War News

GERMANY HARD HIT

LONDON-Britain's hard hitting Royal Air Force raiders during a week-end of persistent attacks on German objectives brought back word of important Nazi troop and equipment concentrations just across the English Channel. R.A.F. pilots told of machine-gunning troops at Abbeville, bombing lorry conveys, an armoured train and barges near Graveline and Dunkerque. The air ministry said naval buildings at Kiel were set afire, airdrome; were pounded heavily and synthetic oil plants were hit. Oil tanks at Rotterdam and airdromes occupied by Germany in Holland and France were attacked. Three British planes were lost in widespread operations. It is considered that conditions-tidal and other-will be favorable this week for Germany's attempt to invade England.

ITALIANS HIT AT SARDINIA

ROME-Planes of the fleet air arm heavily bombed the Italian airdrome at Vagiara in Sardinia. Direct hits were scored on four hangars, two of which were set afire, four planes on the ground were destroyed and three Italian planes were shot down. One British plane is missing.

NAZI SUB SUNK

LONDON-Depth charges catapulted by warships convoying the liners carrying Canadian troops to the United Kingdom accounted for at least one and perhaps two enemy submarines, it was disclosed by an o ficer of the naval escort. The submarines were detected in the vicinity of the big convoy in which travelled the largest contingent of Canadian troops to land in England to date on the last night out. A couple of warships immediacly went into action. Few aboard were aware of the nearness of the danger and drama of the chase.

LONDON-Interest being shown by Germany in Dakar, the Atlantic port in French West Africa, is regarded as extremely serious by responsible British sources. At the same time British circles deny reports current abroad that British troops have landed at Madagascar and the Cameroons, French African Colonies. German control of Dakar would endanger French and British territory in Africa.

PERSHING URGES HELP

NEW YORK-General John J. Pershing, in a radio broadcast last night, urged immediate help by the United States for Great Britain by sending fifty destroyers. If this was not done United States would be "failing in its duty." By delaying it until tomorrow, it might be forever too late to keep the war from American shores.

ARMED TRAWLER LOST

LONDON-The Admiralty announces the loss of the armed trawler Cape Finisterre by enemy air attack. However, three planes were brought down before the trawler was sunk.

SUNK OFF GIBRALTAR

CADIZ, Spain-An unidentified British steamer has been sunk off Gibraltar by a German submarine. The crew of 35 was landed here.

HOOD LEADS FLEET

MADRID-Led by H.M.S. Hood, which the Italians have been claiming was badly damaged in action, a British battle fleet sailed from Gibraltar yesterday.

HEAVY GERMAN AIR LOSSES

LONDON-Since the start of the war it is estimated that German air losses have totalled 2661 planes and 10,000 men. For the same period British losses have been 643 planes and 1800 lives.

WEEKEND

Little Change in General Situation-R.A.F. Active-Heavy Italian Losses

There is no change in the war situation generally. The Germans have resumed air raiding of the British Isles on a rather extensive scale and met with strong anti-aircraft fire and resistance from fighter planes. Many of the enemy bombs drop ped in open places and little damage and few casualties were indicated in early reports. Three German planes were brought down off the southeast coast of

England today. The Royal Air Force was active with raids on military objectives in Germany, France, Belgium and Holland, Important enemy bases were again effectively bombed. Kiel Canal naval base was one of the objectives successfully attacked.

In Italian Africa British aircraft were also busy. Of four hangars attacked two at least were burned. Three Italian planes were brought down and one British failed to return to its base.

Italian naval authorities admitted the loss of another submarine due to British naval operations. Since they entered the war June 10, the Italians have lost sixteen submarines, one cruiser and three destroyers.

FORTIFYING OF ALASKA

Four Million Dollars To Be Spent On Kodiak And Unalaska Air Bases

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 5: (CP)—The United States Navy has taken steps to improve Alaskan defences opposite Russian territory by awarding \$4,000,000 contracts for work at naval air stations on Kodiak and Unalaska Islands.

This action comes less than two weeks after coastguard vessels reported a Russian air base being defeloped on Soviet-owned Big Diomede Island.

Fire Alarms Last Month

Numbered Only Three, Bringing Total For Present Year Up To 24-No Serious Damage

Fire alarms in Prince Rupert during the month of July numberled only three. Fire damage in the ,city during the month was inconsequential. One of the fire alarms, on July 2, was on account of burning brush in the 300-block, Eighth Avenue West, another a shingle fire at the Sunrise Grocery, Fulton Street, July 11 and the third an engine backfire on the fish boat Venus at Cow Bay July 15. So far this year there have been twenty-four alarms as compared with twenty in the same period of last year.



JAPANESE SITUATION

The attitude of Japan toward the British Empire, seems to indicate that there may possibly be trouble between the two countries. If anything should happen, the attitude of the Japanese in this country will have to be very clearly defined. Many of them have taken the oath of allegiance to this country but more than that is necessary. They will have to show very clearly what side they are on. There can be no such thing as straddling the fence.

For a number of years the Japanese residents of this lumbia, acting on my behalf. part of the country and those coming here for the fishing season only have been making a much better living than; they could possibly have made in Japan. If they once show it that they are not really Canadians this course of living! will be cut off for them for all time. They will never again: be trusted.

One objection taken to Japanese in the past has been that they never really become Canadians. They remain Japanese in customs. This is not true in every case. There are a number of local Japanese who have adapted themselves to local conditions and may well be looked upon as British subjects. Of this all may be sure—every Japanese, will be more or less under suspicion and will have to indicate very clearly where he stands.

WATCH OUT GERMANY

Germany may have to watch out pretty soon to try to stop the British invading that country and ousting Hitle: The British aviators are becoming very aggressive and arc destroying the usefulness of seaports, canals, munition and airplane factories, airdromes and other military ob jectives. The next step may be to plan an invasion of the country with all the adjuncts such as parachute troops Once the ports are destroyed, the railways and waterways blocked, the airdromes razed and the oil dumps burned up, it would not be difficult to complete the job of con quering the enemy.






