In most of the overrun countries crop St. Louis production this year will be much below the average and philadelphia in many of them cattle are being killed because of lack of Washington feed.

The chief food supply is in Canada which has a quarter of a billion bushels of wheat and Australia about half that amount. That makes these two dominions the food supply centres for the Empire, a dependable source. here.
