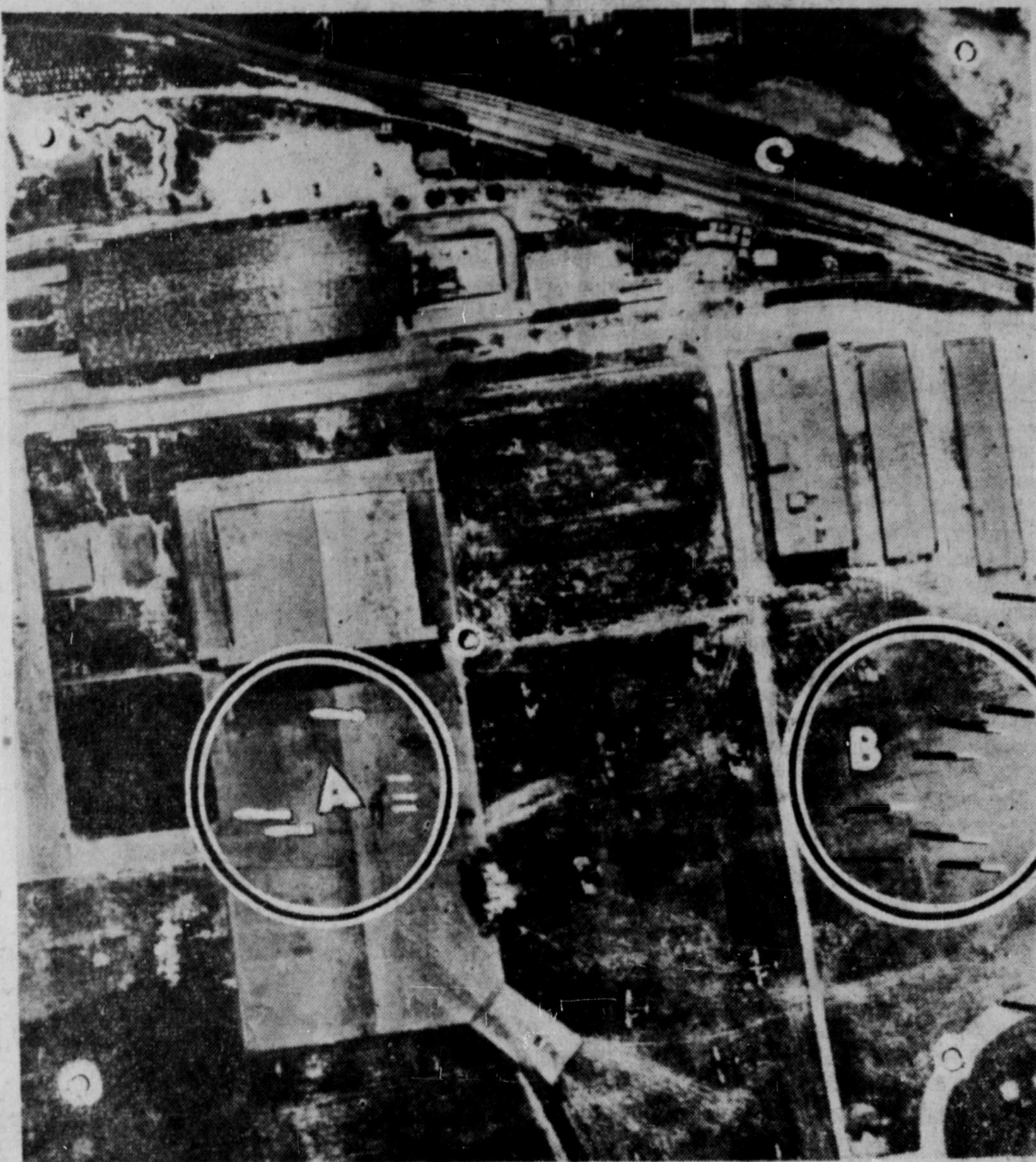

## LARGE AIR FIGHT BAG ON MONDAY

Sixty-One Enemy Planes Brought Down as Portsmouth is Subjected to Attack

### Blitzkrieg On

Zero Hour in "Battle of Britain" is Fast Approaching

LONDON, Aug. 13: (CP)—London newspapers agree that the blitzkrieg is now on, the Battle of Britain is begun and even heavier and more widespread attacks may be anticipated. Warning is issued against attempted landing of parachute troops. All signs point today to early zero hours in the Nazi offensive against England with the climax an attempt to land German troops on the British Isles.

LONDON, Aug. 13: (CP)—At least sixty-one German planes shot down comprised Monday's bag as waves of Nazi raiders attacked the southern coast, the Air Ministry announced last night. The British loss was thirteen planes. It was officially announced that Portsmouth dockyard, the biggest naval base in Great Britain, had been attacked by enemy bombers. Again today hundreds of German planes swarmed over southeast and southwest England and thirty-one enemy planes were shot down during the day, bringing to more than 220 the number of Germans shot down since major attacks began Thursday.

A big formation of enemy raiders blasted at the southeast coastal area late yesterday afternoon in the fourth raid of the day and the second major thrust at Great Britain in two days. Two hundred planes attempted to reach southern England but only fifty-five were able to penetrate the defences. The others were broken up by Royal Air Force fighters who sent four spinning into the sea. Italian pilots are believed to have joined the Germans in the attack on Britain. Thirteen British planes were missing as a result of today's action, one pilot being later reported safe. There were indications yesterday that big German land guns from the French coast were firing across the Channel. On Sunday the Germans, it was indicated by some reports, lost sixty-nine planes in raids in which

## STAND AT BERBERA

British Reinforcements Arrive at Port on Gulf of Aden to Resist Italian Advance

CAIRO, Aug. 13: (CP)—Newly arrived reinforcements from the Empire are reported to be digging in around the seaport of Berbera on the Gulf of Aden for a stand against Italian columns advancing across the burning sands of the Somaliland wastes against harassing British aerial attacks. One Italian plane was brought down and one British is reported missing. A Rome communique claimed that the first contact had already been made with occupation of Adodla. The British say the advance was stopped. Heavy concentrations of Italian troops continue along the border of Egypt but there has been no invasion as yet.

## Three Australian Cabinet Members Are Killed In Air Crash Near Canberra

CANBERRA, August 13.—Three leading Australian war cabinet members and the chief of general staff were among ten persons killed Tuesday when a Royal Australian Air Force plane, flying from Melbourne to Canberra, crashed in flames while nearing Canberra airport.

The dead ministers are: Hon. Brigadier Geoffrey A. Street, defence minister. Hon. J. V. Fairbairn, air minister. Sir Henry Gullett, vice-president of the executive council. General Sir Brudenell White, chief of general staff.

Others killed were Mr. Fairbairn's secretary, another secretary and four members of the plane's crew.

Prime Minister R. G. Menzies described the tragedy as "a great national calamity and a grievous personal loss."

The plane was American-built.

## War News

**ITALIANS ATTACK MALTA**  
ROME—In an air raid by the Italians on Malta, an oil depot is claimed to have been struck, causing a serious fire.

**BRISTOL IN GOOD SHAPE**  
BRISTOL—Louis Hunter, Canadian Press correspondent, writes that the port of Bristol is not closed and not blockaded. In spite of air raids, no damage has been done to harbor facilities or docks.

**NO DENIAL MADE**  
ATHENS—Premier John Metaxas of Greece does not deny that the Greeks have allowed a small British naval force to land at a Greek port. The Italians had complained at this alleged breach of neutrality.

**FUSILIERS AT STRENGTH**  
VANCOUVER—The second Battalion of Irish Fusiliers, as well as other military units, have been brought up to full strength by recent recruiting.

## Foreigners At Dairen Taken Into Custody

TOKYO, Aug. 13: (CP)—Japanese News Agency reports nineteen foreigners arrested at Dairen on charges of anti-Japanese propaganda and possession of short wave radios. Names or nationalities were not disclosed.

**CALLED TO WAR WORK**  
LONDON, Aug. 13: (CP)—An appeal is being made to private employers by the Minister of Labor to consider if they can release their chauffeurs or mechanics for vital war work in armament factories.

## PROTECTION OF RUPERT

Strong Stand Taken On Conscription By Local Organization

The executive of the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League was in session last evening in preparation for the general monthly meeting of Wednesday evening.

Letters of appreciation of the Prince Rupert branch's thoughtfulness in sending wreaths for the local service prior to the transshipment of the bodies of the three air-men who lost their lives in the recent tragedy at Allford Bay were received from the relatives and from the officer commanding at Allford Bay.

There was also correspondence regarding necessary local precautions in the matter of oil tank protection and other local menaces. The Legion is taking a very strong stand in the matter of the conscription of aliens and the mobilization of wealth, industry and manpower. The idea is that it is ridiculous to allow and even insist that men of this country should enlist and, at the same time, allow aliens, naturalized or otherwise, to sit back and fill the jobs of the men who are enlisting to protect the country in which the aliens have all the privileges of freedom and do nothing to obtain or maintain it.

Continuing the valued association and example of the late Lord Tweedsmuir, His Excellency, the Earl of Athlone, has been pleased to accept the office of Grand Patron of the Canadian Legion. Her Royal Highness, the Princess Alice has accepted the office of patroness of the Canadian Legion National Poppy Campaign.

President Jack Preece was in the chair, other members present being W. J. Rance, Neil Cameron, J. M. Walker, G. Abbott, J. Armstrong, C. L. Barker and Henry Smith.

## Bulletins

**GERMANY WIDELY RAIDED**  
LONDON—An Air Ministry communique announced today that British bombers had raided seventeen German air bases, a seaplane base at Borkum and Gotha airplane factory last night in forays throughout northwest Germany, France and Holland. The Nazis are using 400 to 600 planes in daily raids now. Today's strongest attacks were from Thames Estuary to the Sussex coast.

**BULGARIA IMPATIENT**  
SOFIA—Official Bulgarian quarters express impatience over alleged dallying by Rumania in coming to terms over the cession of Dobruja. Rumania expresses itself as willing to give over only a part of the territory which Bulgaria demands. Bulgaria may extend its demands to establish a common frontier with Soviet Russia. In Moscow the Soviet press asserted today that Bulgaria's territorial demands on Rumania have Russian support. What with the Italo-Greek crisis over Albania, the situation in the Balkans continues tense.

**INDO-CHINA AGREEMENT**  
LONDON—Japanese and French governments, it is reported here, have reached an agreement for use of French Indo-China ports as naval and air bases.

**PETAÏN TO SPEAK**  
VICHY, France—Premier Henri Petaïn of France speaks at 1 o'clock this afternoon on a worldwide radio broadcast, directed especially to the United States.

**BROTHERS MISSING**  
DERBY, Eng., August 12: (CP)—The three Wagg brothers, Alfred, Edward and Thomas, were called for for military service on the same day. Recently they were reported in a casualty list as missing.

## PROPAGANDA TURNED ON

Attack Against Greeks Is Launched As Result Of Situation In Albania

ROME, Aug. 13: (CP)—Italy turned a propaganda attack yesterday upon Greece, charging the Greeks with supplying oil to the British and conniving with Great Britain in plots along the border of Italian-conquered Albania. Italian reports said that 400 Albanian soldiers had been killed in Albanian uprisings.

The reported beheading of an Albanian minority leader, a Greek border raider touched off a violent press campaign reminiscent of those by Germany against Czechoslovakia and Poland. Reported disturbances on the Albanian-Yugoslav frontier are denied.

## Elect By Acclamation

Opposition To Hon. Angus Macdonald, New Minister Of Naval Affairs

KINGSTON, Ont., August 13:—Hon. Angus Macdonald, the minister of national defence and naval affairs, was elected by acclamation yesterday as Liberal member of the House of Commons. Mr. Macdonald was formerly Premier of Nova Scotia. His seat was formerly held by the late Hon. Norman Rogers, who died in an airplane crash. There will be contests in three other by-elections—straight fights in two other Ontario seats with a three-cornered fight in Saskatchewan.

## His Son Wedded Miss Churchill

Daughter of British Prime Minister and Wife of John Bailey, Successor To Baronetcy

Three sons and four daughters were born of the two marriages. Sir Abe Bailey, South African oil magnate and race-horse owner, whose death is recorded as the eldest and heir to the baronetcy. John Milner Bailey, became a London broker and married Diana, daughter of Winston Churchill, in 1932.

## EDITORIAL

### BE SURE TO REGISTER

The government is asking every person, man or woman, over sixteen years of age to register during the first three days of next week. This is obligatory on every citizen or resident, no matter what his or her ancestry or citizenship. Some people undoubtedly will wish to fill out the form published in the advertisement in Monday's paper in order to expedite the registration when they appear before the registrars.

### VALUE OF MILITARY TRAINING

The value of military training to our young men has been mentioned in this paper several times. Gus Sievertz, in his interesting columns, speaks of the improved carriage, the smarter walk, the straightened shoulders of hundreds, perhaps thousands of young men on the streets. And this minor miracle has come about in the short time since enlistment opened in the new militia units. Of course you expect it of the men in uniform. But so great has been the change in some of the civilian soldiers whose drill is confined to time volunteered in evenings away from their work that some are scarcely recognizable. They carry to their work and to their daily tasks the new spirit that is in them. Esprit de corps has been born in a population that was in danger of getting too slack and lazy. And with it has come a new pride in being Canadians. It is certainly something that was badly needed.

### RESTRAINT OF TRADE

A combine in restraint of trade is illegal. Yet we find all kinds of combines formed for the purpose of raising prices or stabilizing prices and many of these are perfectly legitimate. In fact, the government of the country encourages them. In southern British Columbia there have been organizations, backed by the government, for the purpose of keeping up the price of fruit, of potatoes and other products. In Prince Rupert the co-operative organization for the marketing of fish and on the prairies the wheat pools all were organizations in restraint of trade, or possibly it might be more appropriate to say they were for the purpose of arranging for the orderly marketing of products and particularly to prevent the cutting of prices.

Recently Mayor Telford complained that potatoes could be imported from the United States and sold in Vancouver at a lower price than British Columbia potatoes could be sold. That was the result of one of these so-called combines designed to give the farmer a higher price for his product.

The question of legality seems to depend largely upon who it is that combines. Most of the articles we purchase in the grocery stores have set prices. So with other articles we use in our daily life. The manufacturers in consultation with other manufacturers set a price they consider high enough to give them a reasonable profit. So with the farmers and fruit growers. If the price is too high there is usually a repercussion, often a substitute being found which is just as good. Even in the carrying business the price charged is as much as the railways or steamships consider the commodity will bear.

We are all inclined to think our services are worth more than we are paid, employers and employees, producers and carriers, fishermen and farmers. Dissatisfaction makes for progress but too much dissatisfaction causes dissolution.

## SPORT CHAT

Fans who pack the Chattanooga, Tennessee, ball park to be amused by Joe Engel's latest tomfoolery dream-up think Joe Engel is a clown. Baseball's Mr. Bigs think he is one of the shrewdest business men in the game today—not alone for his brainstorm stunts that draw the fans to see even a losing team—but mostly for his ability to pick up ballplayers at a song and then sell them for huge sums. Consider this example and you get the idea: Connie Mack in 1938 gave Engel \$25,000—and a ballplayer for Dee Miles. One year later Engel sold that ballplayer, a mere throw-in-on the Miles deal, for \$38,000. His name is Bill Nicholson and the Chicago Cubs are his present proud owners.

Engel is known to fandom chiefly for his ballpark stunts. He once staged an elephant hunt, with natives and all the trimmings, in connection with a game at Chattanooga. Another time he rigged up canary cages in the stands, told the fans they could at least listen to the birdies sing if the play of his second-division club became too boring. On one occasion he gave a fully-furnished house and lot, value \$15,000. Stunts like that pull in the fans and make his ball club a paying proposition no matter its position in the Southern Association race. But that other angle, the business of acquiring and selling players is the one that commands respect among baseball magnates.

With Kiki Cuyler, his manager, to develop diamonds in the rough, Engel has set up a phenomenal sales record in the last two years. In 1938 he sold five players for a total of \$82,500. The sales: Singleton to Brooklyn, \$20,000; Millies to Baltimore, \$7,500; Miles to Athletics, \$25,000; Honeycutt to Giants, \$25,000; Hayes to Washington, \$5,000. In 1939 his sales total was \$54,000. Lanahan went to Pittsburgh for \$6,000; Nicholson to the Cubs for \$38,000; Letcham and Benjamin to the Phillies for \$10,000 and Williams to Washington for \$2,500. His latest big sale, that of Rightfielder Mike Dejan to the Cincinnati Reds for \$30,000, brings his total to \$176,000 since 1938.

Naval Battle of River Plate is Re-enacted in "For Freedom" With Will Fyffe Starring

Commemorating on the screen one of the greatest exploits in British naval history—the Battle of the River Plate—"For Freedom," a British picture featuring Will Fyffe, noted Scottish character actor playing the part of a newsreel chief, is an outstanding attraction for the first half of this week at the Capitol Theatre.
