# Spread of Finnish War Now Looms

## MANY ARE ARRESTED IN PRAGUE

Thousands of Czechs Are Taken Into Custody On Espionage Charges

PRAGUE, Jan. 3: (CP)—Arrests of nearly one thousand former Czechoslovak army officers, two journalists and several members of the Skoda munitions works central office are disclosed. Authorities said that the arrests had been made on suspicion of having given Poland information on the movement of German troops during the invasion. Skoda employees are suspected of stealing plans for munitions manufacture.

## MORE RAIN IN TURKEY

Floods in Earthquake Zone Become Even Worse With 1200 Persons Losing Lives

FURTHER QUAKES  
ANKHARA—A new earthquake is reported to have levelled ten villages in the Yozgad area, adding to Turkey's earthquake damage of last week as the River Euphrates broke its banks, spreading terror in that region of southern Anatolia. There is panic in the Yozgad area owing to the shocks. Hundreds of buildings have collapsed. The death toll, however, is expected to be slight. The Euphrates floods are expected to increase the estimated dead to 46,200 in the combined disasters.

ANKHARA, Turkey, Jan. 3: (CP)—Further torrential rains Monday caused new havoc in earthquake-stricken Turkey, swelling flood waters which are believed to have caused at least 1200 deaths in addition to earthquake casualties. Meantime latest estimates from the Anatolia earthquake disaster of last week place the dead at 45,000, the injured at 100,000 and the homeless at 500,000.

## CANADIANS DECORATED

Distinguished Flying Crosses For Pair In Recognition of Valor In War Action

LONDON, Jan. 3: (CP)—The Air Ministry announces that the Distinguished Flying Cross has been awarded to two Canadian fliers in recognition of valorous services in aerial warfare. One is Squadron Leader John Griffiths of Welland, Ontario, and the other Pilot Officer Selby Henderson of Winnipeg. Both participated in daring action against the enemy.

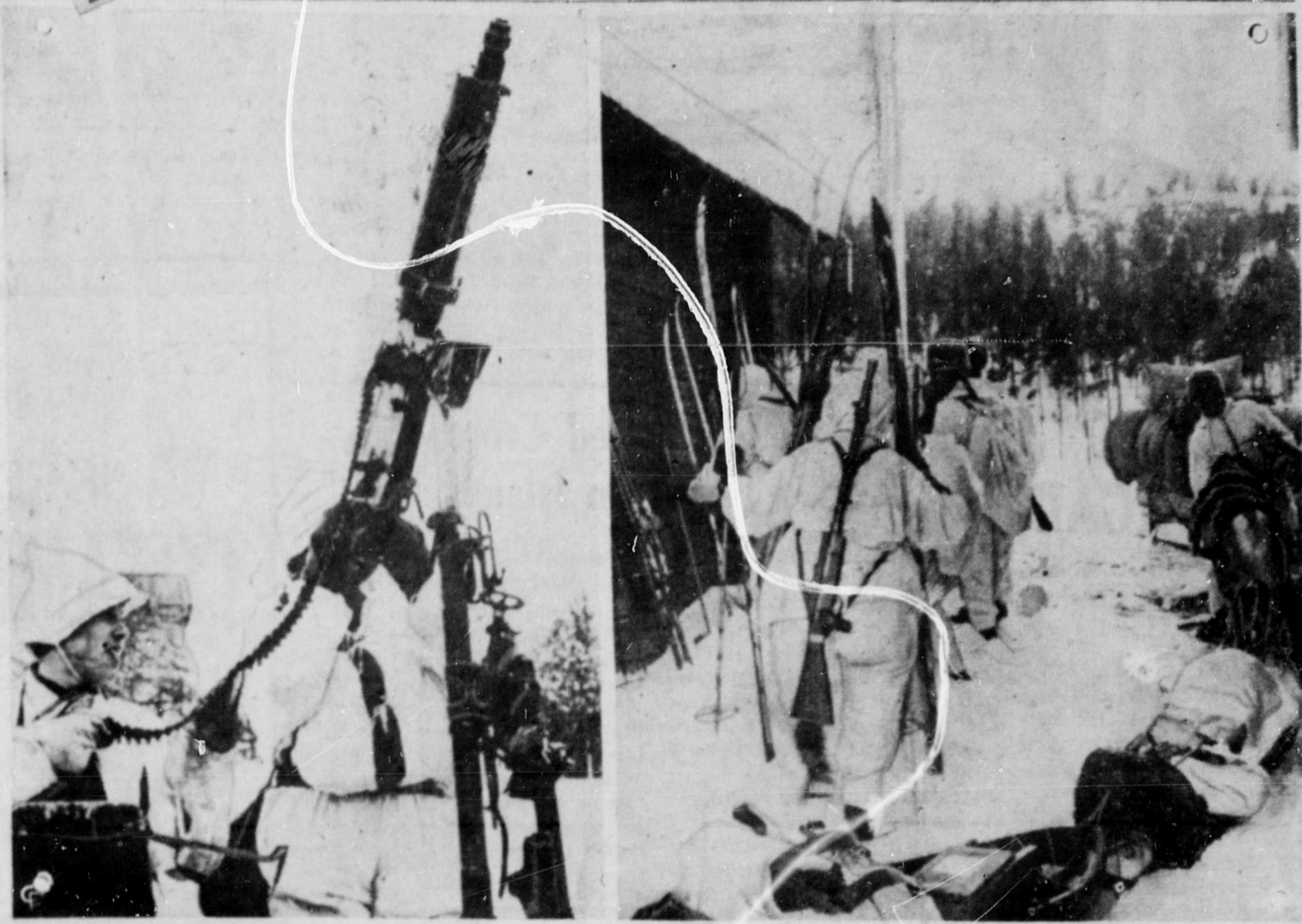
## NAVAL MEN PROMOTED

Lieut. Commander H. W. S. Soulsby, At Present Here, Becomes Commander

OTTAWA, Jan. 3: (CP)—Lieut. Commander W. B. L. Holmes of H. M. S. Restigouche has been promoted to the rank of commander and has been placed in charge of naval instruction at the Royal Military College at Kingston, it is announced.

Lieut. Commander H. W. S. Soulsby of the mine-sweeper Comox, based at Esquimalt and at present at Prince Rupert, has also been promoted to the rank of Commander.

## Bulletins

**PATTULLO GOING EAST**  
VICTORIA—Premier T. D. Pattullo plans to leave next Monday for Ottawa. He will discuss land settlement with federal authorities and will also be in the Dominion capital at the time of a meeting on January 11 of both Canadian and American sections of the Alaska Highway Commission.

**BEAUTY RETURNS**  
FOLKESTONE, Eng.—Soldiers are today guarding the return of Unity Valkyrie Freeman-Mitford, Lord Redesdale's daughter, whose Nordic beauty is said to have charmed Hitler. Unity became ill in Munich before the outbreak of war. The London Evening News asserted she is to be operated on for a gunshot wound in the throat. Other reports say Hitler personally arranged the return of the girl.

**UN-AMERICAN REPORT**  
WASHINGTON—The Congressional un-American activities committee delivered a fifteen hundred word report on a two-year investigation today. The report declared that not more than a million Americans were seriously affected by subversive activities which were now declining because of the international situation.

## SMALLER U-BOATS

Important Change in German Naval Policy is Reported

BERLIN, Jan. 3: (CP)—Havas News Agency reports that Germany is abandoning the building of large submarines and is now building a fleet of small U-boats of from 150 to 200 tons. It will be possible to turn the small undersea craft out much more quickly but they will have the disadvantage of being able to stay at sea no longer than five days at a time.

## MINNEAPOLIS APARTMENT HOUSE FIRE FATAL FOR EIGHTEEN EARLY TODAY

Holocaust in Prairie Metropolis This Morning—Caused By Boiler Explosion—Flames Appeared Simultaneously in Three Places

MINNEAPOLIS, January 3: (CP)—At least eighteen persons were killed when an early morning fire ravaged the Marlborough Apartment Hotel here today. Morgue-keeper John Anderson said that four hours after the fire seventeen bodies were in his morgue and there was at least one more in hospital. Only a few of the victims were identified.

## Relations Strained

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 3: (CP)—Diplomatic strain between Soviet Russia and Estonia is reported here. Estonia, it is said, is reluctant to be drawn into war against Finland, her neighbor across the Baltic Sea.

## NORWAY HAS LOST MOST

Twenty-Four Ships Have Been Sunk in War at Sea With Loss of 99 Lives

OSLO, Jan. 3: (CP)—Norway is believed to be the heaviest loser of the neutral nations from the war at sea. She has lost twenty-four ships since the war began and 99 of her sailors have been drowned or killed. Loss of the Norwegian freighter Lappen, 500 tons, on Christmas Day has been disclosed. She is believed to have been the victim of sabotage. A 1900-ton Swedish ship was also lost during the last few days, her crew of nineteen being rescued.

## War News

### U-BOAT ATTACKS SWEDES

NEW YORK—Mackay radio has picked up an "S.O.S." message from the Swedish steamship Kiruna saying that she had "been fired upon by a U-boat, sinking slowly and require assistance." She gave her position as about five hundred miles north of the Azores. Meantime another Swedish ship, Svarton, 2475 tons, is reported torpedoed by a submarine off the northeast coast of Scotland with twenty of the crew missing.

### ITALY WATCHING

ROME—Italy is watching carefully any move on the part of either Russia or Germany to move into the Balkans. Such a movement would possibly bring Italy into the conflict.

### NAZIS DRIVEN OFF

PARIS—There was anti-aircraft fire in Paris last night as Nazis planes were reported attempting to reach the French capital. However, they were driven off.

### TACOMA TAKEN OVER

MONTEVIDEO—The German freighter Tacoma, which sailed a few miles down the River Plate from here on New Year's Day after having been given an ultimatum to leave or submit to internment, has had her Nazi battle flag taken down and a Uruguayan guard crew has taken charge of the vessel. She must remain here for the duration of the war.

### ACHILLES AT BUENOS AIRES

MONTEVIDEO—The British cruiser Ajax, flagship of Rear Admiral Sir Henry Harwood, entered Montevideo today under special permission from Uruguay for a 48-hour visit. The Achilles has entered Buenos Aires for a similar stay for refuelling and provisioning.

## Germany Is Talking Of Jumping In Actively On The Side of Russia

Suggests That Action of France and Great Britain May Spread Conflict—Norway and Sweden May Also Pile In

BERLIN, January 3: (CP)—The Russo-Finnish war gives evidence of spreading to other nations. Authoritative Nazis said today that Germany would be forced to take an active part in the war if France sends Alpine troops to Finland's aid. They declared that this was a military matter but did not say what form the assistance would take. Landing of French or British troops, it is argued here, would mean that the Allies are establishing a foothold in Finland, "thus spreading the war."

## FINNS KILL MORE REDS

Another Russian Division is Threatened With Destruction

## Huge Red Losses

Red Efforts To Cross Finland's Waistline Definitely Halted

LAKE KIANTI, Jan. 3: (CP)—Army lumberjacks on skis are pursuing hungry and freezing remnants of a scattered Soviet division into a wilderness of forest and snow near the central Finnish-Russian border following the battle near Lake Kianti which the Finns won. Thousands of Russians were left dead following the greatest single battle of the war.

### COPENHAGEN, Jan. 3: (CP)—

Finnish ski patrols in the central Salla sector were reported yesterday to be threatening another Russian division with encirclement. It was believed that another major engagement was shaping up, similar to the virtual destruction of the 163rd. Red Division in an engagement near Suomusalmi on Sunday. A Russian division approximates 16,000 men. Seven red divisions have been concentrated on Karelian Isthmus in an endeavour to break a deadlock there.

Irked by the continuous setbacks, Russia is now reported to have massed about five hundred thousand men as the spearhead for a major offensive against the Finnish Mannerheim Line of the Karelian Isthmus. Fresh troops are said by the Finns to be ready for a tremendous push against the Finnish fortifications which have been described by the Russians as comparable to the German Siegfried Line.

There only remains in Finland today the trapped 176th Division, 17,000 men at full strength, and about 2,000 stragglers who fled after the battle of December 29 and 30.

### Russians Repulsed

HELSINGFORS, Jan. 3:—The Finnish high command announced today that a Russian infantry attack on the Karelian Isthmus was repulsed "with heavy losses."

## Western Front Is More Active

Artillery, Patrols and Aircraft Were Busy Today

PARIS, Jan. 3: (CP)—There was renewed artillery activity by both sides on the Western Front today. There was also patrol and aerial activity.

## SUBMARINE WAS SEEN

But No Attack Was Made on First Canadian Division Transport

LONDON, Jan. 3: (CP)—During the transport of the second contingent of the First Canadian Division of troops for overseas service from Canada to England, a submarine was sighted, it was disclosed yesterday, but there was no attack. A destroyer in the convoy, on sighting the submarine, dropped a depth charge but there was no indication whether or not it took effect on the U-boat.

## CABINET SHUFFLE

Changes Expected in French War Administration—Daladier Meets Gamelin

PARIS, Jan. 3: (CP)—Premier Edouard Daladier of France conferred yesterday with General Maurice Gamelin, commander-in-chief of the Allied forces. In French political circles the possibility of a cabinet shuffle is being discussed. A major debate in the Chamber of Deputies next week is expected.

## EIRE HAS ROUND UP

Active Steps Against I.R.A. Expected to Follow Special Session of Dail Today

DUBLIN, Jan. 3: (CP)—A mass round-up of the outlawed Irish Republican Army is expected to follow a special session of the Dail which opened today for the express purpose of considering the taking of measures to repress the organization whose activities in the way of demonstrations were taken to guard against disorders during the session of the Dail.

Seven alleged members of the Irish Republican Army were arrested yesterday in connection with the theft of munitions from a magazine in Phoenix Park just before Christmas. A considerable quantity of the stolen arms and ammunition has by now been recovered.

### EDITORIAL

#### THE REAL FOE

A correspondent yesterday said that, judging from the newspapers, the real foe of this country was Russia. That too seems to be the general opinion of the man on the street. The average person seems to think that the war will not be over until Russia is driven back out of Poland, Finland, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania. Evidently Russia set out to overrun all Northern Europe or at any rate all those parts not taken by Germany. The League of Nations recognized this and condemned the Soviets and called on all member nations to help in preventing the conquering of Finland.

We are only voicing what we believe to be popular opinion in this part of Canada when we say that Russia is today looked upon as the chief foe to civilization and as such must be held back from taking an unfair advantage of the present situation to extend her territory. It is true that Germany must be brought to her senses through the destruction of Hitlerism but it is also true that Russia must be dealt with too. That is why people from many countries are lending aid to the Finns. However, we are not at war with Russia and may not be at all. The British Empire may not be needed, judging from the showing made by the Stalinites so far against the little group of Finns.

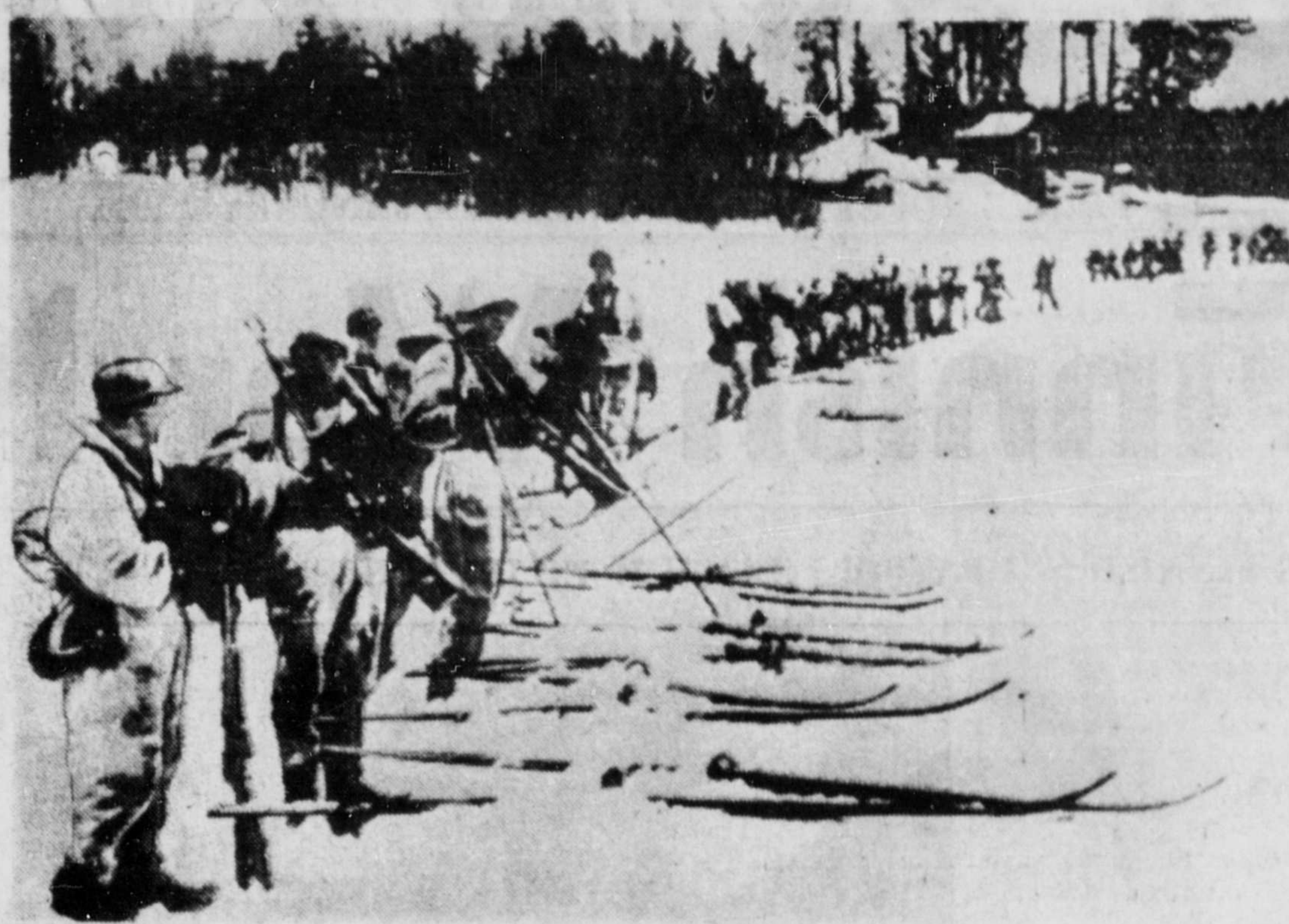
#### THE BUBBLE BURSTS

As long as Joseph Stalin sat in the Kremlin and ordered the killing of generals or any leaders who seemed to develop strength in the country, while at the same time oppressing his people and trying to interfere in the domestic affairs of his neighbors, even as far away as Canada, he was a great man and Russia was the greatest country in the world, according to many thousands of more or less honest folk in every country. Then he got the marauder habit. He started on Poland after making a pact with Hitler, got in without having to fight. Then he brought pressure to bear on each of his little neighbors, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania. That was easy, the countries were so small and fearful of attack. Like tactics were extended to Finland but there the big bold robber met his match. Finland refused to be absorbed and the men who trembled before Stalin are now trembling at having to meet the little Finns.

The fates so far seem to have been fighting with the Finns for a blizzard and severe frosts gave the advantage to the little country and yesterday a huge Russian army was cut to pieces by armies one tenth of their own size. The Russian bubble has been burst and pretty soon we shall probably see Joseph Stalin, the Oriental tyrant, banished from the Moscow throne.

### OPERA IS ON AGAIN

French Capital Refuses To Succumb To Hitler's "War Of Nerves"

PARIS, Jan. 3. (CP)—The doors of the National Opera are open again and the smile of M. Cambarrot, its genial General Secretary, is repeated on the face of the whole personnel. The President and Madame Lebrun attended the first performance.

This is just another of the signs that Paris is slowly getting back to normal—not a peacetime normal of course—but something very different from the first two months of the war. It is by comparison much more livable and agreeable.

When the box-office opened, a long queue was formed outside, proving that the Parisian intends to show by his sangfroid and "spectacles as usual" that Hitler's "war of nerves" cannot shake this city. In fact, the demand for seats is so great it is necessary to get tickets days in advance.

Instead of four performances a week there will be three Wednesday and Saturday evenings, and Sunday afternoon.

The first program included "The Damnation of Faust," "Le Festin de L'Araignee" by Albert Roussel, the second tableau from "D'Aleceste," with Madame Germaine Lubin singing the lead and M. Philippe Gaubert, present director of the Opera, in charge. Finally the third tableau from "Daphne et Chloe." A full repertoire of classic grand opera is arranged for the winter season.

#### Ready For Air Raids

"The theatre," said M. Cambarrot, "will have a different aspect. No evening dress, and the vestiare is forbidden because of the air-raid alarms. Each spectator is given a ticket which explains to him exactly which shelter to go to in case of alert, and the large plans show where the shelters are to be found. The personnel of the Opera can be housed in the basement and passages under the opera building."

The Opera will have available 1,200 instead of 2,200 seats—the fourth and fifth galleries being closed. There is no definite hour of opening—it being announced from day to day—but usually the evening performance begins at 6:30 or seven to finish before 10 o'clock.

"Why do we open again?" repeated M. Cambarrot. "For national reason and also because the Opera is the livelihood of more than 1,000 people. Everybody is delighted to be back to work down to the smallest rat (ballet pupil). Those who are not mobilized found the inaction terrible and they are so happy to be able to serve—for it is a national service to perform here. There is always the menace of air-raids. We will carry on the life of Paris as before. Our price-less decors which are in a place of safety not far from Paris will be brought back and forth by truck."

Every precaution has been taken that not a silver of light escapes from the Opera—and each spectator must carry his gasmask. Otherwise the Opera carries on as usual.

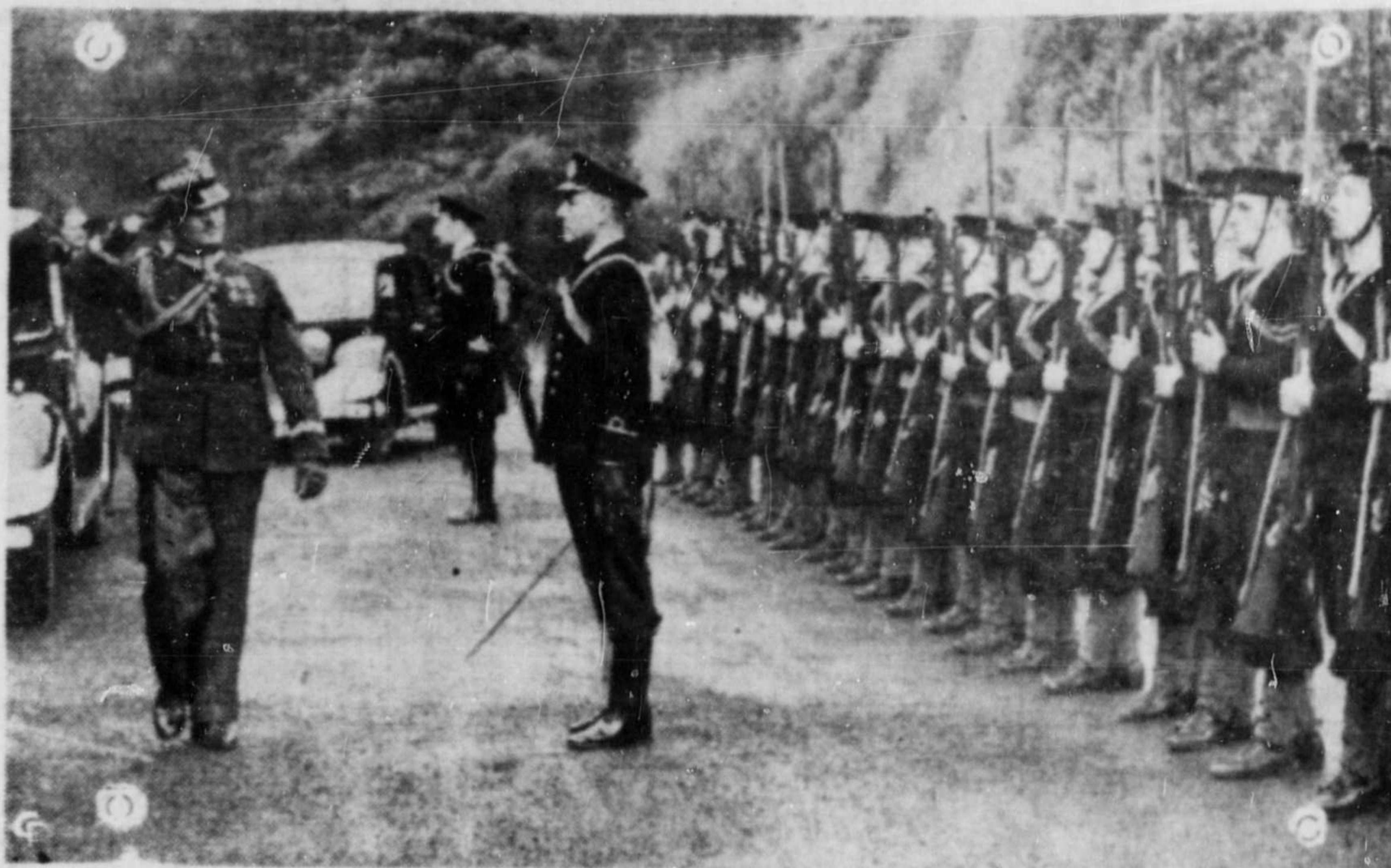
