First, for the re-establishment of a naval college in Canada possibly at Esquimalt.

Second, for the construction of destroyers and, possibly, cruisers in Canadian shipyards.

Third, a Canadian naval strength of 252 vessels and 23,000 personnel by the end of 1942.

Whereas the Canadian Navy at the start of the war consisted of only 15 ships there were now 155. The personnel of the Canadian Navy now numbered 13,273.




