BATTLE IN GREECE IS DEVELOPING

Artillery Fire Throughout the Night—Salonica Appears To Be Objective

ATHENS, Oct. 30.—There was heavy artillery fire throughout the night along the Greek-Serbian frontier. The fighting appeared to be heaviest along the eastern sector but could be heard throughout the night.

Major Step To Increase Aid For Great Britain Expected In President's Announcement

ENROUTE WITH PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT TO BOSTON, October 30: (CP)—A major step to increase aid for Great Britain and her allies will probably be announced by President Franklin D. Roosevelt tonight in an address at Boston, a White House official indicated.

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, advised reporters to watch for something but gave no hints regarding the nature. He warned them, however, not to "go overboard" on releasing American "flying fortresses" to Great Britain.

Speculators thought that the United States might allow Great Britain priority on airplane contracts.

B.C. HOUSE IS OPENED

No Major Legislation Planned At Victoria Session

VICTORIA, Oct. 30: (CP)—No major legislation was predicted in the speech from the Throne at the opening yesterday of the session of the British Columbia Legislature. The speech expressed satisfaction over the appointment of the international defence commission of United States and Canada.

British Columbia revenue reached a new all time high of \$33,000,000 during the past fiscal year, it was revealed.

Petrol Ration Is Now Relaxed

Freer Use Of Automobiles Again Possible In Great Britain

LONDON, Oct. 30:—English people are again able to use their cars in going back and forth to work as extra rations of petrol are now available. This makes freer and more general use of cars possible again.

GREEN HAND NOT WANTED

World Moving At Rate Never Before Known, Declares Ambassador Kennedy

NEW YORK, Oct. 30:—The world was on the move at a rate never before known, declared Joseph P. Kennedy, United States ambassador to Great Britain, in an address last night in which he expressed himself as being solidly behind President Franklin D. Roosevelt for re-election. There was no time now to train a green hand entirely lacking experience in international affairs. He praised the rearmament policy and aid to Great Britain. It was false that the President was trying to draw the United States into the war. He was in a position to know that no commitments had been made.

NEW YORK COPPER

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—New York copper was .05c to .10c higher yesterday with December closing at 11.07c per pound.

SHIPS DO FINE JOB

Loss Of Admiralty Pays Tribute To Merchant Fleet

LONDON, Oct. 30:—Speaking before a luncheon of the English Shipping Union yesterday, Rt. Hon. A. V. Alexander, First Lord of the Admiralty, referred to the merchant fleet which had been doing a fine job.

Only the good work of the merchant marine made it possible to have this food.

When at the moment he was speaking Mr. Alexander said 2500 merchant ships were plying the high seas not counting those in ports in all parts of the world. Convoys were coming and going and new ships were being built.

There were many prominent Americans at the luncheon.

Local Chapters Helped To Buy O.D.E. Bomber

In the latest number of "Echoes," official publication of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, appears an interesting feature article in connection with the presentation of the Order of a Bolingbroke bomber, at a cost of \$100,000, to the Canadian government for war service. The Prince Rupert chapters of the Daughters of the Empire contributed \$300 to the bomber fund.

Credit Union Meeting

ALASKA IS PROCEEDING TO SEATTLE

Vessel Was Not Sufficiently Damaged To Necessitate Putting Into Prince Rupert

Reporting that the Alaska Steamship Co.'s steamer Alaska, which ran ashore Saturday night on Elliott Island, twenty miles south of here, and which was refloated at 11:15 Tuesday morning with the assistance of the Queen Charlotte Island logging tugs Saint Faith and J. R. Morgan, was proceeding to Seattle under her own power without coming into Prince Rupert.

Capt. McKay stated that the Alaska came off the beach with little difficulty about an hour before the high tide yesterday. The St. Faith and J. R. Morgan as well as the United States coastguard vessel had lines on her stern. After about an hour of hard pulling as the tide rose, the Alaska came free and then proceeded a distance of two or three miles to Kennedy Island across Arthur Passage from the scene of the stranding, there to pick up lifeboats which had been taken there by the coastguard cutter Cyane pending refloating. The Alaska was listing considerably to port when she first came off but this was soon adjusted.

At 12:43 noon Capt. O. C. Anderson of the Alaska notified the St. Faith and J. R. Morgan that she would not require their services further. They then proceeded to Prince Rupert to take on fuel and stores before returning to their towing work on the Queen Charlotte Islands. Both the St. Faith and the J. R. Morgan, Capt. Salverson, had been called across from the Queen Charlotte Islands to assist in the refloating and salvage of the Alaska.

Capt. McKay stated that the Alaska appeared to be in quite seaworthy condition after refloating and in no danger. It had been previously reported that she had a five foot hole in her bow near the forefoot and that her stern and forepeak appeared shattered. She was leaking slightly and there was water in No. 1 hold.

The steamer Aleutian, a sister ship of the Alaska, was due alongside the Alaska at 1:45 yesterday afternoon and it was decided, after the masters of the two vessels had conferred, that the Alaska should proceed to Seattle and not put into Prince Rupert.

BOMBS NOW BEING MADE

Plant Being Established In Quebec Will Turn Them Out 100,000 Per Year

OTTAWA, Oct. 30:—In a plant now under construction in Quebec and which it is expected will be in production in February, arrangements are being made for the manufacture of 100,000 aerial bombs of all sizes and types annually. Canada is also working on the production of depth charges for naval use. Trench mortar bombs and grenades will also be made.

POUND STERLING

NEW YORK, Oct. 30:—The British pound sterling was trading at \$4.03 1/2 on the New York foreign exchange market yesterday.

ITALIAN CRUISER SUNK

LONDON—The Italian heavy cruiser San Giorgio is reported to have been sunk but there is no confirmation. A violent naval battle off Corfu is also reported.

AIR BLOW IS COSTLY TO NAZIS

Lost Twenty-Eight Planes Yesterday and Two During Last Night In Attack Upon England

Berlin Is Hit Again

LONDON, Oct. 30: (CP)—Through a cold mist which covered the planes with ice, Royal Air Force fighters last night bombed Berlin and dropped high explosive and incendiary bombs on numerous industrial plants and military objectives in Germany and German-occupied territory. Fires were started in oil plants and shipyards. Other planes raided railway communications, airdromes, etc. Two British planes were lost.

FEW LOST AFTER ALL

LONDON, Oct. 30: (CP)—The renewal of mass daylight attack technique on England yesterday proved costly for the Nazis who lost twenty-eight bombers and fighters while another two were brought down during the night. Seven British planes were lost but four pilots were saved. The bag of enemy planes was one of the largest in weeks. The attack was concentrated upon London and Portsmouth, the former city having four alarms during the day and the latter two.

Anti-aircraft barrage kept the enemy, such as got through, high above London. Liverpool, southwest England and Wales were also visited by the enemy.

The spectacular feature of the day was a battle at a height of six miles over Kent in which a Scottish auxiliary squadron in the quick time of ten minutes brought down no less than eight Nazi planes. First the Spitfires dropped four of the enemy planes on land and then the German machines sped away, the remaining four being shot down over the sea.

Thousands of spectators saw an enemy plane being shot down from great altitude over Hyde Park. The attack on Portsmouth proved unsuccessful as far as military objectives were concerned.

After the fifty-third consecutive night assault during which a number of long breathing spells were enjoyed by London and other targets while southeast England took the brunt of the assaults, the enemy renewed the daylight attack on London today but it was lighter than usual. The German raiders opened the attacks shortly before noon today with assaults on London and the industrial Midlands.

FRENCH SHIP SUNK

OTTAWA—The former French freighter St. Malo has been sunk by enemy action while flying the Canadian flag, and 28 of her crew, most of whom were Canadians, are missing, the Transport Department announced this afternoon.

WIPE OUT BASES

BERLIN—A Berlin statement says that wherever British bases and hide-outs are found they must be extirpated. This is believed to refer to Turkey.

Railway Head Pleased At Use Being Made of Local Facilities and Confidence Shown in Ability of Yard To Carry Out War Work

W. R. Devenish, general manager of western lines of Canadian National Railways with headquarters in Winnipeg, announced today, on his arrival from Vancouver in the course of a western inspection tour, that notification had been received of the awarding of the contract to the Prince Rupert dry dock for the construction of two additional minesweepers similar to the pair which are now being built at the local yard.

The work on the two additional war vessels will commence as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made including the delivery of material. One of the two ships now being built has already been launched while the other is still on the stocks.

Mr. Devenish expressed gratification that advantage was being taken of the facilities at Prince Rupert to give service in this way to the British and Canadian governments. It also, he observed, indicated confidence in the character of the local work and was a recognition of the capabilities of the local shipbuilding staff. The new contract will mean continuation for some considerable time on expanded basis at the local yard.

Speaking of general conditions, Mr. Devenish stated that, although there was no movement of grain this fall, the railways were keeping busy on other tonnage taking the place of grain. Pacific Coast lumber was moving across the continent by rail on a generous scale.

Mr. Devenish expressed himself as being grieved at the loss of two employees of the company in the persons of J. C. Carpenter, engineer, and S. J. Mayer, fireman, in the recent unfortunate accident at Lorne Creek. They were both a fine type of company employee.

Accompanying Mrs. Devenish on his tour are W. T. Moodie of Vancouver, general superintendent for British Columbia; F. S. Rose, regional auditor, Winnipeg; Sam Morrison, district engineer, Vancouver, and C. J. Quantic, superintendent of motive power and car equipment, Vancouver.

DISEASE TO BE FEARED

Will Be Worse Menace Than Air Raids, Declares Minister Of Health

LONDON, Oct. 30:—Rt. Hon. Malcolm MacDonald, minister of health, said yesterday that more is to be feared this winter from disease in bomb shelters than from air raids. Every precaution is being taken against such diseases as influenza, diphtheria and other fevers. Parents are being urged to send their children away from the city.

Stock Market Tone Stronger

Gains Shown Throughout List In Yesterday's Trading

NEW YORK, Oct. 30:—Stock transactions on the New York Exchange yesterday totalled 590,000 shares. The price trend was upward all through the list. The industrial average at closing was 132.19, up .42; rails, 28.52, up .06, and utilities, 22.49, up .16.

FRANCE IS CARVED UP

Terms Of German Dictated Peace Agreement Are Reported

LONDON, Oct. 30:—Terms of the Franco-German peace agreement negotiated between Chancellor Adolf Hitler and Premier Henri Petain are reliably reported to be as follows:

Germany to have Alsace Lorraine. Italy to have Tunis and Algeria. The Axis to have the use of the French fleet and bases. Japan to get French Indo China. Spain to get Morocco. Other colonial possessions to be under joint control of Germany, Italy and France. About all France gets out of it is the right to move the government back to Paris.

FEW LOST AFTER ALL

Latest Count Shows Six Lost and Thirty-Nine Missing in Sinking Of Empress of Britain

LONDON, Oct. 30: (CP)—The latest accounting following the sinking of the steamer Empress of Britain shows six known dead and nineteen crew members as well as twenty others missing out of the 650 who were on board when the vessel was attacked by German bombers, subsequently blowing up and foundering while under tow.

Earlier in the week the British Admiralty had confirmed the sinking of the Canadian Pacific liner which was being used as a transport vessel. She went down after being set afire by the German air attack off the coast of Ireland.

Basil Rathbone In Air Force

Noted Actor Enlists In Canadian Flying Service—His Son Also In It

TORONTO, Oct. 30: (CP)—It was stated here yesterday that Basil Rathbone, noted moving picture actor, has applied and been accepted for enlistment in the signalling section of the Royal Canadian Air Force. His son is already in training for a pilot with the Royal Canadian Air Force.

CHICAGO WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 30:—Chicago wheat futures were 3/4c to 1 1/2c lower yesterday, December closing at 83 3/4c.
