### Work On War Contracts In All Parts Of Canada Will Be Greatly Speeded Ahead

OTTAWA, May 23: (CP)—Canadian industry engaged in filling war contracts rallied behind the government today to step up war materials production and planned to follow Supply Minister C. D. Howe's request that night and day shifts be started and work continued on Sundays and holidays.

The request was received this morning by heads of heavy industry, shipbuilding and aircraft firms and immediate response was given all over Canada. Instructions were sent out to all plants in the Dominion engaged in any form of war contracts.

The government's move coincided with a message from Dominions Secretary Caldecote, sent from London, saying that one airplane immediately was worth ten in six months' time.

(No official statement was available locally but the despatch suggests the speeding up order applies to the shipbuilding contracts at Prince Rupert dry dock.)

LONDON, May 23:-As Germany continues to threaten an invasion of the British Isles, the drive against the supposed "Fifth Column' in England continues with sensational swift-

Sir John Anderson, Home Secretary, made the startling announcement today that, in the drive against the "Fifth Column," Sir Archibald Ramsay, a Conservative Member of Parliament, and "other Nazi sympathizers" had been arrested while 167 members of the Irish Republican Army had been ordered deported.

Ramsay, whose detention was described as a "precautionary measure," was placed in Brixton

The arrest of Ramsay, who is a former member of the Coldstream Guards, was made at the direction of the Home Secretary on whose behalf the announcement was actually made to the House with due formality by the Speaker. The Speaker's announcement said that Ramsay was being held for "undisclosed

When it is considered that a very considerable part of Nelson, formerly a city league outfield hard-hitting Doug Kerr the population of this city is of some other than British origin, it becomes clear how necessary it is to weld them all into a cohensive group. It is to be presumed that all came here because they felt they could live life better or easier here than elsewhere. Those who came from Europe must have expected to better their condition and most of them became Canadian citizens or in other words citizens of the British Empire, swearing allegiance to the King and deciding to throw in their lot permanently with the country. To some of these Empire Day means a great deal and to others it means little or nothing.

There are a few people who would like to be Canadians but not British. They cannot be that. Canada has been British since Wolfe climbed the banks of the St. Lawrence, took the enemy by surprise and defeated Montcalm on the Plains of Abraham. While in matters of local concern we are all Canadians, when it comes to matters of concern to the world at large, we are British. When war was declared we had the right to stand aside and take no part but Parliament decided that Canada could not stand aside and that action was endorsed by the people at a later general election. Today we are in the war for all ve are worth and must stand or fall with the British Empire.

Ours is a new country. One hundred years ago few white men had been seen on these coasts. Our capital city, Victoria, was founded less than one hundred years ago and that is the oldest city in British Columbia. Many people came to the province and some went away. The majority of those who remain are here to make more or less permanent homes. It is for them to adapt themselves to the conditions of life they find here. In doing this the education of the children to British ideals is very important. That is the chief object of Empire Day.



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
