> LONDON, March 20: (CP)-The unleashed Royar Air Force, its appende whetted by a booming seven-hour raid on the German forti-Leation of Sylt Island, returned to the scene today with bombs, guns and cameras, to work more havoc and prove it with pictures of the scene.

> Air Ministry sources said the object of the daylight flights was to secure photographs but reports received here from Tonder, Denmark. said Sylt was apparently being bombed all over again. The two photograph planes returned safely.

Danish coastal observers, hampered by poor visibility, said there apparently were six groups of bombers in the nev raid with reverberating explosions equal to those of the previous night and with German anti-aircraft batteries keeping up a terrific defence fusi'ade.

All the aircraft used in today's raid returned safely but one in last night's raid failed to return.

The Danes said they fired warning shots at one unidentified plane, which flew over Danish soil and that several bombs dropped on the Danish coast on which they said one plane landed with spitting machine guns.

Most undignified. Arguments used as to why Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King is unfit to continue in office and why Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion should not take his place are extremely petty. Putting political bias to one side, we all know that the present Prime Minister is the man for the job. He has sacrificed his own inclinations for the British Empire and then some pettifogging politicians come along and call him names and try to hint that he was not loyal to the Empire a quarter of a century ago. Even if he was not, neither was General Smuts. What has that to do with today? It makes one very sick to listen to some of the arguments on both sides.

We suggest that we forget all the petty stuff and keep arguments toned up to a wartime plane. The fate of the British Empire is at stake in the conflict overseas and it does not help the Empire to have petty politicians engage in petty bickering at such a time. Why not be as reasonable in our political arguments as in the other business of everyday life?

TEST OF NOBLENESS

We hear a lot of talk about nobleness. There is nobleness of soul, nobleness of spirit, nobleness of stature, nobleness of character. If these words mean anything at all, they were exhibited by the women of Finland prior to the peace. The Finnish women stood nobly by their men in carrying on. With shells bursting about them, trying to protect their children, they never lost faith in their cause and in the courage of the menfolk. It was a wonderful test and they stood it nobly.

In Finland during the war the Salvation Army had ninety relief depots and some of them were bombed. However, that did not discourage the Salvationists. They went there expecting that sort of thing. The windows of the headquarters were blown out by bombs but that did not interfere with their work. Even yet they have much work to do in helping the homeless people of the war region to get re-established.



SO IN THE WAR AIMS

As it is difficult to keep petty people from drawing us away from the main aim in the present political fight, so it is difficult to keep the Germans from drawing people away from the main cause of war. The case for the Allies has to be stated again and again. The war is being fought to protect weaker nations from aggression. The rape of !! Poland was the immediate cause of the war starting but we are fighting just as much for Finland, for Norway and Sweden and Holland and Belgium, for Roumania and Bulgaria and Switzerland. All these nations live in fear and trembling. They never know a day but what some stronger nation may march across the border and kill and burn. Asia is not any more safe than Europe. The world seems to have dropped back centuries in its aims and ideals. Even some of the neutral countries think of nothing except to try to escape by staying away from the scene of conflict. There is no real unified effort to keep the world decent." Our whole trend of thought has been perverted by the race; for wealth, power or ease.
