound For the South Seas

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Aug. 22. (CP)—Five newlywed couples are sailing the matrimonial seas together. And we mean sailing.

They're roaming around on a boat, headed for the South Seas, on one of the world's queerest honeymoons.

With no money to speak of, and virtually no experience as sailors, the 10 wanderers chipped in to buy an old 78-ton schooner, "The Chance," and try marriage in a floating apartment.

It all started when Christopher Sergel, of Chicago, convinced his father that a trip to the South Seas was what Chris needed before settling down to the serious business of earning a living. Pa Sergel put down most of the money.

They put into San Juan, from New York with Chris as skipper and nothing unusual to report except that everyone had got seasick at one time or another on the voyage.

The honeymooning crew of "The Chance" has as varied a collection of folks as any big ocean liner ever held.

Chris and his wife, Hope, are writers. They are gathering travel material they hope to sell in book form when the South Seas are gone and the honeymoon is over.
