LONDON, November 14- Fortyfive German planes endeavored to id London today but all were riven back by anti-aircraft fire and Royal Air Force fighter craft. Today's air raid alarms followed mother light night attack. At 6:30 st evening an alarm was sounded and three-and-a-half hours later came the all clear as the enemy eviently gave up the attempt to buck evere flying weather.

Royal Air Force fighters roared to battle off the southeast coast day and shot down thirteen Geran dive bombers and one fighter eking to cross the Channel for wlight raids on Britain. In all. fteen planes were destroyed. Two tht Nazi formations tried to atck London but were repelled.

British Planes Visit Taranto Again and Also Let Berlin Know They Are Still Busy

LONDON, November 14 (Canadian Press)-From hard hit Taranto at the southern tip of Italy to Berlin the Royal Air Force struck against the enemy again last night, pressing home the offensive which has crippled half of Mussolini's battleships and raised the prestige of the British Empire's sea-air power.

At Taranto, where three battleships and four other Italian warcraft were reported crippled Monday, Royal Air Force bombers followed up the attack on the harbor and naval base hitting port and docks.

In Berlin a railway station, the one from which Premier Molotoff of Russia was supposed to leave for home, freight yards and other objectives were attacked despite miserable weather. In all, attacks are reported to have made on fourteen points in the Reich or in Nazi-controlled trritory.

EDITORIALS

A Great Victory - - -

The naval air force achieved a notable victory at the beginning of the week. It put a large part of the Italian navy out of business in a bombing attack upon Taranto naval base on the night of Armistice Day. Two of the enemy vessels were battleships and it is thought a third was badly damaged. In order to make sure before reporting the victory, the navy sent reconnaisance planes to see what, had been done and to take photographs of the wrecks. It was a glorious victory and one that will be remembered in history as an outstanding victory for the British naval air forces.

The Late Neville Chamberlain - - -

The recent death of Right Hon. Neville Chamberlain. until a short time ago Prime Minister of Great Britain. was a sad passing, for he was evidently a man who tried to do the right thing. He thought to keep Britain out of war but failed. The worst his enemies could say about him was that he failed to realize the strength of the enemy and the sad neglect of the British defences until it was too, late, leaving the enemy to conclude that the country was decadent. He did not realize that there were still bandits in high places and that their word or seal did not have any meaning. A firmer stand and a realization of the true position might have saved the world much misery.

Position Of Bevin - - -

Ernest Bevin is much in the public eye these days. We do not believe he is planning to oust Prime Minister Churchill but we do think the Trades Union supporters of his throughout Britain will insist that he be looked upon as the successor of Churchill when the time comes to make a change. Churchill is not a young man and the strain of leadership may be telling on him. He has already rallied the nation but he seems to us a little over pessimistic in his speeches. We doubt if that is necessary or desirable.

When Churchill's work is done it has been hinted by Beverley Baxter and others that Bevin is in line for the succession.

Ships Are Needed - - -

The question to what extent Prince Rupert may be able to help providing ships to replace those lost is evidently under consideration. Mr. Bevin in a recent address stated that in six months Britain's output of planes, guns; and ships will have equalled or outdistanced the output of similar production by Nazi Germany. And in regard to ships the Prime Minister warned that Britain has more to fear from the mounting toll which submarine warfare is exacting from the argosies sailing to and from the United Kingdom than from the bombardment to which Goering's aerial armada is subjecting cities, towns and villages throughout the land. But the Prime Minister evidently is confident the navy will discover a means of defeating the intensified U-boat campaign-made more difficult for the ships flying the white ensign, of course, because of their inability to use the bases on the south and west coasts of that part of Ireland over which doctrinaire Eamon de Valera presides as the head of the neutral state of Eire.

Britain's mounting ship losses, incidentally, are something of which Canada should take due notice. We do not know how many more craft could be built in the yards of the Dominion than at present are under construction. That is a matter for the authorities at Ottawa. But at the present session of Parliament regard should be paid for "the campaigns of 1943 and 1944."

An Eastern Opinion - - -

The Ottawa Citizen discusses the shortage of vessels of the larger classes saying in part: "Canada has no cruisers. The nearest approach to a Canadian warship in the cruiser class would be the former C.N. passenger liner Prince Robert. By removing some upper decks it has been possible to convert the Prince Robert into a serviceable fighting ship. She can reasonably be sent on long cruises in almost any weather. She is also armed with heavier! guns than on the destroyers. Canada would well employ Prince Robert's cruising capacity. It is common knowledge that others are being so converted. One in a Montreal # shipyard is reported to be nearly ready. In the meanwhile the smaller ships of the Canadian navy, destroyers, minesweepers, craft like the Bras d'Or, are liable to be called \$ upon to bear the whole burden through the winter months of service on the North Atlantic."


