Canadian Destroyer Is Lost in Collision; Rescued

Men Are Listed as Victims of Latest Naval Disaster—Bud Ponder and William Corbin Perish at Sea

OTTAWA, October 28: (CP)—Loss of the Canadian destroyer Margaree, with 140 officers and men including commander J. W. Roy, was announced by naval service headquarters last night. The flotilla leader was recently ordered from Great Britain to replace the sunken Fraser...

Another victim was acting Petty Officer William H. Corbin, a native of Prince Rupert who had been in the navy for eleven years.

Jack Henry Burnett of Victoria, brother of Richard M. Burnett of Prince Rupert, was another of the victims.

Twenty-five of the casualties were from Vancouver Island, mostly Victoria.

Sub-Lieutenant Timbrell of North Vancouver, a veteran of Narvik, who escaped from the Fraser, was again a survivor from Margaree.

The Margaree was formerly H. M. S. Diana of the Royal Navy. Launched in 1932 she was transferred to the Canadian Navy last year. Her armament included four 4.7" guns and eight torpedo tubes.

GERMANS ENTERING SPAIN BERLIN—Unconfirmed rumors said today that German troops have already crossed or are about to cross the Pyrenees into Spain presumably for an attack on Gibraltar.

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ITALO-GREEK WAR

King George Announces Country Compelled To Take Up Arms Against Aggressor

Is Turkey Coming In?

BELGRADE, Oct. 28: (CP) — Diplomatic circles heard unconfirmed reports today that Turkey had declared war on Italy following Italian invasion of Greece but the Turkish legation said it had no knowledge of such action.

Greeks Resisting Stubbornly; Drive 8 Miles Into Albania

LONDON, October 28: (CP)—Stubborn Greek resistance against Italy is reported by neutral military sources in Belgrade today. Reuters, in a dispatch to London from Athens, said that Greek troops had broken through Italian positions at one place and driven eight miles into Albania.

FASCIST ULTIMATUM DEMANDING TERRITORIAL CONCESSIONS AND RIGHT TO MOVE TROOPS REJECTED—EARLY SPREAD OF CONFLICT SEEN

ATHENS, October 28: (CP)—King George II. announced today that Greece had been "compelled to go to war against an Italy coveting Greece's independence."

Italy and Greece have gone to war following rejection by Greece of an Italian ultimatum for territorial concessions and the privilege of moving troops through Greece.

A communique, issued after the Italians had attacked by land and air, said that Premier John Metaxas was in communication with Turkey.

Italian motorized units thrust across the mountainous Greek-Italian frontier at 5:30 a.m. (7:30 p.m. Sunday) half an hour before the expiration of the Italian ultimatum which was obviously part of the build-up to justify the attack.

Early this afternoon air raid alarms screamed in Athens for the third time today and anti-aircraft fire drove away four planes flying over the city at that time.

Italian planes bombed Corinth and Tatoi airdromes, twelve miles from Athens, and the port of Patras.

At Belgrade it was reported that ten divisions of perhaps 200,000 Italian troops were reported driving into Greece along the Albanian frontier in an attack timed with Italian naval blows at the island of Corfu.

UNLIMITED BRITISH SUPPORT

As Greece was fighting today with her army against invading Italian forces it was announced officially that Great Britain was sending "unlimited support."

Rome claimed at the week-end that Greeks crossed Albanian frontier and attacked an Italian outpost. The report was officially denied by Greece.

Fears are held that the invasion of Greece may lead to further warfare in the Balkans with a possible Axis attempt to move through Turkey towards the Iran oil country and Suez to synchronize with resumption of the war in Egypt.

AIR FORCE SPREADING ATTACK

LONDON—A successful air raid by a strong force of Royal Air Force bombers on Skoda armament works at Pilsen in Czechoslovakia last night is reported by the Air Ministry.

Scion Of Cecil Rejoins Cabinet

Resigned as Protest Against Appeasement Policy in 1938

LONDON, Oct. 28: (CP)—Viscount Craaborn became liaison man between Great Britain and the Dominions in the Churchill cabinet reconstruction that brought him to the government benches he left in 1938 as a protest against the Chamberlain appeasement policy.

Heir to the fourth Marquis of Salisbury and member of the politically glamorous Cecil family, the slender 47-year-old successor to Viscount Caldecote as Dominions secretary has lived up to the family traditions during his 11 years in the House of Commons as Conservative member for South Dorset.

Fuehrer Sees Il Duce Today

FLORENCE, Italy, Oct. 28: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler and Premier Benito Mussolini conferred for nearly three hours today in the first session of a meeting staged as Italy launched Greece.

London Youth Helped Nazis

Boy Admits Setting Fires To Guide German Raiding Planes

LONDON, Oct. 28:—A sixteen year old boy has been convicted in a London police court under defence of the realm laws. He admitted that he was a Hitler sympathizer and that he had set buildings on fire to guide German bombing planes.

Big Liner Strands Near Rupert

Steamer Alaska Piles Up On Elliott Island South Of Here; North Coast Is Rescue Ship

Two Hundred and Seventy-Eight Passengers Took to Lifeboats at Midnight—Many Clad Only in Night Attire

Prince Rupert salvage operators are speculating on the possibility of the 4658-ton million dollar steamer Alaska being refloated on the high tides Thursday or Friday from Elliott Island, 20 miles south of here, where she crashed ashore Saturday night while southbound from Seward to Seattle.

Fearless and Bentinck left Prince Rupert for the scene of the wreck at 3 o'clock Sunday morning. Capt. Reg Green is in charge of the salvage outfit with a crew of 15 men. The Fearless returned to Prince Rupert Sunday afternoon to take out a dredge and compressors. She left again Sunday night.

few hundred feet to the east nothing would have happened. It was a murky night, very dark. The vessel was evidently travelling full speed of sixteen knots or so when she ran ashore.

The first work of salvage will consist of blasting of rocks in the effort to give the vessel more water. The expectation is that larger salvage vessels will be coming north from Vancouver.

The United States coastguard cutter Cyane was at the scene of the wreck for a time yesterday morning.

Two hundred and seventy-eight passengers of the Alaska were brought to Prince Rupert yesterday morning from Elliott Island and awaited the arrival at Prince Rupert at 4 a.m. today from Seattle of the steamer Yukon, a sister ship of the Alaska, which took them to Ketchikan where it was expected they would embark on the Aleutian in continuation of the interrupted voyage to Seattle.

EMPRESS IS LOST

British Confirmation or Destruction of Big Canadian Pacific Liner

LONDON, Oct. 28: (CP)—The British Admiralty today officially announced the loss of the 42,348 ton Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain. A communique said that the liner had been lost as a result of enemy aerial attack which caused a fire. Salvage operations were commenced immediately but, while in tow, the Empress blew up and sank.

Some 598 of the total of 643 persons on board have already been landed safely. Included in the number were military families and a small number of military personnel.

Women and children were among the passengers who got into the lifeboats without panic. They were picked up by British warships hours later.

Some lifeboats caught fire from incendiary bombs before they could be launched.

The Empress liner was bombed 150 miles off Ireland.

The raider disappeared and then returned to drop more bombs including incendiaries. Survivors said that the raiders also machine-gunned the ship.

There is no confirmation of a report that the Empress was torpedoed while under tow and that this was the actual cause of sinking.

Bulletins

NO BODIES FOUND
The engine of the passenger train which a week ago Saturday night plunged through an approach to Lorne Creek bridge has now been set right up and is ready to be lifted to the main track level, local railway offices were advised today. Satchels of Engineer J. C. Carpenter and Fireman S. J. Mayer have been found but there is no sign of their bodies and there is now reason to believe that they may not be in the engine at all. Possibly, they were swept away.

GERMANS RECAPTURED
CALGARY—Two German aliens were recaptured without a struggle last night four days after escaping from an enemy internment camp.

FREEZE GREEK ASSETS
WASHINGTON—The Department of State is expected to immediately announce invocation of neutrality laws against Greece as a belligerent nation. Greek assets in United States will be frozen to prevent them possibly falling into Italian hands. There are virtually no Americans now in Greece.

LAVAL FOREIGN MINISTER
VICHY, France—Vice-Premier Pierre Laval was named foreign minister of the Vichy regime today and former Foreign Minister Paul Baudoin was named Secretary of State. This is taken as another indication of the Vichy government's complete surrender to Germany, confirming that the impotent Marshal Henri Philippe Petain is head of the government in name only.

NEW AUSTRALIAN GOVT
CANBERRA—The new national government has been formed for Australia from among members of the United Australian and Country Parties. Premier Menzies also holds portfolios of information and defence co-ordination. Harold Holt is called out of the army to become minister of labor and national defence. The veteran William Hughes is attorney general and minister of the navy. Sir Earl Page, head of the Country Party, who broke with Menzies a year or so ago, returns to the coalition government as minister of commerce.

DEMOUNCES DICTATORS
WASHINGTON—Naming Germany, Italy and Japan, Secretary of State Cordell Hull gave a stinging denunciation of dictatorships. They would, he said, reduce mankind to a master-slave condition maintained by brute force. They would use deceit, fraud and guile in subjugating the world. It was the intention of the United States to continue aid to the full to nations which were defending themselves from barbarous attack.

JAPANESE WITHDRAWING
HONG KONG—The Japanese Army announced today that it was withdrawing from Nanning, strategic communications centre in Kwansi Province, which had been held for nearly a year. The announcement said that further occupation had become "meaningless" on account of Japanese entry into Indo-China. Chinese admit that bridges on the Burma road were destroyed by Japanese air attack but that repairs were speedily carried out and traffic over the road is being maintained.

United Church Guest Speaker

The special speaker at the evening service of the First United Church yesterday was Alfred Carlson of the extension department of the University of British Columbia who is also a probationer for the ministry. Mr. Carlson spoke of the need for the church to concern itself with the economic and political life of the people. Christ had made the life of the people His chief interest and the church would do well to follow in His footsteps. There had been a tendency for the church to confine its interests to a narrow outlook of the individual. The answer to many economic and political troubles was the Christian way of life exemplified in part by the co-operative movement. Its success in the east among the Nova Scotia fishermen was but a hint of what it could achieve. The Scandinavian countries had done well but Canada had to go a long way yet. The church had a problem to solve. Christian brotherhood was the solution. Mrs. H. T. Lock sang Hamblen's "Beside Still Waters" very sympathetically and effectively.

The pastor, Rev. J. C. Jackson, spoke at the morning service when the singing was led by the Junior Choir. This organization is steadily increasing in numbers and leads the hymn singing with success. In the absence of the regular organist through indisposition, H. T. Lock presided at the organ. Mr. Jackson continued his review of the proceedings at the recent annual council of the United Church in his address and the marked progress of the church was again emphasized as well as its increasing responsibility.

RAIDS NOT SO HEAVY

LONDON—German planes were reported over west England, the Midlands, the east coast and south Wales today after a series of widespread night raids. Overnight attacks on London were "much less" severe than the previous night, the government said, but the Merseyside section of Liverpool and a Midlands town were reported the hardest hit although casualties were not numerous.

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
