'n had only one brief alarm during the night but no bombs were dropped. This alarm came early this morning. Throughout yesterday there was no bombing anywhere in England. Sheffield continued to dig into widespread ruins from Thursday night's attack to extricate bodies. Late today Nazi raiders were reported over northwest England and South Wales including Liverpool.

ROYAL AIR FORCE ACTIVE

LONDON-Despite unfavorable weather, the Royal Air force last night bombed shipyards at Kiel, Factories, railways, warehouses and other objectives at Bremen, airdromes in the Netherlands and submarine bases at Bordeaux. All British planes returned safely.

BRITISH ROUT ITALIANS

CAIRO-With between 40,000 and 50,000 Italian soldiers now reported to be captured, the great British drive was continuing today to clear the Fascists out of Egypt. The retreat of the enemy into Libya is developing into a rout. Guns, tanks and large quantities of equipment are being captured by the British. The first trainload of captured Italian wounded was brought into Cairo during the night. The British Navy and air Force continue to pound hard at Saloum, Bardia and Torbruk which ports have evidently been now rendered all but

FASCIST COLLAPSE IN ALBANIA

ATHENS-With two hundred officers and seven thousand soldiers captured by the relentlessly advancing Greeks, the Italians were reported to be evacuating Valona, second largest seaport in Albania and important point of communication with Italy. Withering British and Greek air attack has rendered the port untenable. With violent fighting and despite stiff Italian resistance at some points, the Greek advance continues steadily throughout Albania. The Italians are beginning to feel seriously the lack of munitions and food and the army in Albania is said to be losing its power of resistance and may, it is suggested by some, soon collapse.

WESTERN PRINCE TORPEDOED

NEW YORK-The 10,926-ton British motorship Western Prince of the Furness-Withy Line is reported to have been torpedoed and sunk 400 miles northwest of the Irish coast last night. The Western Prince was built in 1929 at Glasgow and was well known in the New York and South American service. She sailed from Rio de Janeiro on September 19.

CROSS-CHANNEL FIRING DOVER-German big guns were firing again at regular five-minute intervals across the Straits of Dover today.

BATTLE IN ADRIATIC

LONDON-According to reports from YugoSlavia there was a day long naval battle yesterday in the Adriatic off the Dalmatian coast. It was rumored that the British Navy had slipped into the Adriatic and attacked Italian transports.

Minister Of Munitions And Supply Howe On Board Ship Which Has Been Torpedoed

NEW YORK, December 14: (CP)— The Furness-Withy Line today confirmed reports that Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of munitions and supply for Canada, was on board the motorship Western Prince, reported torpedoed and sunk, when the vessel left New York for England.

Earlier the Ottawa Citizen newspaper had said that information received in Ottawa "supported the strong possibility" that Mr. Howe was a passenger on the ten thousand ton British liner which was reported to have been torpedoed off the Irish Coast.

At the minister's office it was said at that time there was no knowledge of Mr. Howe being on the boat and Mrs. Howe said only that her husband had left Canada on one of the Prince boats of which there are rour. Accompanying Howe were Col. W. C. Woodward of Vancouver, E. P. Taylor of Toronto and Hon. Gordon Scott of Montreal.

LAVAL IS REMOVED

Flandin, Nazi and Extreme Rightist, Becomes New Foreign Minister of France

VICHY, France, December 14 (Canadian Press)-Pierre Laval resigned today from the government of France. By decree his rights of succession as chief of state were abolished. Marshal Henri Phillippe Petain, in a radio speech, announced that Laval, who had been both vicepremier and foreign minister, was now no longer part of the government because of "interst of the country."

Pierre Etienne Flandin, an extreme rightist and believed to be an even closer friend of Nazi Germany than Laval, has been appointed foreign minister.
