Prince Rupert Still Has Chance For Building Of Ships, Hanson Advises

Evidently there is still a possibility of Prince Rupert getting some of the war shipbuilding contracts which are now being awarded. The Chamber of Commerce has received a telegram from Olof Hanson M.P. at Ottawa in which he says: "In reply to your letters the Departments of National Defence and Transport inform me that Pacific Coast shipbuilding allotment is still under discussion owing, as I understand, to differences in tenders."

HITLER, SPEAKING BY SURPRISE, SAYS HE IS SURE OF NAZI VICTORY

With Italy Friendly and Russia Guarding Her in Rear, the Reich Cannot Lose, Der Fuehrer Asserts

BERLIN, January 30: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler, speaking today, declared that Germany, bound to Italy by close friendship and protected from the rear by Russia, could not lose the war which he said had been forced upon her by "arrogant" Britain.

Yesterday raids were made upon at least fourteen larger vessels and numerous trawlers. Two men were killed on the trawlers Rigoletto and Durrant by machine gunning. The British steamship Eston, 1487 tons, is missing in the North Sea with crew of eighteen.

The German high command in Berlin boasted last night of having destroyed two British patrol ships, seven armed merchantmen and one British pursuit plane near Hartlepool without sustaining losses itself. In the most intensive and widespread day's bombing since the war began, this was at variance with early British claims that no ships had been sunk.

At Copenhagen the loss of the crew of twenty of the Danish steamship Fredsborg, 3000 tons, when she struck a mine off Scotland was announced. Another mine victim was the 298-ton Belgian ship Nora which struck the explosive during the air raids.

It is not usual for the newspapers to have to write up fine weather in Prince Rupert but today is just a little finer than usual. To have such bright sunshine and such balmy breezes as prevail here this afternoon on a midwinter day was something to boast about.

"TOTAL WAR" SOON PARIS—Speaking to the French nation last night, Premier Daladier advised his people to be ready like good soldiers for Hitler's "total war" which must now come soon.

ITALY WARNED MOSCOW—Russia warns Italy against joining with the Allies. She will suffer heavily if she does. Meantime Italy is charged in the official Soviet press with having one foot in the Allied camp and one in the German.

OIL TO REICH BERLIN—The Reich is sending railway equipment across Russian-occupied Poland in order to bring back oil from Roumania.

SNOW STOPS FIGHTING PARIS—Fresh and heavy snowfall curbed military activities on the Western Front today. French artillery shelled German labor battalions engaged in strengthening the Siegfried Line.

CHARGE OF SHOOTING

Edward Brown Faces Trial After Incident on Earl Brochu's Traps at Sockeye Lake

Appearing before Stipendiary Magistrate Andrew Thompson in provincial police court for preliminary trial on a charge of shooting at Earl Brochu with intent to do grievous bodily harm, Edward Brown has been remanded until Tuesday afternoon of next week.

On going to his trapline, it appears that Brochu found Brown occupying his cabin and advised him that he would be requiring it. Brown left, apparently in a friendly way. A week later—At 2 o'clock on the morning of January 21—Brochu was awakened from his sleep by a shot. It had just missed his head and lodged in the cabin wall nearby. The shot had been fired through the cabin window which was broken. Outside was found a shotgun. This weapon, it is alleged, had been borrowed by Brown from William Barton of Billmor.

JAPAN IN BAD WAY

Fuel and Power Shortage Causes Many Industries Of Nippon To Close Down TOKYO, Jan. 30: (CP)—An electric power shut-down, caused by a critical coal shortage and dwindling water power, brought to a standstill today all factories but those engaged in urgent production of war materials and essential public services.

Canada had hardly felt the effects of war as yet, said Mr. MacCallum, but within the next six or twelve months there would undoubtedly be a strain upon the Red Cross. He referred to the horrors in Poland and Finland and what the Red Cross was doing in the way of helping there.

Before the adjournment of the meeting the President read circular letters regarding conditions in war-stricken Poland and Finland and the dire need there from such organizations as the Red Cross. How this work was being accomplished was described.

Bulletins

HOSTAK BEATEN CHICAGO—Tony Zale, Indiana steel mill worker, scored an upset decision over Al Hostak of Seattle, recognized by the National Boxing Association as middleweight champion, here last night.

NO JAP REDUCTION OTTAWA—There will be no further reduction this year in Japanese fishing licences on the British Columbia coast, it is announced. Japanese licences are now 13 percent of the total.

GERMAN CHARGED VANCOUVER—A German seaman has been arrested here and charged with violation of Defence of Canada regulations. He is alleged to have sent information to his wife and friends at Rotterdam about Canadian resources. There is the possibility of five years' imprisonment and \$5000 fine.

CONSERVE FUEL LONDON—The British government has warned the people to conserve coal and other fuel in view of the cold wave, the most severe in fifty years. There is no food shortage but, owing to crippled transportation systems due to the cold, distribution is meantime difficult.

ALBERTA ELECTION EDMONTON—Premier William Aberhart, announcing last night that the ninth session of the present legislature would open February 8, said that the date of the general election would be set at the earliest possible moment. It might be on or before April 15, the Premier said.

ISSUE NOW WAXES BIG TOKYO—With Foreign Minister Arita of Japan sending a second protest to Great Britain on the seizure of the twenty-one German seamen from the liner Asama Maru, the case has approached the proportions of a major political and international issue. The new protest demands formally that the Germans be returned.

PLANES OVER TIENTSIN TIENTSIN—Only the barest food supplies are available to the British and French concessions at Tientsin as import of all food has been banned by the Japanese in tightening the blockade measures which were first effected June 14 last and since then relaxed. Japanese military planes flew over the concession today, there being no official explanation of the flights.

REDS STILL LOSING OUT

About The Only Success Russians Are Having Is Bombing Civilians And Killing Women HELSINGFORS, Jan. 30: (CP)—The Finnish command reported yesterday that its troops had killed over 1250 Russians in two battles during which the invaders were driven back on the eastern front.

About eight hundred Russians were killed and 1760 captured northeast of Lake Ladoga and in the Aittojoki sector to the south the enemy left over 450 dead. Twenty-three persons were killed, four of them women and nineteen patients, when Russian bombers raided a village near the Karelian Isthmus front and bombed a field hospital. These were among 100 killed and 300 injured in air raids across southern Finland yesterday.

The Finnish high command announced today that Finnish planes and anti-aircraft batteries brought down twenty-one Russian planes during the raids on Monday. One Finnish plane is reported lost although the Russians claimed that seven were brought down. It was declared that the Finns had bombed a "certain harbor and vessels lying there." Informed circles assumed that it was the Russian naval base of Kronstadt near Leningrad.

Red planes appeared over southern Finland again today. Viipuri was raided. and Fafard, Quebec; Hon. J. C. Elliott, Ontario; Arthur L. Beaubien, Manitoba; Donald McLennan, Nova Scotia; John J. Stevenson, Saskatchewan; Dr. Aristride Blais, Alberta. Seven vacancies remain to be filled. The party representation in the Upper Chamber now stands at 38 Liberals and 51 Conservatives.

EDITORIAL

WAS HE RESPONSIBLE?

Max Freeman, writing for the Edmonton Bulletin, pays tribute to the greatness of the late Senator Borah in various respects but also says:

"Senator Borah never liked Great Britain or her empire. He admitted this many times. Having a parochial vision on world problems, looking out upon Europe from the small window of an Idaho lawyer's office, he always was ready to impute the worst of motives to Britain even when she was engaged in the best of causes.

"Even in this war, he did not scruple to say publicly that he saw no difference between European democracies and dictatorships although they were ranged in a contest for survival, one against the other. For once, his rhetoric was seen as a hollow sham. His opposition against the lifting of the arms embargo was a futile attempt to win support when it was obvious to the majority of Senators that Borah had neither truth nor justice on his side.

"What Senator Borah thought about the present war is of little moment, except to himself. But his conduct towards the League of Nations unleashed vast historical forces that have spread woe and devastation over the whole world. As he himself said, in 1919, he was prepared to wreck the Republican party rather than have it endorse the Versailles Treaty and make America a member of the League of Nations. President Wilson had Taft, Elihu Root and Hays on his side in his attempt to gain Republican co-operation. Senator Lodge, Theodore Roosevelt and Borah were the big three who were ready to have the Republican party smashed rather than see America represented at Geneva. Borah was the spearhead of the attack against Wilson and he won.

"Wilson was not defeated by reason; he was tricked in a political game by his opponents. Borah threatened to stomp the country against his own party if his fellow-Republicans did not jettison the Democratic president's peace policy. He boasted of the skill he showed in making six recalcitrant Senators come over to his side. Had those six votes been cast in favor of Wilson, the ultimate Senate decision might have made America a League member and the history of the past 20 years would have been totally different and infinitely better.

"No matter what domestic successes may adorn Borah's career, this blot upon his record can never be forgotten, even though the lapse of years may help it to be forgiven."

TENSION BETWEEN U.S. AND JAPAN

The Financial News in a recent number says: Momentarily, the tension between the United States and Japan is the biggest news in the world. It may be relieved and the continued neutrality of Japan and the United States may be assured. But in the meanwhile there is just the chance that in the process of side-choosing, the United States and Japan may take opposite positions, because of this rift over the termination of a treaty of thirty years' standing."

Notice To Pedestrians And Cyclists

By amendments to the "Highway Act" it was enacted—

- (a) THAT every pedestrian proceeding along a highway where a sidewalk is provided shall proceed upon the sidewalk; but if there is no sidewalk he shall proceed on the extreme left side of the highway;

IT BURNS HIM UP

Editor, Daily News:
For some time I have suffered in silence but it seems that I am obliged to let off a bit of steam or burst. Naturally, I have many things to discuss but will try to cover some of them as briefly as possible.

Some time ago you made reference to the United States and the Finnish war debt. I will merely point out that one of your statements was in very bad taste. You referred to the "Shylocks", etc., of the United States. Permit me to draw your attention that there were then and now are "Shylocks" in both Canada and Britain.

You have made references to Russia and, doubtless, most Canadians will agree with them. However, you have overlooked the causes of their condition. No nation which "forgets God", not to mention starting a war against God, will prosper. Russia and Germany are at war with God but just how soon will Britain be in the same place? In Russia, in particular, it has been customary to kill off all those who try to do anything for the country or who have the ability to do the necessary jobs. Today Russia finds out her mistake—we hope.

On the 18th you say: "Seems Too Bad" and one would think you might believe that we have no right to criticize our public servants. Possibly they have become infallible in recent weeks? However, on the 19th you criticize them for shipping wheat to Russia. How is one to know where to draw the line? I agree with your criticism in that respect and would go back for several months and include the shipment of nickel and scrap iron, etc., to both Germany and Japan. I would also call your attention once more to the fact that you rather insult the Americans for doing this while admitting it is done by Canadians. There seems to be something wrong in this "Friends Across the Border" stuff.

To go back several months, I again proclaim my ignorance and repeat that the Dominion and the provinces should not borrow any private "credit" at any time. I do not refer to messing with private money in other respects, however. In this issue I note a letter by some who have had a relief cut. I shall again point out that the issue of 299,000,000 bonds at this time is merely adding to the present relief payments of a million every day. The paying of interest upon bonds is unnecessary for the Dominion and is nothing whatever but relief to those who have a surplus of capital, credit or so-called cash. Nothing burns me up more than
