Unrestricted Submarine Warfare Is Resorted To; Empire Trade Halt Plan

LONDON, August 17: (CP)—A military correspondent of the Daily Express today said that details were known of a German plan to attack Great Britain's trade routes by encirclement. It said that attacks upon the Faroe Islands, Iceland, Greenland and then Newfoundland were contemplated under the plan. Any German attack on Iceland would find Canadian trops ready to meet it.

Meanwhile the German government today declared a "total blockade" of Great Britain in answer to what it claimed was Great Britain's "illegal" sea warfare by refusing to permit food to reach neutral countries and civilian population and by arming merchant ships. The declaration, warning that shipping approaching the British coast would be sunk on sight, amounts to unrestricted submarine warfare. Neutral governments are asked by Germany to take action similar to the United States forbidding vessels to sail in the War Zone.

Looking back, we are inclined to say that Dunkirk was the turning point in the war. It showed the British what they could do. It gave the air force its opportunity; to distinguish itself. From that point it has grown stronger and more useful each day.

Prior to Dunkirk the British were daily influenced by fifth columnists, by the acts of traitors and by defections. True the final surrender of France came after Dunkirk but it only cleared the air. It told the British! Empire that it must fight alone if it would survive and

this it is now doing. A new spirit has come over the British people every-

where. We do not refer only to the British in England, Ireland and Scotland but in the other parts of the Empire and in other countries, particularly in the United States. The spirit of their fighting ancestors is being revived. They have their backs to the wall, fighting not only for their lives but for an ideal, the ideal of a free people, a free world, a better world. This is the spirit that wins. The Germans have evershot their mark and the period of decadence has already set in. There is now no longer need to fear for the outcome as long as we do our part in the great struggle.

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

regardless of nationality, to register. Because of the magnitude of this task the Government asks those who must register to study the questionnaire care-

fully. Every question must be answered truthfully and without evasion. It is imperative that every one 16 years of age and over register. You will make the whole task easier for yourself and the Government by registering early. Registration will last for three days only.

REGISTRATION DATES August 19th, 20th, 21st

EVERYONE CAN HELP _ To keep the cost of this registration at a minimum the Government is asking the co-operation of all public-minded citizens in the work of registration. You can help by getting in touch with your local registration officials and offering your services.

WHERE TO REGISTER

Registration offices are being set up by electoral districts in the same manner as in the last Dominion election.

Registrants are required to register in the regular polling sub-divisions of their own constituencies. But should a registrant be in some other province or district out of the regular polling subdivision on Registration Days, he or she may register at any registration office convenient, upon satisfactory explanation to the local deputy registrar.

Your Registration Certificate

To every person answering the questionnaire fully and satisfactorily a certificate of registration will be issued by the local deputy registrar. This is a small card which must be carried on the person at all times.

Penalty for Non-Registration — Failure to register will make any male or female, married or single, over the age of 16 years, liable to a fine not exceeding Two hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding Three months, or to both such fine and imprisonment, and moreover to a further penalty not exceeding Ten dollars for each day, after the day upon which he should have registered, during which he should have registered. which he shall continue to be unregistered.



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
