## NOT COURAGE ENOUGH TO TAKE A LAMB BY THE TAIL

**All the Candidates Assembled in the Empress Theatre With Exception of William Manson---His Courage Defended by the Socialist Candidate Who Instanced the Commandeering of Government Boats and Government Teams**

The supporters of Dr. Clayton and Alderman Montgomery held a joint meeting in the Empress theatre last night, to which the candidates and supporters of the Ring were cordially invited, but none of them put in an appearance. They were holding a meeting in the opera house, and as soon as Dr. Clayton had finished speaking he went over to the opera house for the pleasure of having one more smash at the Ring candidate. But he was too late; the opera house was closed and he returned to the theatre.

H. H. Clarke presided and explained that William Manson had been invited and was expected to be present, but it seemed that at the last moment he had weakened and to avoid being present had called a meeting of his own, but they might expect him to be present later. The first speaker called upon was W. Edward Manning, who spoke for the Socialist cause, then Dr. Clayton, W. H. Montgomery and Alex. M. Manson, the Liberal candidate.

The speeches were particularly good, but space is only available for a few words from each.

**Mr. Manning's Remarks.**  
Would it not be better to subsidize the settler than to subsidize the capitalist as McBride is doing?  
Montgomery is not going to Victoria to take what is offered him, but is going to rear up on his hind legs and demand what we are entitled to.  
We are living under a political inquisition. Dr. Clayton would simply be the successor of the present representative of Ring Rule in Prince Rupert; a creature of McBride.

**Dr. Clayton's Aphorisms.**  
My voice is not very good. I have practically lost it chasing the elusive William Manson up the Skeena and other parts of the constituency.  
Rev. M. Stevens told me at Telkwa: "I have always voted Conservative, but I am not going to pledge my self to vote for William Manson."

All the way from Aldermere to Kitsumkalum I was the drawing card. At Aldermere they are betting that William Manson will lose his deposit absolutely.  
Joe Scott, one of the leaders of the Ring, said they were going to run me out of the party when I got back. If it takes me ten years I will bust that Ring combination.  
William Manson is going to get the same dope as he did when he first ran for mayor.

## SILENT WILLIAM WAS HEARD BY A SILENT AUDIENCE TOO

**Many Went Out, and One Man Went to Sleep During the Speech by the Conservative "Ring" Candidate in the Westholme Theatre Last Night---"Ring in the Box" Puzzle Proved Interesting But There Was No Enthusiasm**

William Manson held a meeting in the Westholme Theatre last night. It was a one man show, and desperately dull. An audience which barely filled the body of the house was depleted continually by the steady dribbling away of its members to the meeting over the way, where the candidates opposing William Manson were giving rousing addresses.

**A Straight Challenge.**  
Chairman R. A. White mentioned that the opposing candidates had been invited to the platform, but Mr. Frank Angers

from the floor of the theatre, briefly stated that while William Manson had been invited in good time to the great joint meeting being held in the Empress Theatre, his invitation of Alex. Manson and the other candidates to his own meeting had not come until after the joint meeting had been announced. Nor was the announcement of the William Manson meeting made until long after the opposition meeting announcements had been published. However, Mr. Alex. Manson even at that late hour was prepared to throw down the challenge that he would give William Manson a full hour on the Empress platform that night, and would beat him out, taking only ten minutes to reply. With this ringing challenge and amidst a burst of applause, Frank Angers strode like the herald of a conquering force out of the hall.

### ANGERS TURNS MEETING OVER

People Deceived at William Manson's Meeting Put Right by Skeena Orator.  
At William Manson's meeting at the Westholme last night Chairman White, evidently inspired by Silent Bill, stated in opening the meeting that the two opposition candidates, Clayton and Alex. Manson, had been invited to attend but apparently had not chosen to do so.  
Consternation spread over William's features when Frank Angers on behalf of the opposing candidates, who were thus grossly misrepresented, stepped to the front and asked to be allowed to make a statement.  
Mr. Angers said that Montgomery in advertising the meeting at the Empress, had sent invitations to all the candidates including William Manson. And that Clayton and Alex. Manson had accepted the invitation to attend Montgomery's meeting.  
Angers, continuing, said: "William Manson preferred to advertise a meeting of his own rather than do likewise." He further explained that Alex. Manson or Dr. Clayton could attend both meetings. Ringing cheers burst out when Mr. Angers said: "I am empowered by the Liberal candidate to extend to you, Mr. William Manson, an invitation to attend his meeting tomorrow night, at which he will speak first and then give you one hour to reply, taking only ten minutes to close the meeting. And if you choose to come to the joint meeting tonight you will be given unlimited time after your own meeting is over."  
The clique were wild, the audi-

ence had completely turned, realizing that such an attempt to deceive them had been made. The only persons remaining in the theatre were a few government flunkies.

The House of Lords reassembled at 2:50 this morning to receive the bill, which, on the motion of Lord Herschell, passed its first reading. The proceedings were purely informal and the lords then immediately adjourned.

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## CONSPIRACY IS CHARGED

Suffragettes in London Are Arraigned on Very Serious Charge Now—Avalanche of Evidence Against Them.

Mr. and Mrs. Pethick Lawrence, joint editors of Votes for Women; Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and Mrs. Mabel Tuke were brought up at Bow street police court on the charge of conspiracy in connection with the recent window smashing campaign in the streets of London.

Archibald Henry Bodkin, counsel for the treasury, produced a mass of documentary evidence, which he declared unveiled such a mischievous, extensive and deliberate conspiracy as must insure the committal of the accused for trial under the criminal law.

No less than \$20,000, he declared, had been paid by the defendants for hire of halls for meetings, the sole object of which was to instigate so-called militant protests. He estimated the funds of the Women's Political and Social Union, of which the defendants were leaders, at \$572,000.

## HOLLAND WILL PHONE BRITAIN

Latest Development of British Postal Telephone System Will Cut Phone Rates by Half, It Is Said.

Postmaster Samuels, speaking at a dinner of the Associated Chambers of Commerce in London recently, confirmed the report that he would shortly reduce the telephone rates between England and France by half. He is looking forward to establishing an Anglo-Dutch telephone service, and through Holland he hopes soon to be able "to be on speaking terms" with Germany.

## LINK UP FIFTH AVENUE AT LAST

Wider Plankway Fit for Wheel Traffic Will Be Constructed on the Strip of Fifth Avenue Between Dunsmuir and McBride.

Tenders will be called for the material and construction of a plank roadway for wheel traffic continuing Fifth avenue on to McBride street from the west side. This strip of street has been merely a foot passenger track since the planking of Dunsmuir street and there has been an agitation on foot for a long time to have it brought into line with the dimensions of the rest of the street.

Some amusement was occasioned in council when the report of the Board of Works recommending this improvement was passed. The Mayor said that the principal reason for the widening was to let the Anglican Church have lumber hauled there for the erection of their new church hall.

Alderman Douglas, knowing that Alderman Bullock-Webster has property more accessible by this route than any other, laid great emphasis on Alderman Bullock-Webster's supposed desire to aid the Anglicans by pressing for this improvement. But Alderman Bullock-Webster quite vehemently deprecated any such idea. He frankly declared that the plankway would benefit him as it would all others having property in this neighborhood, but maintained that he would stand as stoutly for any other improvement which he knew to be so urgently needed, and instanced the Borden street sewer.

### THE M'ORDIE APPEAL

City Solicitor Now Prepares His Defense—Some Claims Allowed.

City Solicitor Peters is now preparing his defense in the Mc-Mordie appeal. He has advised the Council to pay into court as admissible claims of Mc-Mordie's with the consent also of the City Engineer sums amounting to \$4,544.55 altogether.

The claims made by the contractor which the city does not allow are \$4,500 on account of the minimum wage being made 45 cents instead of 37½ per hour, and \$8,400 for neglect to provide police protection, also the amount claimed for loss of plant because the City Engineer did not pass the final estimates.

Even the holders of licenses are fired of continuous threats and intimidation by the two-man government. They are falling into the ranks of the Liberals every day.

He forget to mention then "that if anybody was in the real estate business good and hard it was the McBride government."

At this point Bob Ross deserted the little circle in the box and went out. At this stage also there was a man sound asleep in the middle of the pit.

Rudimentary Spine. A little later, after saying many unimportant things, William Manson saw fit to lay bare his spine to the audience. He had three small vertebrae to display, rudimentary to be sure, but his all, and he was proud of them.

"They say I have no spine," he said, "but I have. If I had given Harry Clark and Tom Dunn license commission appointments, and made Dr. Clayton a police commissioner, I would have been a good fellow. But I didn't. I had backbone enough to refuse them, and I have backbone enough to do it again." On the license question William Manson remarked that it was easy to take it away. No doubt he was thinking of the Prudhomme case. He brought his speech to a close with some sparring at his opponents, Alex. Manson and Dr. Clayton.

Save Clayton One. He hadn't much to say about Alex. Manson, but he did say that he had accused Doc Clayton of switching his politics. Doc Clayton had said that was nothing

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Not Courage Enough to Take a Lamb by the Tail

The Ring can cook up a convention and they can cook up this constituency; but this constituency is going to give William Manson the greatest roasting you can imagine.

We should have had redistribution before election, then Skeena would have had three members.

This district is entitled to an appropriation of one million and a half instead of a miserly \$354,000.

William Manson is going to get but few votes from Hazelton.

William Manson said to me once: "The only thing to do is to take the bull by the horns."

Why, he hasn't spunk enough to take a lamb by the tail.

Alex. Manson's Bright Sayings. William Manson and I were invited to this meeting at the same time. For reasons of his own he has refused to attend. I invite him to my meeting tomorrow night. I will give him an hour and a half if he wishes and will confine myself to ten minutes in reply.

The Conservative party is disorganized; all over the riding the people are rising against Ring Rule. Dr. Clayton is a Conservative, yet he is against it. On that principle we stand shoulder to shoulder, and if I am not elected your member it should be Dr. Clayton.

The man we are fighting in this campaign is William Manson. We have tried him both as mayor and member and in both positions found him wanting.

I ask you in all seriousness: Is it fair to take money out of the public treasury and use it for campaign purposes?

At Hazelton I found the names of many old timers missing from the voters' list. I find that it is the practice to place on the lists only those known to be Conservatives, and the declarations of those found to be Liberals are not turned into the registrar of voters.

The voters of Kispiox asked William Manson for an appropriation of \$22,000. "How many votes have you," they were asked. The number was given. "Too big an appropriation for that many votes," was the decision of the member, and yet your ex-member told them at Kitsumkalum that it would not be fair or honest to discuss the distribution of appropriations on the eve of an election.

Along the Skeena river there are twenty-five applicants for licenses. No one knows whether they will get licenses or not until after election. If you are

good you get one; if not you don't. Frank Angers spoke at Terrace on behalf of the Liberals. His employer, a licensed hotel keeper, was called upon to immediately discharge Mr. Angers, and he had to do so.

My friend the Journal says that if you do not return a straight government candidate something is going to happen. What an indictment of McBride—appropriations to be effected by one question of whether a representative be Liberal or Conservative and not by the needs of the district—what an indictment!

William Manson has failed as a friend at court. I would stand a better chance of obtaining proper appropriations than he does. And I would see that our money is spent fairly and squarely. I would have no road foremen asking the hotel clerk to sign a receipt in blank. I would have no road foremen winking to the clerk and saying: "Aren't you?" Fellow electors of the city of Prince Rupert, "Aren't you?"

Montgomery's Socialism. The Conservatives have never passed any legislation for the working classes and the Liberals have done very little better, so the thing was to start a new party and I am the representative of the Socialist party.

Dr. Clayton says William Manson hasn't courage to catch a lamb by the tail, but I notice he commandeered a government boat to Stewart and government teams from Hazelton to Aldermere, and swapped a hand car on the railway; so I think he might be able to tackle a lamb.

Mayor Newton has turned over so many times that he has no square sides on him.

You are not content with conditions in Prince Rupert; you want to get rid of Ring Rule for all time; then why not change the whole business.

We have had William Manson as mayor and he was a failure. At Stewart he said he would not pledge himself to support any measure that might intimidate capital.

If you want to get rid of Ring Rule, of which we have so much in this city, you must support the Socialist candidate. Ring Rule is going to get a nasty drop on the 28th anyway.
