Axis Powers May Take On Soviet

Marshal Of Air For Italy, Italo Balbo, Loses Life In Fight Over Town Of Libya

ROME, June 29: (CP)— Marshal Italo Balbo, Governor of Libya, was killed yesterday while piloting a plane over Tobruk, Libya, during enemy bombardment, an official announcement said today. The plane crashed in flames and all on board were killed. The swashbuckling, bearded Balbo had long been a spectacular figure in Italian affairs and had been more than once mentioned as a successor to Premier Benito Mussolini with whom he was one of the "Fascist Big Four" who led the "March on Rome."

Former air minister for Italy, Balbo in 1933 led a spectacular mass flight of Italian planes to Canada and the United States.

COWARDLY AIR RAID

Twenty-Nine Killed When Nazis Strafe Defenceless Channel Islands—Had Been Demilitarized

LONDON, June 29: (CP)— The Channel Islands were strafed and bombed by Nazi airmen Friday with a death toll of twenty-nine, nearly equalling the total air raid victims in all England and Scotland since the Germans began their night raids. The victims were civilians, among the few remaining after the Islands had been demilitarized, "open towns" having been declared and the majority of the 90,000 population being transferred to England. Scores were injured and shops, hotels and dwellings were laid in ruins.

The attacks were centred on Jersey and Guernsey Islands. There was not a single defensive gun so it was a field day for the bombers which were also able to swoop down without opposition whatsoever and machine gun the people and the buildings. An ambulance was also attacked.

A German communique in Berlin said that important troop concentrations and forts had been struck but this, of course, was false.

ALIENS MUST REGISTER
 WASHINGTON—Roosevelt has signed into law a bill requiring the registration and fingerprinting of approximately 3,500,000 aliens in the United States.

LADY MOSELY ARRESTED
 LONDON—Lady Mosely, wife of Sir Oswald Mosely and sister of Miss Unity Freeman Mitford, friend of Adolf Hitler, was arrested today.

CANADIAN BULWARK
 LONDON—Major General L. R. LaFleche, Canadian military attache at Paris, has issued an earnest call for conversion of Canada into a strongly fortified bulwark against Nazi domination of the world. He told Canadian Press in an interview that the Dominion should look towards arming and defending the great coastline without delay.

SUICIDE VICTIM

Worker At Aliford Bay Air Base Hangs Himself, Police Here Advised

J. A. Swong, a civil worker at the Royal Canadian Air Force base at Aliford Bay, is dead by hanging himself, according to a brief message received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. No details were given. An inquest is being held but the message said there were no circumstances of suspicious nature.

Roumania Says Nazis And Italians To Halt Advance Of Russia

Red Invasion Said To Be Going Past Line of Demarcation—King Carol Mustering Army of Four Million Men

BUCHAREST, Roumania, June 29: (CP)—Germany and Italy are said on high authority to have assured Roumania that they would prevent any further advances into King Carol's kingdom. This intimation followed earlier reports that Soviet and Roumanian troops were already in battle after Red forces had advanced beyond Bessarabia past lines of demarcation which Russia is said to have declared she would respect in her occupation.

Meantime Roumanian troops have been hurried into mobilization and an army of 4,000,000 men is being mustered to resist not only the Russian invasion being carried beyond bounds but to check a Hungarian movement into Transylvania and Bulgarian invasion of Dobruja.

Russia is also reported to have designs on the Hungarian Ukraine. The whole situation is quite confused with deep intrigue evident. It would appear probable that the dogs of war may seem to be released in all their fury in the Balkans.

CLOSING EARLIER

Halibut Season in Areas 1 and 2 to End on July 13

SEATTLE, June 29: (CP)—The International Fisheries Commission announces the closing of the Pacific Coast waters as far north as Cape Spender, Alaska, to halibut fishing at midnight July 13. The closure of one and two areas is sixteen days earlier than that of last year, owing to increased catches being landed, more boats engaged in fishing and higher trip limits.

Canadian Heroism Saved Many Lives When H.M.C.S. Fraser Was In Collision

LONDON, June 29: (CP)—The sister ship of the Canadian destroyer H.M.C.S. Fraser gambled against the chance of drawing the enemy fire and performing a miracle of navigation to snatch from death most of the officers and men who survived the collision off Bordeaux. The second Canadian warship ploughed alongside the section of the destroyer remaining afloat and took off about fifty seamen. The vessel then flooded the sea with full searchlights, despite the danger of drawing enemy aircraft and rescued another forty men who were tossing on the waves.

The heroism of the seventeen-year-old A. L. Jones of White Rock, British Columbia, saved scores of lives. The hulk of the destroyer would have been blown up, if he had not rendered a load of depth charges harmless after the Fraser was sliced in two.

DROWNED AT ITALIANS NAAS RIVER

George Weir, Son of Mr. and Mrs. James Weir, Loses His Life at Mill Bay

George Weir, elder son of Mr. and Mrs. James Weir, was drowned in a sad tragedy which occurred yesterday morning at Mill Bay on the Naas River. The remains were brought to the city last evening by Provincial Constable Alex Gaunt aboard the fishery patrol boat Marissa, Capt. Ivor Wick, on which the youth was employed.

About 8:15 yesterday morning the lad had climbed up a ladder to the cannery dock from the float at which the Marissa and other boats were moored. A very few minutes later he was in the water struggling and calling for help. A rope was thrown to him but, evidently, he did not see it. Before a boat could put out, he had gone down. The tragedy occurred within fifteen feet of the dock. Almost immediately, the body was recovered by grappling but life was extinct. There is a strong undertow at that point.

Following an inquiry by D. John Macdonald, the coroner at Kincoy, the body was brought to Prince Rupert and is now in charge of the B. C. Undertakers. Circumstances were obviously entirely accidental.

George Weir was sixteen years of age and was born here. He was the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. George B. Casey. The family will have the deep sympathy of many friends in the sad bereavement.

LOSE OUT

Three destroyers and Two Submarines Are Destroyed

CAIRO, June 29: (CP)—In a naval communique it was announced that three enemy destroyers had been sunk in a naval engagement. The report also stated that the British had received no casualties.

An Admiralty communique announced in London that two more Italian submarines were sunk.

MOVE OUT OF SYRIA

Polish Troops Have Crossed Frontier Into Palestine

LONDON, June 29: (CP)—It has been reported that six thousand Polish troops have crossed the Syrian frontier and have entered Palestine to join the British forces already stationed there. The statement said that withdrawal was ordered when it became apparent that the French commander might throw in his lot with the Bordeaux government.

BAR GOLD

LONDON, (CP)—The Montreal price of bar gold on the London market was unchanged today at \$37.54 per fine ounce.

C., V. D., officer commanding, Prince Rupert garrison area. About fifty strong, they presented a highly creditable and smart appearance and fully merited the complimentary remarks which were made by the inspection officer, Mrs. G. Wharton, chief commandant, was in charge and Sergeant W. A. Akehurst of the Canadian Scottish conducted the inspection drills. Col. Johnston was accompanied in making the inspection by Lieut. Col. J. War News

MAY START MONDAY

LONDON—The Rome-Berlin axis powers may start a blitzkrieg against Great Britain, the defender of democracy, on Monday. Whether it will be against the British Isles direct or in the Mediterranean is uncertain. From Stockholm come reports of unusual troop movements off the Norwegian coast. Developments in the Balkan area may complicate the situation in the west for the Axis powers.

SUCCESSFUL AIR RAIDS

CAIRO—Highly successful air raids by the Royal Air Force on Italian air bases, fuel stores and ammunition dumps in North Africa are reported. All British aircraft returned safely to their bases.

REYNAUD IS HURT

BORDEAUX—Former Premier Paul Reynaud is in serious condition although his life is not believed in danger following injuries sustained in an automobile accident.

BRITAIN IS RAIDED

LONDON—The British Isles, including Wales and northeastern England, were again raided last night and early this morning by Nazi bombers but little, if any, damage to property was done and no casualties are reported.

AMERICAN SHIP SUNK

NEW YORK — The 6000-ton American steamer Edgell has been torpedoed and sunk between the south of Ireland and Land's End, it is reported. The Edgell was built at Seattle in 1919 and is registered out of New York.

McNARY RUNNING MATE

PHILADELPHIA — Senator Charles McNary of Oregon was yesterday named vice-presidential running mate for Wendell Willkie, Republican candidate for president of the United States.

FORMER A. D. C. ARRESTED

LONDON—Capt. George Pittivers, former aide-de-camp to the Governor General of Australia, has been arrested under defence of the realm laws.

EDITORIALS

WAKEN PRINCE RUPERT

Evidently nothing but the dropping of a bomb in the city will awaken Prince Rupert to the seriousness of the present situation. We are the most unconcerned people in the world. Were it not for the large numbers of people around the bulletin boards and the very considerable increase in the circulation of this paper, we should almost imagine the people here are not in the least interested in the events transpiring in Europe and other parts of the world. However, it is not that personal kind of interest that rouses to action.

The inclusion of a Prince Rupert man in the list of casualties yesterday, perhaps, will make the people here realize how serious is the war and how desirable it is that every person do something to help.

DASTARDLY ACT

That was a dastardly act of the Germans to bomb the Channel Islands just after it was publicly announced that they were not defended and were not in any respect a military zone. When the German planes invade England they are driven off and many of them have been shot down. There was no danger of being shot down at the Island of Jersey because there was nothing to shoot with. It was in the same category as an open town, not subject to attack under the international rules of warfare.

WHAT IS THE REASON?

Someone takes the trouble to write and ask why it is that the Daily News has made such decided increases in circulation of late. PREPARED TO SERVE

Volunteer Registrants Meet in Large Numbers to Organize—Activities Planned

An attendance that filled the Canadian Legion clubroom last evening went on record as favoring the formation of a local corps that would engage in learning or re-learning the various drills of army activities so as to equip themselves for service to their country and be prepared for any emergency that might arise.

The meeting was called as a result of the local registration of voluntary service. More than six hundred had registered at the time but, with the advice that the government was introducing national compulsory registration, the local committee felt that its duties were over. Accordingly it placed the records at the disposal of the Dominion government. It also advised the government that it was willing to carry on the work of national registration without remuneration. In the interim, before national registration can be organized, the local registrants expressed their desire to be doing something. The meeting was the result.

The committee, prior to disbanding, had considered in what way the people who registered might be properly made use of. These people wished to do what they could and various outlets for their activities could be found. As a result of the meeting, a resolution was unanimously endorsed asking the tentative committee to carry on and take steps to organize in the meantime. It is assumed that activities such as drills, signalling, first-aid, rifle-shooting would be among the items taken care of.

Another resolution, to be sent to both the provincial and dominion governments, was that the jobs and positions of men who left to enlist be kept open for them when they return from service and also that they be entitled to all seniority that would have been theirs had they stayed with their civilian work.

The first item that the local committee had considered was recruiting for all branches of His Majesty's Forces. In this connection Captain J. T. Harvey and Sergeant-Major W. M. Brown were present at the meeting. Captain Harvey told of the recruiting to be done for the 102nd Heavy Battery, Second Searchlight Battery, Irish Fusiliers, Westminster Regiment, Machine Gun, Second Battalion Canadian Scottish and the B. C. Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles). Then there were the Home Guards, open only to ex-service men up to fifty years of age. The recruiting offices for all of these units was in the Armory on Sixth Avenue. It was explained that category A, B, and C, had reference to a man's medical fitness as determined by the medical examining board. In every case the greatest care was taken to see that every man was placed where he could be of the greatest value.

The meeting, which opened with the singing of "O Canada" and closed with the National Anthem, was presided over by J. S. Wilson who, with Major M. A. Burbank, is the only one of the original committee in the city at present.

Waterfront Whiffs

First Fish Run Through Local Cannery Today—Halibut Landings Much Heavier This Year—Sockeye Fishing Starts Tomorrow

First fish was run through the new salmon cannery of Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. on the Canadian National Railways ocean dock Prince Rupert this afternoon. The fish consisted of 5,000 pounds of cohoes and 300 pounds of springs brought in by John Johansen aboard the boat Maude J. from the "flats" fishing grounds. The plant functioned completely satisfactorily and is in readiness to get into full operation with the commencement of the sockeye fishing season tomorrow evening.

Southbound after a cruise in Alaska waters, the palatial yacht Nina III, with Mr. Barrows, San Francisco chemical manufacturer and party on board, called here yesterday, spending several hours in port while taking on fuel and supplies.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 12:15 midnight last night from the south and sailed at 3 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Alex Gordon, veteran chief engineer of the steamer Princess Alice, at present on the Alaska run of the British Columbia Coast Steamship Service of the Canadian Pacific Railway, is retiring on superannuation. He will be succeeded by William Wollock, at present chief of the Princess Elaine on the Vancouver-Nanaimo run. Donald McRaid, now on the Princess Adelaide and also well known for years on northern runs, goes to the Princess Elaine and Alexander Dowell transfers from the Princess Mary to the Adelaide. New chief engineer on the Princess Mary will be James A. (Gus) Sullivan from the Nootka. The shuffle of chief engineers becomes effective immediately.

Halibut Landings Heavy

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1940 season continue to show a large increase in volume over 1939. Up to and including yesterday the grand total for this year was 8,846,519 pounds as compared with 7,363,300 pounds at a corresponding date last year. The great increase is in American landings which have reached an aggregate of 5,193,600 pounds as against 4,032,000 pounds at the corresponding date in 1939. During the past week landings amounted to 624,000 pounds of which 332,400 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 291,600 pounds from American. Prices during the week held up well although showing a slight tendency towards falling off towards the end of the week. The high price of the week was 10.7c and 7c paid the Morris H. for 14,000 pounds and the low 9c and 7c which the Cape Race and Hellen II. received for 7,500 and 13,000 pounds respectively. For American fish the high price of the week was 10.3c and 7.5c which the 312979 was paid for 1,500 pounds and the low 9c and 7.5c which the Pioneer III. received for 19,000 pounds.

With advance indications good for a substantial run and weather conditions very favorable, the season for gill net fishing for sockeye
