BEWARE PROPAGANDA

We have more than once warned our readers against believing all they hear on the American radio. Yet we all listen and often believe. Here is what J. N. Kelly of the Vancouver Sun has to say about it:

"The 'Lord Haw Haws' of the American air lanes had a field day over the week-end holding post-mortems over the British 'defeat' in Norway and extolling the invincibility of the Nazi war machine. And, of course, they emphasized what Mussolini would do to the Allies should he unleash his 'dogs of war' in the Mediterranean.

"It is one of the paradoxes of this war that the radio mouthpieces of the United States, who constantly warn their listeners against propaganda, particularly British, should succumb so easily to the sop handed out by Dr. Goebbels in Berlin.

"The truth about the Allied actions in Norway probably will not be known until after the war. Even if we have suffered a setback there is no need to accept the versions of the gloom-dispensers of the United States.

"These fire-side Napoleons tell us that it is not the "defeat" that counts but the effect on the morale of neutrals; that now we are 'losing' the war these nations will' get on the Nazi 'bandwagon.'

"Don't let us delude ourselves into believing we are going to win this war without suffering reverses. If we do, we are going to have some rude shocks. The British! government and noticeably. Winston Churchill, warned us to be prepared for the worst and to expect our share of

"Outside of the unspactacular but nevertheless effective blockade of Germany, the war is hardly started . The Allied armies are still intact and command of the seas is secure.

"If anyone is inclined to be pessimistic about the progress of this war they should compare the happenings of the first eight months of the first Great War and the course of this conflict to date."

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


