BERLIN, April 19: (CP)- Nazi press and spokesmen exulted today over exchange of military commissions in Rome between Germany and Italy as a further indication of the strength of the military alliance between the Reich and the Fascist State in collaborating for the solution of common problems. The first members of the German commission, it is announced, are already in Rome where their visit was described as part of a general program under way since 1938.

DIED AT PORCHER ISLAND

Bringing in the body of Frank Hugnan, a logger, who died in his bed at Louis Locker's camp on Porcher Island, the provincial police boat P.L.M. 8 returned to port last night. NORWEGIAN MINISTER EXPELLED

BERLIN-Germany today ordered the Norwegian minister to Germany, Arne Scheel, to leave Berlin. The action is tantamoint to breaking off diplomatic relations with the Norwegian government.

RUSSIAN PACIFIC CONVOY

LONDON-The Russian Pacific fleet has been ordered to convoy Russian freighters operating between American ports and Vladivostock, the London Telegraph says. In Moscow Soviet authorities advised that such reports be viewed with reserve. There had been no attempt yet to interfere with Soviet shipping on the Pacific, it was said.

POLISH VICTORY

LONDON-It has been disclosed that it was the Polish submarine Otsel which sank the German troopship Rio de Janeiro last week in the Baltic Sea. The Otsel was caught at Esthonia and interned last September after the war broke out but made her getaway.

BRITISH SHIP TORPEDOED

LONDON-The British steamer Quainby, bound from Norway to Great Britain with iron ore, has been torpedoed. Crew of 38 was rescued.

HITLER'S BIRTHDAY

ESTABLISH FOOTHOLD

British Forces Score Heavily Over Germans in Land Fighting Near Namsos-Battling Near Elverum

Trondheim Aim

Navy and Air Forces Are Co-Operating With Those On Shore

STOCKHOLM, April 19.—Bitter fighting today between British and German troops near Namsos, where the British have landed in force in order to launch a in the driving back of the Nazis who suffered severe casualties.

As a result of the active Allied OTTAWA, April 19: - Orders co-operation, Namsos and Bodo, wegian hands.

British troops are now pouring into Norwegian ports, a guarded announcement by the British War Office says.

Bitter fighting also began today a few miles north of Elverum between Norwegian and German forces with British officers seen collaborating with Norwegians.

HEAD ON ENGAGEMENT

Allied manoeuvres, including the first reported engagement of the British and German land forces, point to a head-on clash of belligerents in Norway.

A Reuters dispatch confirms the first encounter occurring on the difficult terrain amid the fjords at Namsos, north of Trondhejm, with the Germans said to be repulsed.

Apparently, the Germans are rushing north from Oslo.

British officers are reported at the provisional capital of Hamar which is expected to fall shortly with the Norwegians withdrawing to a new defence line.

The Allied campaign is evidently to reach Trondhejm overland from Narvik and Namsos, also cutting across Norway in two sectors.

The Germans have been attempting to land troops at Namsos by air.

In the endeavour to co-operate with the Norwegians in driving the Germans out, air attacks are being continued by the British at various strategic points.

WILD GERMAN CLAIMS

Notwithstanding the Allied statements to the contrary, the Germans still claim they have a foothold at Narvik, that they are in complete control of all fjords on the west coast of Norway and are consolidating their positions in other areas.

The Nazi propaganda machine also claims the sinking by aircraft of a British cruiser and a submarine with damaging of a battleship and other warcraft. A direct hit is claimed to have been made, on a battleship of the 36,000-ton Warspite class which was in danger of sinking. Cruisers of the Suffolk and London classes, the Germans claim, were also hit.

Damaging of the 1400-ton destroyer Eclipse in a German bombing attack was disclosed with the announcement that the vessel had reached her home base.

A Rome report of a brilliant German victory in Norway in which 16,000 British were killed, wounded or taken prisoner is branded in London as "ridiculous."






